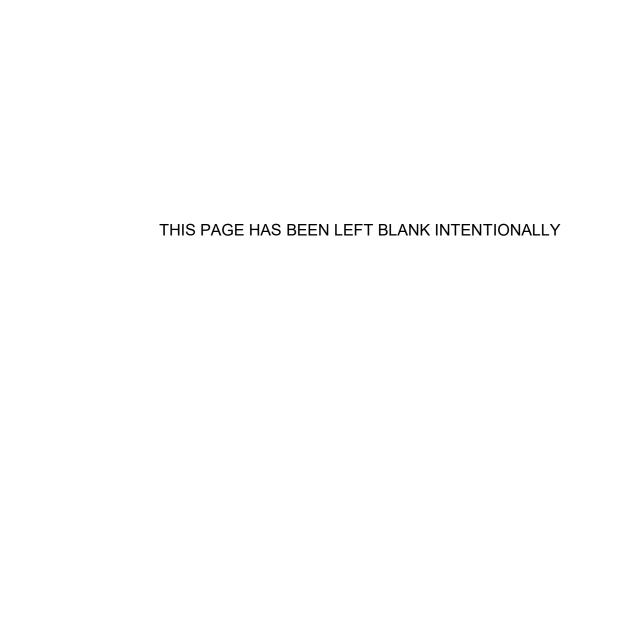

#### **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Your Directors are pleased to present their report on the consolidated entity (referred to hereafter as the "Group") consisting of Alliance Aviation Services Limited (the "Company") or ("Alliance") and the entities it controlled at the end of, or during, the half year ended 31 December 2020.

#### **DIRECTORS**

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Group has delivered a record first half statutory profit before tax (PBT) of \$33.6 million, an increase of 116.8% when compared to the prior comparative period (2019: \$15.5 million). The Group's statutory net profit after tax (NPAT) result for the half year was \$23.4 million, an increase of 118.7% on the prior comparative period (2019: \$10.7 million). The increase in half year profit can be attributed to a change in revenue mix, a reduced cost base and the full half year contribution from a number of clients.

#### **REVENUE**

Revenue increased 2.3% from \$151.3 million for the half year to 31 December 2019 to \$154.8 million for the half year ended 31 December 2020. The increase in total revenue in the first half was driven by growth in contract and charter revenues of 11.6% and 176.7% respectively. These increases more than offset wet lease and RPT revenues decreasing by 96.3% and 24.4% when compared to the prior comparative period.

- Contract revenue benefited from continued increased demand from a majority of resource sector clients and a number
  of larger mine maintenance programs throughout the half year. The removal of social distancing on the majority of
  flights has had no material impact on total revenue or total hours;
- Similarly, Alliance continued to operate services for the majority of charter clients it acquired in FY2020. This includes
  resource sector companies, sporting teams and government agencies. In addition to this there were a number of
  domestic tourism services operated in the first half;
- Wet lease revenue resumed in the half year with limited services operating from Brisbane to Emerald under the Virgin Australia wet lease agreement;
- RPT revenues continued to be impacted by domestic border closures and an overall subdued leisure travel market.
   Alliance, in conjunction with key Queensland tourism and airport operators, entered into co-operative arrangements in the half year which allowed for a small expansion of the RPT network to additional tourism and key regional ports; and
- Aviation services revenue also continued to be impacted by a depressed aircraft spare parts market due to the decrease in aviation activity across the globe.

#### **CASHFLOW**

Operating cash flow for the half year was \$47.5 million, an increase of \$32.9 million from the prior year comparative (\$14.6 million). The following are factors that affected the operating cash flow in the first half:

- The full first-half impact of the retention of the resource sector clients acquired in FY2020;
- A shift in the product mix resulting in a higher revenue per flight hour;
- Aviation specific government rebates that were available to the Group which are reflected through increased cash flows; and
- Lower fuel prices have provided relief in the RPT sectors and has also seen a reduction in cash outflows.

Cash outflows related to investing activities in the half year were \$101.3 million, an increase of \$81.5 million on the prior year comparative. During the half year \$87.4 million was incurred in relation to the Embraer program and associated costs. These aircraft will be inducted into the fleet throughout FY21 and FY22. In addition, the Group acquired the Unity Aviation Maintenance Pty Ltd maintenance facility in Brisbane. This strategic acquisition will provide additional hangarage which is critical in ensuring the ongoing maintenance capabilities for the growing fleet.

The Group decreased its debt by \$2.4 million in the half year.

#### CAPITAL EXPENDITURE

Capital expenditure for the period was \$103.2 million (2019: \$28.0 million).

Capital expenditure on pre-existing fleet and services was \$14.6 million. Other capital expenditure incurred during the year for the expansion of the Alliance business was \$88.6 million which brought the total capital expenditure for the interim reporting period to 31 December 2020 to \$103.2 million. The investment in expansion relates to thirty Embraer E190 aircraft, Embraer simulator and the acquisition of Toll Aviation Engineering Pty Ltd. A summary of the capital expenditure is shown below.

Additions to the Right of Use assets in the half-year were \$11.8 million and involved Unity Aviation Maintenance Pty Ltd executing a long-term hangar lease and Alliance Airlines Pty Limited renegotiating and extending its current hangar facility lease.

#### AMOUNTS RECOGNISED IN THE CONSOLIDATED INCOME STATEMENT

Payments associated with short-term leases of equipment and vehicles and all leases of low-value assets are recognised on a straight-line basis as an expense in profit or loss. Short-term leases are leases with a lease term of 12 months or less. Low-value assets comprise airport apron licence.

Extension and termination options are typically included in property leases across the Group. These are used to maximise operational flexibility in terms of managing the assets used in the Group's operations. The majority of the extension and termination options held are exercisable only by the Group and not by the respective lessor.

The agreement is based on engine operating hours for 46 Tay 650-15 engines and is payable monthly in arrears. The agreement expires in December 2024 although has an option to extend to December 2026.

#### AIRCRAFT ACQUISITION

During the half-year ended 31 December 2020, the Group executed sale and purchase agreements with two separate parties for the acquisition of 30 Embraer E-190 jet aircraft and associated spare engines, spare componentry, tooling and ground services equipment. As at 31 December 2020 the Group has contracted commitments totalling USD90.4m. Financial settlement of these commitments occur in line with an agreed timetable which is planned to be completed by November 2021.

#### H2 - EVENTS OCCURRING AFTER BALANCE DATE

The Directors are not aware of any other matters or circumstances not otherwise dealt with in the interim financial report that have significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the consolidated Group, the results of those operations or the state of the consolidated Group in the period subsequent to the half year ended 31 December 2020.

#### I – BASIS OF PREPARATION

The Group is experiencing very strong financial performance with significantly increased profit and cashflow. The financial forecasts show continued growth across all revenue categories, in particular the wet lease arrangement recently executed with Qantas, announced on 4 February 2021. The acquisition of 30 Embraer E190 aircraft committed during the half-year will facilitate such further growth.

Note H1 – Contingencies and Commitments, identifies that the Group has outstanding capital commitments at balance date of USD\$90 million in relation to the Embraer E190 acquisition programme, including USD\$73 million scheduled for settlement by 30 June 2021, as aircraft are delivered. The Group had cash reserves of A\$45 million at 31 December 2020 and continues to generate positive cash flow. At the date of this report there were not committed financing facilities available to fully cover the outstanding commitments.

The Directors considered the financing options at the time of committing to the acquisition of the additional aircraft. Discussions were held with a variety of parties as to the confidence the Directors could have in obtaining the necessary finance.

At 31 December 2020, there were strong commercial reasons for not finalising the financing arrangements, but these are currently being actively pursued.

The Directors are confident that the Group will be successful in securing the necessary funding to cover the contractual capital commitments. However, despite this view of the Director's, AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements requires a disclosure noting that at the date of this report there is a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt upon the Group continuing as a going concern because the timing of the funding commitment is not finally confirmed.

The Group has low gearing, strong cash flow and strong prospects. The Directors have formed the view that despite the shortfall in committed facilities as at the date of this report, the Group will be able to secure funding to meet its commitments and thus have prepared the interim financial report on a going concern basis.
