## APPENDIX 4C QUARTERLY CASH FLOW REPORT

- \$1.2m cash receipts including \$0.6 million receipts from customers (up from \$60k in the previous corresponding period)
- Cash on hand of \$1.1 million at end of quarter
- Net operating cash outflow \$0.8m
- Short term finance facilities established

Vivid Technology Limited (ASX: VIV) attaches its Appendix 4C (cash flow report) for the quarter ended 31 March 2017.

Cash receipts of \$1.2m included \$0.6 million (compared to \$60k in the previous corresponding period) representing a continuation of the company's customer acquisition model of "trial-review-rollout-scale" for its locally developed smart lighting systems. A further \$0.6m was also received in relation to the research and development tax incentive.

Net operating cash outflows were \$0.8m, with \$1.1m cash on hand at the end of the quarter.

During the quarter, the Company repaid \$0.4m of borrowings, and established two short-term financing facilities: a \$0.2m bank overdraft facility, and a short-term \$0.75m loan facility. The addition of these financing facilities represents an expansion in the Company's available sources of capital, in line with its expanding customer base and market penetration.

Subsequent to the end of the quarter, Vivid Industrial (a wholly-owned subsidiary) was recognised and selected as one of Westpac's inaugural 200 Businesses of Tomorrow, which acknowledges the entrepreneurial spirit of Australian companies who are determined to make a difference to Australia's future.

It has also recently been appointed as preferred supplier to Coca-Cola Amatil, one of Asia-Pacific's leading beverage manufacturers and distributors, to provide intelligent lighting solutions to warehouses and production facilities.

Commercialisation activities at NewCO2Fuels continue to make progress, including in respect of the upcoming commercialisation agreement with Sinopec Engineering (Group) Co

Ltd. We anticipate further progress in this regard in the near term, whilst further partnership opportunities across Europe also continue to progress.

The order book at the end of the quarter included orders from blue chip customers in Australia and overseas in the FMCG, logistics and facilities management sectors.

Vivid Technology's Managing Director Samuel Marks said:

"Over the last quarter, we have continued to demonstrate the company's compelling product and service energy savings to customers in both domestic and international markets.

"As the cost of energy continues to increase and directly impacts customers' profitability, Vivid Technology is able to assist in mitigating these increasing costs, resulting in repeat business from customers both domestic and internationally.

"Over the last quarter, we have secured orders from customers across retail, facilities management, and logistics, and continuing orders from large international customers.

We also established finance facilities to assist the company to seize customer opportunities as it expands further in the marketplace."

Vivid Technology looks forward to updating shareholders on a range of other new opportunities currently underway both domestically and internationally in the near future.
