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Quarterly Activities Report and Appendix 4C

Highlights¹:

- FY21 financial guidance maintained; \$50-53 million in revenue; EBITDA loss of \$5-8 million, and net loss after tax of \$7 to \$10 million
- Three new enterprise contracts signed during the quarter, including the US operations of a large global banking group
- Late stage pipeline (finalist and verbal) up 78% to \$16.1 million versus Q2 2021 as Company has made significant progress in new customer development in the quarter
- Cash position of \$15.1 million as at 30 September 2021 and no drawn debt
- Q3 2021 operating cash outflows of \$4.1 million, reflects the timing effect of a large upfront enterprise subscription expected in Q3 (received in early October)
- Strong Q4 2021 contract signings and growth in 2H 2021 CARR² anticipated
- Expect to launch a mid-market well-being offering in Q4 2021

SYDNEY, Australia and Bellevue, Washington. – 19 October 2021 – <u>Limeade</u> (ASX: LME, or the Company), an immersive employee well-being company that creates healthy employee experiences, today announces the quarterly activities report and Appendix 4C quarterly cash flow report for the three months ended 30 September 2021.

Limeade CEO Henry Albrecht commented "During the quarter we focussed on serving our core enterprise well-being customers, integrating the TINYpulse acquisition and readying for the launch of an immersive well-being entry into the mid-market. Whether a company has 2,000 or 200,000 employees, they seek to listen better and do more for their people to maximize business performance. We were very pleased at the acceleration of our late-stage enterprise sales pipeline to finalist and verbal stages as well, providing Limeade with a solid platform for growth in 2022."

During the quarter, the Company recorded cash receipts from customers of \$16.1 million, down 32% versus the prior corresponding period (pcp), reflecting the timing effect of a large annual subscription payment from a significant enterprise customer expected in Q3 2021 (collected in October) and lower overall contracted annual recurring revenue (CARR) compared to FY20 for the Limeade core business. Had this enterprise customer payment been received during Q3 2021 as per prior year, the Company would have recorded positive operating cash flows for the quarter.

Net cash receipts from customers after adjusting for payments made in relation to the sale of third-party products and services was \$12.0 million, down 37% versus the pcp. Third party payments of \$4.0 million were down 14% versus the pcp though sequentially were up 21% when compared to Q2 2021, reflecting an increase in customer employee incentive funding payments.

Cash payments during the quarter were primarily directed towards the following costs: staff (\$10.3 million), administration & corporate (\$3.4 million), operating (\$1.0 million), marketing (\$0.7 million) and research & development (\$0.8 million).

The 18% increase in staff costs relative to Q2 2021 reflects the additional headcount acquired as part of the TINYpulse acquisition, which completed on 29 July 2021. The increase in Limeade R&D of 56% versus Q2 2021 in part reflects the acquisition of TINYpulse R&D center in Vietnam and additional investments into the Limeade platform during the quarter.

The Company recorded operating cash outflows of \$4.1 million for the quarter, an increase of 104% on Q2 2021. Investing cash flows for the quarter of \$9.6 million was driven by the \$8.9 million payment to acquire TINYpulse, representing the final adjusted price for the business. Limeade capitalized software development costs incurred during the quarter, decreased 1% to \$0.8 million.

During the quarter, the Company made related third-party payments of \$86 thousand representing fees paid to non-executive directors for performance of their required duties as disclosed in the prospectus and annual report.

The Company's cash balance as at 30 September 2021 was \$15.1 million, with the Company remaining debt-free and well-positioned to capitalize on both organic and inorganic growth opportunities through the remainder of 2021 and into 2022. In addition, the Company maintains a \$15 million undrawn debt facility credit facility with Comerica Bank.

Cash and recurring subscription revenue from the existing customer base remains strong with the top 20 customers on average having 19 months remaining on their contracts (up from 17 months at Q2 2021).

Overall year to date Net Revenue Retention (NRR)³ was 84% as at 30 September 2021. Limeade direct customer NRR was 86%, a decline of 10% versus the pcp, while indirect (partner) NRR was 65%. Direct customer NRR was impacted by the termination of a top ten customer, American Airlines, during the period (\$1.9 million in CARR) and the continued impact of COVID-19 on customer retention. As per previous quarters, the indirect channel, which tends to focus on midmarket companies, continued to experience persistent customer churn. Limeade is now focused on pursuing healthier channel relationships with more strategic partners moving

forward. As at 30 September 2021, indirect CARR represented 6.7% of total Company CARR, versus 10.3% as at FY20.

During Q3 2021, Limeade signed 3 new enterprise contracts (Q3 2020: 3), which included two Well-Being and one Engagement customer in the financial services, tech and energy sectors, respectively.

The Company also announced a partnership with Microsoft Viva to infuse well-being into the flow of work to help employees thrive. During the quarter, Limeade was pleased to appoint Sarah Visbeek to the role of Vice President, Legal. Sarah has significant legal expertise at both the Director and Senior Corporate Counsel level and as General Counsel. Sarah is a welcome addition to the Limeade team. Sarah holds a J.D., cum laude in Law from the University of Seattle and a B.A. magna cum laude from Seattle Pacific University.

The Company's total sales and marketing pipeline (including TINYpulse) at Q3 2021 recorded a decline of 4% versus Q2 2021, to \$151 million, driven predominately by a decline in the early stage qualifying (marketing) pipeline. The Company's finalist and verbal pipeline was up 78% to \$16.1 million, reflecting a strong progression down the pipeline for core Limeade well-being solutions.

Limeade maintains financial guidance for FY21 as follows:

- Revenue of \$50-53 million
- Earnings Before Interest, Tax, Depreciation and Amortization (EBITDA) loss of \$5-8 million
- Net loss after tax of \$7-10 million
