Appendix 4C and Market Update

The Directors of Site Group International Limited ("Site", ASX:SIT) release the Appendix 4C quarterly cash flow for the period to 31 March 2018.

The results for the quarter saw revenues of \$7.1m and an EBITDA loss of \$787k. This includes the results of the discontinued Productivity Partners (PP) business being a cost in excess of \$400k. Operating cash flow for the quarter was an outflow of \$2.4m with a closing cash balance of \$1.8m. The operating cash flow is worse in the March quarter due to the working capital impact of the quieter seasonal training months of December and January.

Shareholders will be aware of the dispute with ASQA over registration of Site Skills Group ("SSG") and the pending appeal to the AAT.

Site has a significant industry client base and expects to train between 25-30,000 Australians this calendar year in a variety of courses and disciplines. Some of these courses are ASQA accredited therefore some may be affected going forward by the forthcoming appeal.

This has caused several of our Australian based customers to postpone training until the outcome of the appeal process is finalised. Accordingly Site has reviewed the potential impact and therefore updates its gross revenue statement to reduce its possible gross revenues from all operations from \$36m to \$30m with an EBITDA target of circa \$1m including discontinued operations for the full financial year without any impairment allowances.

International

Site is pleased to announce it has completed its 8th cohort of OceanaGold underground mining training for the Didipio mine in its Clark, Philippines facility. The 14 week course brings the number of mining graduates to 84 and a total of over 400 students who have trained at Clark for Mining, Operator and Safety Skills. All candidates have gained full time employment on leaving Clark as Oceana Gold continues its remarkable commitment to skilling locals for local jobs.

The Underground Mine training facility, which cost over \$1.5m to construct, continues to gain significant support from vendors such as Orica, MineArk and Sandvik.

The underground mine is part of the Site Skills training facility at Clark where other significant global companies work with Site such as GE through subsidiary FieldCore (stage 6b turbine training).
