Appendix 4C – Quarterly Cash Flow and Activities Report

East 33 Limited (ASX: E33) ("East 33" or "Company") is pleased to provide the following the Appendix 4C, Quarterly Cash flow and Activities Report.

Summary

- The Amended Facility Agreement and an Amended Convertible Note Subscription Agreement with Yumbah Finance Pty Ltd was approved by shareholders at a general meeting
- Amy Knoll was appointed as CFO of the Company
- The company achieved solid operational outcomes despite widespread estuary closures
- The business looks forward to continued improvement of its biological assets in FY25 and unlocking value through its strategic plan

Corporate

During the quarter, East 33 held a general meeting of shareholders (**General Meeting**), seeking shareholder approval of the Amended Facility Agreement and an Amended Convertible Note Subscription Agreement with Yumbah Finance Pty Ltd (**Yumbah Finance**) (refer to the Notice of Meeting lodged with the ASX on 22 March 2024 for further detail).

Following the successful passing of the resolutions at the General Meeting, East 33 converted \$5.0 million of the Face Value of the Convertible Note held by Yumbah Finance into ordinary shares in East 33. The conversion of the Convertible Note along with the terms of the Amended Facility Agreement provided East 33 with access to \$10.0 million under the Yumbah Finance debt facility, which provided capital for East 33 to both repay the short-term debt of \$5.0 million plus capitalised interest owed to the RCPS holders and delivery of the CEO's strategic plan, as outlined in the last quarter.

Further, the business was proud to announce the appointment of Amy Knoll as the CFO of the business. Amy was promoted from her existing roll as the COO into the CFO role, bringing a wealth of multinational finance experience to the business. Amy's appointment has allowed key elements of East 33's strategy to be implemented and continues to refine the Company's structure and financial processes.

Operational - Distribution (CMB)

The June quarter generally represents a period of reduced activity in the distribution business. Despite this, the business has performed well against challenging prevailing market conditions. Supply dynamics through the quarter were the primary drivers of the challenges, with wide-spread estuary closures restricting volumes of rock oysters available for the market. The distribution business was in part able to leverage internal East 33 supply chains to ensure that core customers were serviced before material closures prevented harvests from East 33 farms. As is seasonally anticipated, Pacific Oysters formed a large part of East 33's winter trading volume providing a consistent product for customers and supporting the distribution business' activity.

Leveraging the quieter period, the distribution business continued to focus on a continuous improvement program across its operations. Core to this is the ongoing maintenance of the business' food safety program which obtained an excellent rating in the previous quarter.

Farming

The quarter saw headwinds for the farming business, which was impacted by the widespread harvest area closures across northern NSW, preventing the business from harvesting anticipated stock volumes from Wallis Lake and Port

Stephens through Q4 FY24. As previously announced to the market, on the 27th of June, this resulted in a diminished ability for the farming business to harvest mature oysters, delaying those sales until FY25.

During the period of estuary closure, focus was shifted to the development of on-water infrastructure and grading of stock. As a result of this activity, farm capacity increases were achieved across Wallis Lake and Port Stephens and novel infrastructure trials commenced to rapidly scale farming operations for future growth.

To continue to build confidence in the farming business' future position, stock forecasting and biological modelling improvements have been a priority of the East 33 leadership team. Improved biological modelling and detailed stock reports were generated through the quarter which will underpin management forecasts going forward.

Forward Looking

The final quarter of FY24 saw the continued delivery of the strategic plan implemented in the previous quarter. The healthy biological asset base and infrastructure investments made through the final quarter have set the business up to take advantage of the strong recovery in harvest profiles for FY25. Further, the oyster profile delivered from the farming business in the final quarter of FY24 is indicative of the higher value, premium oysters management anticipated to be delivered by the business in the coming financial year.

FY24 saw the continued diversification of the revenue base for the distribution business through new market activities and contract processing opportunities, which will be further enhanced in FY25. This activity will be supported by increasing synergies being unlocked through the business' vertical integration and the activation of management's strategic initiatives.

Major cashflow movements

East 33's major cashflow movements for the guarter included:

- Receipts from customers \$5.7m;
- Product manufacturing and operating costs \$4m;
- Staff costs \$2.2m;
- Proceeds from borrowings \$7.5m; and
- Repayment of borrowings \$5.7m.

Payments to related parties

As detailed in item 6.1 of the Appendix 4C, payments to related parties of East 33 and their associates during the quarter were \$90,188 comprising Director fees.

As detailed in item 6.2 of the Appendix 4C, payments to related parties of East 33 and their associates during the quarter were \$89,603 comprising payments to Cameron's of Tasmania for oyster purchases in the usual course of business. Cameron's of Tasmania is an entity owned by Yumbah Aquaculture Ltd.
