## QUARTERLY ACTIVITY REPORT AND APPENDIX 4C – NAMOI COTTON LIMITED (ASX: NAM)

Namoi Cotton Limited ('Namoi' or the 'Company') is pleased to provide its Appendix 4C cash flow statement for the quarter ended 31 May 2023 ('Q1-FY24'), along with the following update.

#### **Business activities in the First Quarter (Q1-FY24)**

There was no material change in the business activities of the Company during Q1 – FY24.

The company undertook activities to prepare for the 2023 harvest that commenced earlier than Q1-FY23 due to generally more favourable weather conditions for picking across our network of growers. The Company's Q1-FY24 cashflow includes costs for maintenance, procurement of consumables and staffing in preparation for the 2023 ginning season, together with receipts from customers for byproducts including cottonseed and moss from the 2022 season and the start of ginning services for the 2023 crop.

Net cash outflow from operating activities in Q1-FY24 totalled \$3.5million. Receipts from customers totalled \$111.7million during Q1-FY24, compared to operating costs of \$106.0million for the same period. Staff plus other administration and corporate costs totalled \$8.8 million in Q4-FY23.

Payments to related parties includes a payment to the Kimberly Cotton Company for Namoi's investment in the cotton gin. This payment is in line with our forecast total investment in equity as previously announced to market and is included in payments in investing activities. Payments to related parties also includes director fees and payments for the supply of cotton lint, by-products, and services less the cost of ginning cotton. These payments are included within product manufacturing and operating costs and were made in the ordinary course of business.

#### **Business update**

With good picking conditions around 250,000 bales has been ginned as at the end of May 2023 (prior season was 190,000 bales). Overall cotton quality received to date has been good, supporting improved ginning productivity and lower energy costs compared to the 2022 season.

ABARES (June 2023) is forecasting total cotton production of 5.5 million bales for 2023 season (5.6 million bales for 2022 season) on the back of 21% increased production in Queensland but 13% lower production in NSW. We are expecting a ginning volume of 1.0 to 1.1 million bales given (1.18 million bales in the 2022 season), an increase to the lower side of our previously announced forecast of 0.9 to 1.1 million bales.

This announcement was approved by the Board of Namoi Cotton.

The following secured facilities were in place with Commonwealth Bank of Australia ('CBA') at quarter end:

A term debt facility of \$32.5 million which \$32.5 million is drawn. This is a committed, non-amortising line utilised to fund capital projects relating to the plant, property, and equipment of the business.

A committed borrowing base facility of \$17.5 million of which \$17.5 million was drawn. This is a non-amortising line of credit utilised to fund day to day expenses of the Company including specific funding needs for cotton seed inventory and debtors, ginning consumables, and general working capital needs.

A further uncommitted facility of \$10.0 million, of which \$0 million is drawn.

A trade advance facility of \$5.0 million, not currently utilised.

The term debt facility matures on 30 October 2024 and committed borrowing base facility matures on 30 October 2024.

The weighted average variable interest rate on the Company's interest-bearing loans is currently 5.395% pa with a line fee of 1.23% pa

Equipment loans for gin, packaging and logistics supply chain equipment

totalling \$1.4 million which have an average term of 2.0 years with the average interest rate implicit in the contracts of 5.01% p.a. This facility has an upper limit of \$2.5m of which \$1.1m remains unutilised.

Namoi Cotton Alliance holds an equipment finance facility with De Lage Landen Pty Limited. The facility cap is \$3m of which \$2m is currently utilised. Namoi Cotton Limited is responsible for 51% of the assets and liabilities of this operation and therefore 51% of the facility is included in the figures above.

Additionally, an overdraft facility of \$5.0 million with the CBA is also available at an interest rate (currently 7.88%) of which \$nil is utilised.
