JERVOIS COPPER PROJECT – HIGH GRADES CONFIRMED IN REWARD DRILLING

- Further high copper, silver and gold grades confirmed at Reward
- **DHEM extends Rockface Conductors**
- Gravity inversion results identify several new targets
- Drilling has recommenced with additional rig scheduled to arrive shortly

KGL Resources Limited (KGL:ASX) (KGL or the Company) is pleased to announce the receipt of assay results for Hole KJD216, following the *ASX* Announcement "Jervois Drilling Confirms Significant Discovery at Reward" released on 30 August 2017 which discovered a significant extension of mineralisation at Reward.

Reward Prospect – Discovery of deeper, Rockface-like mineralisation

As announced on 30 August 2017, hole KJD216 intersected a zone of visible, strong chalcopyrite plus pyrite mineralisation while targeting DHEM Conductors R1 and R3 at Reward. The intersection corresponded to the expected position of Conductor R1 and is 95m below the deepest previous intercept of Conductor R1. Assays from this interval (refer Tables 1 & 3) confirm the high grades

11.63m @ **4.2%** Cu, **0.81%** Pb, **1.07%** Zn, **86g/t** Ag, **0.65g/t** Au from **636.1** m Including 2.27m @ 11.14% Cu, 3.46% Pb, 4.75% Zn, 329.3g/t Ag, 1.33g/t Au from 644.4 m

The DHEM survey announced on 12 September 2017 confirmed that the bottom edge of Conductor R3 was 20m above this intercept. Modelling also indicated the presence of a new strong conductor R6 centred to the south and below hole KJD216 (*Figure 2*). Both of these conductors at Reward will be targeted in the current drilling program.

KGL Executive Chairman Mr Denis Wood said:

"This is a great result given the size of the step out from the previous mineralisation associated with Conductor R1. This is the first hole drilled at Reward in over 2 years. We are taking what we have learnt at Rockface, about the style, controls on mineralisation, geophysical response and applying that knowledge to great effect at Reward.

Given the level of support already committed by new and existing shareholders drilling has already commenced last week with the first of two rigs starting the program to further evaluate both Rockface and Reward."




Figure 1. Reward Cross-Section 7495275N

Reward Longitudinal Section – Looking West




Figure 2 Reward Long section 630 380E highlighting the DHEM conductors

DHEM at Rockface




Figure 3 Rockface Long section

A down hole electromagnetic (DHEM) survey has now been completed on the two holes recently drilled at Rockface (Figure 3).

KJCD214 intersected two zones of mineralisation and the DHEM confirmed that the first zone of 7.92m @ 1.65% Cu, 8.4g/t Ag, 0.12g/t Au from 405.54 m corresponded with Conductor 3.

The second copper zone of 11.5m @ 1.73% Cu, 7.8g/t Ag, 0.06g/t Au from 420.5 m, including 2.75m @ 4.47% Cu, 21.6g/t Ag, 0.18g/t Au from 420.5 m corresponded with Conductor 4. This extends Conductor 4 further up dip and to the west than previously modelled.

The DHEM survey of KJCD215 confirmed that the two mineralised intercepts of

- 8.24m @ 9.21% Cu, 0.19% Zn, 38.1g/t Ag, 0.29g/t Au from 587.5 m
 Including 4.57m @ 14.00% Cu, 53.6g/t Ag, 0.34g/t Au from 588.48 m; and
- 14.17m @ 4.74% Cu, 23.0g/t Ag, 0.28g/t Au from 610.09 m (C5) corresponded with Conductors 3 and 5 respectively.

A strong DHEM response was recorded from conductors in the eastern zone and this in combination with earlier surveys enabled Conductor 6 to be extended to the west, down dip and up dip of the previously modelled response.

Gravity Survey Inversion Results

The recent gravity survey conducted over the Unca Creek tenement surrounding Jervois, also included numerous infill stations on the Jervois tenement where a gravity survey was previously undertaken in 2016. These additional stations were designed to provide further detail in key areas including the Rockface/Bellbird region and Reward.

Inversion of the gravity data provides a guide as to how the density of the rocks vary with depth and assist to develop an understanding of the geological structure and stratigraphy.




Figure 4 Gravity inversion isosurfaces highlighting zones of higher density in the Bellbird Figure 5 Gravity inversion isosurfaces for Jervois and Unca Creek and Rockface region

The isosurfaces that are shown in Figure 4 & Figure 5 represent areas that are estimated by the inversion process to be denser than surrounding areas. The copper, lead and zinc mineralisation together with the common alteration minerals, magnetite and garnet, are all relatively dense so provide a good contrast when compared to the less dense metasedimentary rocks that comprise the bulk of the stratigraphy. Therefore, in addition to mapping the stratigraphy it can also directly detect target areas and assist with target prioritisation.

Figure 4 shows the denser areas in the Rockface and Bellbird region. Of interest is a tabular zone of high density that narrows toward the surface and appears to extend along structures that are coincident with mineralisation.

Figure 5 shows the greater Jervois project area including the Unca Creek tenement where the Pioneer prospect is highlighted by a zone of high density material that is coincident with copper mineralisation recorded in both outcrop and shallow drilling.




Figure 6 Location Plan for Jervois and Unca Creek Tenements
