# Quarter Highlights from the CEO



- Cash receipts from customers up 17% quarter-on-quarter to \$3.786M, due to the addition
  of sales from Concrete Playground and increased sales from Vampr
- Significant reduction in operating cash outflow to \$1.758M, a 47% improvement on the March quarter, driven by a trending mix towards higher margin media deals and improved receivables collections
- Closing cash balance of \$1.796M with \$1.6M of excess working capital release expected and \$1.5M credit facility secured from Songtradr
- Strong annual growth trajectory, with annualised cash receipts up 184% to \$14.31M, reflecting both organic and acquisition growth
- Targeting cash-flow breakeven in Q2 FY26 via consistent revenue growth, operating
  efficiencies, and a reduction in one-off costs

#### **Delivering on a Multi-Year Strategy**

In FY24, we set out to tell a revenue story. In FY25, we focused on growth through acquisitions. As we head into FY26 our narrative attention has switched to one of scalable profitability. Three years, three repeatable stories, one unified strategy.

Across the past two years, our business has changed shape. What began as a fast-scaling music-tech platform has matured into a diversified, multi-division media, music and technology Group. Our operational footprint, revenue base, and customer reach have expanded significantly.

#### Cash Receipts and Growth Trajectory

Since the current management team got started in June 2023, Vinyl Group's quarterly cash receipts have increased from a starting base of \$58,000 to \$3,786,000, representing a 59% compound *quarterly* growth rate (CQGR) across nine full quarters. Over that time, receipts have grown by a multiple of 65x.

This growth has not followed a straight line. Quarterly performance has fluctuated as expected while scaling and accounting for seasonality, but the broader trend remains clear. For example, the March 2025 quarter recorded \$3.24M in receipts, representing a 39% reduction from the December 2024 holiday peak, however a 91% increase on the prior corresponding period (March 2024: \$1.69M).

When viewed on a trailing 12-month basis, the trajectory of cash receipts is more stable:

- FY24 (Jul 2023 Jun 2024): \$5.04M
- FY25 (Jul 2024 Jun 2025): \$14.31M
- Year-on-year increase: +184%

These results reflect execution across multiple business units and a scaling go-to-market capability. We remain focused on sustainable growth, operating leverage, and disciplined capital allocation while progressing toward sustained cash flow positivity.

#### FY26 Strategic Outlook

Earlier this month we released our **FY26 Vision** presentation, which outlines Vinyl Group's medium-term strategy and unifying ambition across the portfolio.

The presentation articulates a clear three-year arc:

- FY24: revenue proving monetisation across business lines
- FY25: growth consolidating that revenue and acquiring scale
- FY26: profitability optimising margins and establishing sustainable cashflow

We are focused on accelerating operating leverage, consolidating our recent acquisitions, and embedding Al-driven efficiencies across the Group.

### Path to Profitability

With FY26 now underway, we are focused on demonstrating a clear and credible path to breakeven. Our internal modelling shows this is achievable by Q2 of this financial year, with operational breakeven expected once revenue consolidates in the \$25M range on an annual basis.

We are taking decisive steps to improve cash generation. Gross margin is modelled at 57% based on current trajectory, and incremental cost reductions already implemented across staffing, service providers, and platform infrastructure will reduce quarterly outflows by over \$365K.

Taken together, these inputs support a Q2 FY26 breakeven scenario.

Our Q1 FY26 target is to generate cash receipts above \$4.5M, demonstrating progress toward that outcome and reaffirming the sustainability of the Group's growth model. This will yield a modest improvement in our operating cash flow in Q1, partially offset by annual costs such as listing and audit fees that occur in Q1, alongside final costs incurred as part of the cost savings program executed throughout the calendar year.

# Summary of Cash Position and Expenditure

#### Financial Position as of 30 June 2025:

- Cash and cash equivalents: \$1.796 million
- \$1.5M line of credit facility secured from Songtradr
- Excess working capital of \$1.6M of receivables over payables

#### **Overall Operating Cash Flow Details:**

- Operating net cash burn: \$1.758 million, a 47% improvement from the previous quarter's \$3.343 million
- The overall **net cash burn quarter-over-quarter decreased** due to collections received from sales made in the prior quarter, and the following initiatives to generate strong margin growth:
  - Optimised mix of commercial media deals, including the removal of low margin deals from the pipeline
  - Improved margins across tech platforms from cost saving initiatives, with a particular focus on platform costs
  - Shift in advertising costs from general to customer projects
  - Reduction in general admin costs

#### **Quarterly Cash Flow Analysis:**

- Cash from customers increased by \$550K to \$3.786M, an increase of 17% due to:
  - The addition of the Concrete Playground sales to the total for Vinyl Media;
  - Increased sales in our Vampr platform from feature release and marketing spend; and
- Increase in staff costs of \$648K via the integration of additional staff from Concrete Playground.
- Decrease in product and platform operating costs of \$680K from improved media sales mix during the quarter in the media and as well as overall cost reductions in our tech platforms.
- Increase in research and development costs of \$31K for platform cost reductions in Jaxsta and Serenade, as well as the Vampr Collabs release.
- One-off increase in office space costs of \$34K for the quarter from the Concrete office lease that finished during the quarter
- Decrease in sales and marketing costs of \$274K due to the shift in campaigns and more focus customer driven advertising spend during the quarter.
- Decrease in general and administrative costs by \$971K mostly due to a reduction in spend.

#### **Working Capital and Related Party Payments**

During the quarter, the business funded its operating activities from its working capital reserves.

The Company had no payment to its related parties comprising salaries, directors' fees, reimbursable expense payment to directors including executives who were directors during the past six months, except salaries to the executive director of \$72,476. No payments were made to associates of any related parties.

Vinyl Group funds its insurance policies through Principle Finance Pty Ltd, who charges a flat rate of 6.30% and secure the loan against the rights in the policy. Interest and principal are repaid in monthly instalments. At 30 June 2025, the loan facility derived from the insurance policies was \$78,025.

The Company entered into a Line of Credit arrangement with Songtradr Inc. for \$1,500,000. The unsecured facility carries an interest rate of RBA+5%, and the facility has a two year term through July 2027. It is interest only with the principal due at the end of the term unless it is repaid earlier at the Company's discretion.

The Company has credit card facilities in the amount of \$143,000 with Commonwealth Bank and Bank of America at rates from 14.55% to 16.49%.

Answer: No, we acquired Concrete Playground as of 1March 2025, and have completed the integration and combined plans for the entity during the quarter. We had some redundancies throughout the

Group and have reduced certain services which will start reflecting in the results for the September quarter. We are also entering the seasonal peak for most of our businesses in the July to December period, expecting an increase in revenue and associated cash flows.

2. Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?

Answer: Yes, the Company entered into a Line of Credit arrangement for \$1.5M to provide additional cash as needed between now and December as it increases revenues and decreases costs.

3. Does the entity expect to be able to continue its operations and to meet its business objectives and, if so, on what basis?

Answer: Yes, the additional line of credit provides a flexible source of cash flow as the company moves to its breakeven target by December 2025. The Company has an additional \$1.6M in working capital at the end of the quarter as it continues increasing its sales and decreasing its operating costs. The Company has prepared a plan to adjust throughout the first half to stay on track to its goal.
