BARRY PARADE PROJECT

As a result of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the operations of the Company, there were further delays during the quarter. The Company intends to resume development activity once market conditions improve and suitable project funding becomes available.

WHARF STREET PROPERTY

Due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic leasing activity for the company's Wharf Street property has been materially subdued. The Board resolved to proceed with an orderly and advantageous sale process of the Wharf Street Property and this matter is advancing.

Loan Facilities:

United Overseas Bank continues to provide two loans for an aggregate amount of \$29,960,000 for the Barry Parade and the Wharf Street properties. The loans are subject to an interest margin of 1.5% - 2.0% per annum over and above the relevant period Bank Bill Swap Reference Rate. The loans are secured by way of first legal mortgages over these two properties.

Other Facilities

Working Capital Unsecured Loan, from Khosland Management Pte Ltd. (a related party)

Amount \$1,194,056 (\$1m Singapore dollars). Repayment of this loan was previously extended to 26 May 2020 with an interest rate of 7%, or upon LHM securing appropriate funding from other sources. The Company is seeking to confirm a further extension of the loan term.

Convertible Notes

The Convertible Notes are unsecured and repayable in 60 months from the date of issue or 9 months from the date of issue if shareholder approval is not obtained to the convertibility of the Notes within three months of the date of issue. To date the Company has not obtained shareholder approval as contemplated by the terms of the Notes and accordingly some of the Notes have become repayable however the relevant Noteholders have not sought repayment to date.

The \$9,787,594 worth of Class A Notes bear interest of 9.0%, with the interest repayable Quarterly.

The \$595,881 worth of Class B Notes bear interest of 13.8%, with the interest repayable with the capital at the end of the Note term.

Working Capital Unsecured Loan, from a related parties

Amount \$347,469 (\$350,000 Singapore dollars). This is a short term loan which has a term of 3 months with interest at 9% per annum net of withholding taxes payable at the end of the loan term. Repayment of this loan is based upon the successful sale of the Wharf Street property or LHM securing appropriate funding from other sources. The LHM Board has resolved to proceed with an orderly and advantageous sale process of the Wharf Street Property to enable the Company to focus its attention and its financial resources on the future development of the Barry Parade project in the Fortitude Valley.

1. Does the entity expect that it will continue to have the current level of net operating cash flows for the time being and, if not, why not?

Answer: During the previous quarter, \$384k of the net operating cash flow pertained to development costs. Due to the impact of COVID-19, the Company may have to further defer the development of its properties, thus reducing the operating cash requirements from current levels.

2. Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?

Answer: The Board has resolved to proceed with an orderly and advantageous sale process of the Wharf Street Property to enable the Company to focus its attention and its financial resources on the future development of the Barry Parade project in the Fortitude Valley. In addition the Company has initiated dialogue with its existing bankers in respect of additional working capital facilities.

3. Does the entity expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives and, if so, on what basis?

Answer: As far as possible, the Company will reduce its operating costs in order to weather continuing challenging market conditions, whilst re-evaluating its development strategy going forward. If the sale process of the Wharf Street property proceeds as contemplated the Company will be able to focus its attention and its financial resources on re-activating the development of the Barry Parade project in the Fortitude Valley.
