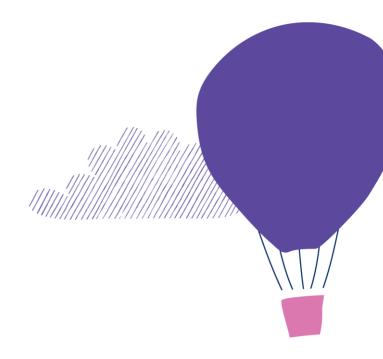

The Directors present their report together with the financial report of Future Generation Global Limited (Future Generation Global or the Company) for the half year ended 30 June 2024.

Principal activity

The principal activity of the Company is investing in global equity fund managers while also investing in organisations promoting wellbeing and preventing mental ill-health in young Australians.

The Company invests its capital with fund managers who have agreed to provide their services for 0.0% management fees and 0.0% performance fees. The pro bono support of these fund managers, as well as the pro bono support of various service providers, allows the Company to invest 1.0% of its average monthly net assets each year in our social impact partners and other not-for-profit organisations with a focus on mental health and wellbeing in young Australians.

There was no change in the nature of the activity of the Company during the period or is likely in the future.

Operating and financial review

For the six-month period ended 30 June 2024, the Company reported an operating profit before tax of \$62.6 million (HY2023: \$69.2 million) and an operating profit after tax of \$44.9 million (HY2023: \$48.8 million). The operating profit is reflective of the investment portfolio performance over the period. In the six months to 30 June 2024, the investment portfolio increased 11.6%* while the MSCI AC World Index (AUD) rose 14.0%.

Global equity markets continued to be led by the strong performance of mega-cap US technology stocks. During the six-month period to 30 June 2024, the performance of the top seven mega-cap stocks collectively rose 40.1% (in AUD terms), which contributed to the MSCI AC World Index (AUD) increasing 14.0%, while the MSCI World SMID Cap Index (in AUD terms) rose 4.8%.

The Future Generation Global Investment Committee and our 15 leading global fund managers continue to believe that a disciplined investment process focused on fundamentals, earnings growth and valuation will derive outsized returns for shareholders over the long term and enable the Company to meet its investment objectives. This has resulted in the investment portfolio having a small to mid-cap bias and underweight exposure to mega-cap companies. During the six months to 30 June 2024, Future Generation Global partially redeemed its holding in Ellerston Global Small Mid Cap Fund (\$12.5 million), Lanyon Investment Fund (\$10.0 million) and Morphic Ethical Equities Fund (\$1.2 million).

The Future Generation Global investment portfolio has been structured to provide diversification between three broad equity strategies: long equities, absolute bias and quantitative, with the remainder held in cash. As at 30 June 2024, the portfolio was 60.0% long equities, 27.7% absolute bias, 10.0% quantitative and 2.3% cash.

Investment portfolio performance is before expenses, fees and taxes to compare to the relevant indexes which are also before expenses, fees and taxes.

For the half year ended 30 June 2024

The operating profit for the period includes the distribution income received from underlying fund managers, in addition to the unrealised gains and losses arising as a result of the changes in the market value of the investments held with the underlying fund managers. The level of distribution income received and the movement in the market value of the investments can add to or reduce operating profit in each period respectively. This treatment under the Accounting Standards can cause large variations in reported operating profits between periods.

The operating profit or loss for each financial period is reflective of the underlying investment portfolio performance and is important to understand within the context of the overall performance of equity markets in any given period. Given the potential variability, we believe the more appropriate measures of the financial results for the period are the investment portfolio performance, the change in net tangible assets (NTA) and fully franked dividends, together with total shareholder return (TSR).

Investment portfolio performance

Investment portfolio performance measures the growth of the underlying portfolio of equities and cash before expenses, fees and taxes. The MSCI AC World Index (AUD) is also measured before expenses, fees and taxes.

In the six months to 30 June 2024, the investment portfolio increased 11.6%. Global equity markets continued to be led by the strong performance of mega-cap US technology stocks. During the six-month period to 30 June 2024, the performance of the top seven mega-cap stocks collectively rose 40.1% (in AUD terms), which contributed to the MSCI AC World Index (AUD) increasing 14.0%, while the MSCI World SMID Cap Index (in AUD terms) rose 4.8%. Since inception, the investment portfolio has increased 8.7% per annum, while the Index rose 11.2% per annum. This investment portfolio performance has been achieved with less volatility, 9.9% versus the Index's 10.7%.

Net tangible asset growth

NTA growth is the change in value of the Company's assets, less liabilities and costs (including tax, social investment and other company related expenses). The NTA represents the realisable value of the Company and is provided to shareholders and announced to the ASX each month.

Future Generation Global's pre-tax NTA increased 11.1% in the six months to 30 June 2024, including the 3.6 cents per share FY2023 fully franked final dividend paid to shareholders during the period and corporate tax paid of 2.8 cents per share or 2.1%. The franking credits attached to corporate tax payments are available for distribution to shareholders through fully franked dividends. Items contributing to the difference between the investment portfolio performance of 11.6%* and the NTA performance of 11.1% was the social investment accrual of 0.5% (1.0% per annum).

The NTA before tax as at 30 June 2024 was \$1.52 per share (December 2023: \$1.43). The NTA after tax was \$1.45 per share (December 2023: \$1.38). These figures are after the 3.6 cents per share FY2023 fully franked final dividend paid to shareholders during the period.

Total shareholder return

TSR measures the tangible value shareholders gain from share price growth and dividends paid over the period, before and after the value of any franking credits distributed to shareholders through fully franked dividends.

The TSR for the six-month period was 12.7%, or 14.0% when including the value of franking credits. This was driven by the share price increasing from \$1.19 to \$1.305, together with the payment of the 3.6 cents per share in fully franked dividends during the period. Future Generation Global's share price discount to NTA narrowed and the Company ended the period trading at a share price discount to NTA of 14.2%, from 16.7% at the start of the period.

Investment portfolio performance is before expenses, fees and taxes to compare to the relevant indexes which are also before expenses, fees and taxes.

*Volatility shows the degree to which the returns of the portfolio move around from their long-run average. It can be thought of as a measure of the risk in the investment portfolio. Volatility is measured by standard deviation, a statistical measurement.

Dividends

The Board declared an increased fully franked interim dividend of 3.7 cents per share to be paid on 30 October 2024. The FY2024 fully franked interim dividend provides an annualised fully franked dividend yield of 5.7% and a grossed-up dividend yield of 8.1%, on the 28 June 2024 share price of \$1.305 per share. The current dividend yield is significantly greater than both the average global equity market yield of 2.0%, based on the MSCI World Index dividend yield, and the average US equity market yield of 1.5%, based on the S&P 500 Index dividend yield, as at 31 July 2024.

The Board's decision to increase the fully franked interim dividend was informed by the annualised grossed-up dividend yield of 7.0% on pre-tax NTA and the objective to provide shareholders both capital growth (i.e. movement in the Company's share price) and income (i.e. through franked dividends paid to shareholders on a semi-annual basis) returns. To maintain the annualised grossed-up dividend yield of 7.0%, the investment portfolio would need to increase more than 8% per annum to ensure that the NTA does not decline and shareholders receive a combination of capital and income returns.

Since inception, Future Generation Global has paid 38.1 cents per share in fully franked dividends to shareholders, including the value of franking credits. At 31 July 2024, the Company had 8.0 years of dividend coverage, based on 59.1 cents per share in the profits reserve, before the payment of the fully franked interim dividend of 3.7 cents per share.

Fund managers and service providers

Through their investment in Future Generation Global, shareholders gain unprecedented access to leading global equity fund managers and make a significant contribution to the mental health and wellbeing of young Australians. This is made possible by our leading global fund managers forgoing management and performance fees. The Board of Directors, the Investment Committee and most service providers also work on a pro bono basis.

We would like to thank our fund managers and service providers for their outstanding and continued generosity throughout the period. The value of the management and performance fees forgone by the fund managers for the half year period ended 30 June 2024 totalled \$3.6 million (June 2023: \$3.3 million) and the estimated value of the service providers working for the Company on a pro bono basis totalled \$1.0 million (June 2023: \$0.9 million). Currently we estimate the value of this pro bono support to be approximately \$9.2 million per annum, and at 1.6% of the net assets of the Company, these savings to shareholders far exceed the annual 1.0% investment to our social impact partners.

The Future Generation Global Board would like to thank Frank Casarotti for his exceptional service and contribution to the Company as a valued member of the Board of Directors since the Company was founded in 2015, and congratulate him on a remarkable 40 year career in the financial services industry.

Social impact update

The Company will deliver its ninth annual social investment by the end of the year. The social investment of \$5.9 million will be made to organisations with a focus of youth mental health and wellbeing, bringing the total investment since inception to \$43.9 million. This investment will be made to Future Generation Global's social impact partners and other not-for-profit organisations, making the Company one of the biggest private funders in youth mental health.

At Future Generation Global, we have a bold ambition to understand the combined impact of the work undertaken by our 14 not-for-profit partners on the mental health and wellbeing of young Australians. This is a challenging and emergent pursuit. It may well mark the first time an Australian philanthropic group and its grantees have attempted to measure impact at this level.

Grossed-up dividend yield includes the value of franking credits and is based on a tax rate of 30.0%.

With the release of our groundbreaking Impact Report, we have begun to bring this ambition to reality. This award-winning initiative reveals that, in our first year, Future Generation Global's partners had 5,533,459 young participants – across every state and territory – in programs and services that safeguard wellbeing and prevent the onset of mental ill-health.

As a large private funder of youth mental health, we believe it is incumbent on us to be transparent and accountable to our shareholders about the impact of our giving. We were delighted to be awarded the 2024 Philanthropy Australia Collaboration Award for this work, alongside our impact partners; Social Outcomes, which developed our Impact Measurement Framework; and Seer Data & Analytics, which operationalises it on their platform.

Our sincere thanks go to our partners for their dedication to this ambitious initiative and for their relentless pursuit of mental health and wellbeing for all young Australians.

After balance sheet date events

Since the end of the period, the Company has declared a fully franked interim dividend of 3.7 cents per share to be paid on 30 October 2024.

No other matters or circumstances have occurred subsequent to period end that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect, the operations of the Company, the results of those operations or the state of affairs of the Company in subsequent financial periods.

1. Material accounting policies

These interim financial statements and notes for the half year represent those of Future Generation Global Limited (Future Generation Global or the Company).

The half year financial report was authorised for issue on 30 August 2024 by the Board of Directors.

Basis of preparation

These interim financial statements for the half year reporting period ended 30 June 2024 are general purpose financial statements and have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001*, Australian Accounting Standard AASB 134 *Interim Financial Reporting*, Australian Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. The interim financial statements of the Company also comply with IAS 34 *Interim Financial Reporting* as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB).

These interim financial statements do not include all the notes of the type normally included in an annual financial report. Accordingly, this report is to be read in conjunction with the Annual Financial Report for the year ended 31 December 2023 and any public announcements made by the Company during the interim reporting period in accordance with the continuous disclosure requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001*.

Except for cash flow information, the interim financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected assets, financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

In accordance with ASIC Corporations (rounding in Financial/Directors' reports) Instrument 2016/191, the amounts in the Financial Report have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars, or in certain cases, the nearest dollar, unless otherwise stated.

The accounting policies applied for the period are consistent with those in the most recent annual financial statements.

2. Investment income from ordinary activities

As at 30 June 2024, the investment portfolio was made up of 15 leading global equity fund managers with investments in 14 unlisted unit trusts and one direct listed investment company.

Where available, the Company has invested in unit classes that have zero management and performance fees. The unit trusts with a zero fee unit class are the Caledonia Global Fund, Plato Global Alpha Fund and Vinva International Equity Fund. The aggregated value of management and performance fees forgone by the unit trusts with a zero fee unit class for the six months ended 30 June 2024 was \$0.9 million (June 2023: \$0.7 million).

The remaining investments are made in unlisted unit trusts with global equity fund managers that normally charge management and performance fees. These fund managers have rebated the fees charged. The aggregate value of management and performance fees rebated to the Company was \$2.8 million for the six months ended 30 June 2024 (June 2023: \$2.6 million).

The estimated value of the other pro bono services provided to the Company for the six months ended 30 June 2024, including the Board and Investment Committee working on a pro bono basis, totalled \$1.0 million (June 2023: \$0.9 million).

3. Social investment

The Company invests a percentage of its assets each year in organisations with a focus on preventing mental ill-health in young Australians. The investment is accrued monthly and is equal to 1.0% per annum of the Company's average monthly net tangible assets. All social investments are made to organisations with deductible gift recipient (DGR) status. The social investment represents a tax deduction for the Company.

For the six months ended 30 June 2024, the amount recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income was \$3.1 million (June 2023: \$2.8 million).

As at 30 June 2024, the 12 month accrued commitment is \$5.9 million (June 2023: \$5.4 million). The Company will pay its ninth annual investment by the end of the year.
