### **Appendix 4C and Quarterly Activities Report**

The Directors of Site Group International Limited ("Site", ASX:SIT) have released the Appendix 4C quarterly cash flow for the quarter ended 30 September 2021.

The results for the quarter saw revenues reduce to \$1.8m with an EBITDA loss of (\$1.3m). This result included a non-cash unrealised forex loss of \$540k for the quarter. The cash position of Site at the end of the June quarter was \$0.47m with undrawn facilities of \$2.56m. Operating cash for the quarter was a net outflow of (\$0.85m). The reduction in revenues is a reflection of the sale of Site Skills Group Australia and EBITDA loss is significantly reflective of commencement of redundancies and other costs associated with the transfer of the business to Verbrec.

Post the settlement of the Site Skills Australia training business last quarter, management has focused on the previously stated objectives of the build of the international business and a potential pathway for the development of the Clark land. On 23 August 2021, the group announced the signing of a non-binding term sheet for the sale of up to 51% of shares in subsidiary Site Group Holding (SGH), the holder of the Clark lease to an entity associated with the Chairman, Mr Alcantara. This transaction will allow Site to reduce debt whilst retaining an equity stake in the land project. As this transaction will be subject to Site obtaining shareholder approval pursuant to Listing rule 10.1 and Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act, Site will delay holding its annual general meeting as provided for by *ASIC Corporations (Extension of Time to Hold AGM) Instrument 2021/770* which allows for an extension of 2 months.

The Site WorkReady business continues to experience a growing demand for workers as industries in Australia and the world experience shortages in skilled workers. Australia and in particular Western Australia has a rapidly increasing skills shortage across a number of sectors including industrial, construction, mining as well as oil and gas maintenance trades. This business is fielding significant enquiry from new customers in Australia, Europe, MENA and broader Africa.

### **Philippines Training**

### OceanaGold

OceanaGold has been granted a 25-year extension of its mining licence at Didipio Gold Mine in central Luzon, Philippines. As a result of the extension, recent discussions with OceanaGold have focused on training and procurement methods for reskilling and ramping up their workforce. Site has a long relationship training workers for Didipio utilizing the purpose-built Underground Training Mine at Site's Clark, Pampanga facility.

### Fieldcore

Fieldcore continues to maintain its physical presence at Clark and have been in constant contact during the pandemic with their intention to move some of their training out of the MENA region to Clark. This will occur once they can get their international people in to the Philippines when the travel ban is lifted.



### Kingdom of Saudi Arabia

The extension of contracts in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia (KSA) at the existing NCTC for a further 3 years highlight the recovery of training in KSA following the wind down and closure of the Centre during COVID. The second cohort of student has commenced in October as activity builds back towards previous levels. In addition, new projects are being negotiated and expect to be announced in 2022.

### ACCC / Litigation

Litigation with the ACCC in the Federal court is ongoing with Site recently seeking leave to challenge the decision. Site expects a full bench hearing will occur in 2022.
