#### Quarterly Activities Report April - June 2021

#### **Key Highlights**

- Q2 revenue YoY up by 77% (excl R&D grant)
- 38% YoY growth in new customers
- Q2 revenue is \$677K from continuing operations (including R&D grant)
- Q2 revenue is \$417K from continuing operations (excluding the R&D grant)

#### **Existing Customers**

- YTD renewals were strong with an overall 10% growth in customer value YoY.
- Including in the renewals were
  - SMEG;
  - The Good Guys; and
  - An international liquor brand

#### New Customers

- A 38% growth YOY in new customer acquisitions.
- No new acquisitions this quarter (Q2 2021).

#### **User Growth**

- Q2 2021 saw unique users of our platform grow 70% YoY.
- This is attributed to a growing application of our data within existing customer brands and an increase in trials launched with potential new clients reflecting our strong sales activities and pipeline

#### **Outlook**

- We continue to improve the integrity of our product and quality of our data by listening to our customers' requirements.
- Whilst we continue to focus on growth with major international brands, we will also pursue local brands, retailers and marketplaces.
- There are over 60,000 retailers in Australia all realizing the potential in e-commerce and the power real time data plays to their overall online strategy, a gap that Invigor addresses very well.
- We continue to follow our growth plans outlined in our Q1 announcement including



- expanding into other verticals such as FMCG and Health & Beauty products.
- In addition, we are engaged in several partnership discussions with complementary businesses whilst ensuring we don't divert from our core competencies.
- As also reported in Q1, we are still on track for the Company moving to operational cash positive by year end.
- As also foreshadowed the Company is looking at a debt/equity conversion together with a capital raise which on completion will ensure a strong balance sheet with sufficient working capital. The finalisation of this restructure will enable the Company to apply to the ASX for the approval for a resumption of the trading of its securities on the Exchange.
- These changes combined with our new management structure should position the Company very strongly for long term revenue and earnings growth.

#### **Capital Management**

The company is planning a General Meeting of Shareholders in late Q3 this year to approve its plans as mentioned above.

#### Innovation

The development of new vertical markets for the Pricing Insight solution is underway with a target date for completion in Q3. Expenditure on these initiatives in the quarter amounted to \$77,000.

#### **Payments to Directors and Related Parties**

During the quarter, total payments to Directors and related parties included in operating cash flows were \$224,000 which included:

- Reimbursement payments under cost sharing arrangements for rent, electricity, and IT support to Marcel Equity Pty Ltd (entity associated with Gary Cohen and Gregory Cohen) of \$71,000.
- Monthly salaries and fees to Executive and Non-Executive Directors of \$125,000.
- Payments to PrimaryMarkets Ltd (entity associated with Gavin Solomon) as consultancy fees of \$8,000.



#### **Commentary by the CEO**

"Taking over as CEO in July has been an honor and exciting as we continue to push through, despite the disruptive macro factors of Covid-19 affecting the operating conditions for our clients and our team. I am extremely proud of the team for their dedication and resilience that has contributed to our simplified growth strategy. Much of what has driven our strategy over the past 18 months is one of sustained growth and maintainable margins, with our customers being at the forefront of every single decision we make for the long-term benefit for our shareholders.

We have identified key metrics to which we will continue to measure performance allowing the Company to report more effectively on our growth and the execution of our strategy to all our stakeholders."

The Company expects it may continue to have negative operating cash flow for the next few months, however it continues to see a significant improvement in new customer orders whichare resulting in improved operational cashflow.

8.6.2 Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?

The Company has appointed a Corporate Advisor to assist in a advising on strategic options including a capital raise and strategic partnerships. Since the appointment the Company has made significant progress. The Company is currently finalising debt restructing and new equity issue proposals to be considered by shareholders at an upcoming General Meeting to be called in during September.

8.6.3 Does the entity expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives and, if so, on what basis?

Yes. In addition to the above, the Company has continued to collect the amortising promissory note installments from the sale of Tillerstack GmbH. Monthly instalments have been received since February 2021.
