Appendix 4C – Quarterly Cash Flow Report

31st January 2023: Analytica Ltd (ASX: ALT), manufacturer of the PeriCoach® system and the Enhanced Infusion System technologies, has today released its Appendix 4C - Quarterly Cashflow report for the period ending 31st December 2022.

During the quarter product distributions opportunities have been continued to be pursued for both the PeriCoach and the Enhanced Infusion System. Discussions with large international companies continue to be advanced.

There are currently advanced discussions with directors to provide additional non diluting unsecured loans to the company. The company is reviewing all funding options to address its long-term ongoing funding needs. The \$2 million dollars unsecured loan facility provided by the chairman has been extended by \$300 thousand with the loan repayment date now set at 30th of June 2023. The terms of this loan are set out in the 4C which follows below.

The Company at the 31st December 2022 had loan funding available of \$312 thousand. With this \$300 thousand extension available loan funds increase to \$612 thousand.

Halonna Pty Ltd, an entity associated with the Chairman, Dr Michael Monsour has agreed to extend a loan facility up to \$2,300,000 to 30th June 2023. Interest is payable at a commercial unsecured overdraft rate, presently 8.51%, quarterly in arrears. The Facility is to be repaid in full on the earliest of 30th June 2023, completion of an equity raising of more than \$250,000 and 14 days after a change of control event¹ occurs in relation to the Company, which has occurred.

Aggregate payments to related parties and their associates amounted to \$75k.

About Analytica Limited

Analytica's lead product is the PeriCoach® System – an e-health treatment system for women who suffer Stress Urinary Incontinence. This affects 1 in 3 women worldwide and is mostly caused by trauma to the pelvic floor muscles as a result of pregnancy, childbirth and menopause.

PeriCoach comprises a device, web portal and smartphone app. The device evaluates activity in pelvic floor muscles. This information is transmitted to a smartphone app and can be loaded to a cloud database where physicians can monitor patient progress via web portal. This novel system enables physicians to remotely determine if a woman is performing her pelvic floor exercises and if these are improving her condition. Strengthening of the pelvic floor muscles can also potentially improve sexual sensation or

satisfaction and orgasm potential in some women.

PeriCoach has regulatory clearance for urinary incontinence in Australia and has CE mark and USFDA 510(k) clearance.

PeriCoach also has clearance in Australia, and CE Marking in Europe for the treatment of pelvic organ prolapse, a condition that affects up to 1 in 5 women during their lifetime.
