

Company Update

Australian internet of things (IoT) and healthcare technology company, Oakridge International Limited (ASX: OAK) (“Oakridge” or the “Company”) is pleased to provide the following business update alongside its Appendix 4C Quarterly Cash Flow Report for the quarter ended 31 March 2022 (the “Period”).

During the Period, the Company:

- Continued to focus on increasing its healthcare sales activities, the delivery of customer projects and product development to further enhance our existing product offerings.
- Amended the maturity date of a Convertible Note Deed previously entered into to the 15th of June 2022.
- Established and closed a Small Holding Share Sale Facility to assist shareholders holding Unmarketable Parcels of Shares to sell their Shares in a cost-effective manner.
- Received a notification of intent to develop the Sokoria Geothermal Project from KS Orka resulting in a payment being received of US\$147,939.

Due to the pandemic’s adverse effect on our current business growth and earnings, the Company is seeking to expand its business and revenue base by exploring other emerging business in the technology sector focusing in on renewable energy, new energy vehicles and digital assets – specifically non-fungible assets. These activities are at an exploratory stage which may require shareholders and/or regulatory approval but there is no guarantee that the Company will enter any of these sectors. We shall keep the shareholders and the market informed if we decide to pursue any new such business or opportunity, if at all. The IoT and Healthcare sectors remain the focus of the Company.

During the Period, related party payments of \$54,498 relate to Director and Executive Officer fees.

Healthcare Business

JCT Healthcare (“JCT”), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Company, is a provider of innovative technology solutions for the healthcare sector. JCT develops and distributes its own range of nurse call hardware and software solutions for use across multiple healthcare sectors including hospitals, aged care, disability care and supported independent living.

The strict COVID-19 protocols that JCT experienced during the last quarter eased slightly, allowing staff greater movement within healthcare facilities throughout the country. Consequently, there was an increase in travel with a particular focus on meeting existing and prospective new customers in New South Wales, Victoria and ACT.

JCT attended the 2022 Australian Healthcare Week (“AHW”) in March to demonstrate the company’s technical capabilities, products and services. This was complimented by the addition of an enhanced expo stand that was well received by clients.

JCT was awarded a project within the South Australian disability sector. The project will showcase JCT’s nurse call and assistive technology solutions. The project is expected to commence in the coming months.

The completion of an independent living project with one of Australia’s leading disability providers in the period resulted in JCT successfully securing another smaller project with the same provider. The elevated interest in assistive technology is consistent with the heightened awareness of JCT’s assistive technology capabilities.

As highlighted in the previous period’s Appendix 4C, a “pilot room” was installed at a major metropolitan hospital to demonstrate the Company’s technical capabilities. The “pilot room” was positively received which resulted in the confirmation of a successful bid to rollout the JCT nurse call system and proprietary TV handsets throughout a ward in the hospital.

JCT continued its diversification of products by partnering with a leading Patient Entertainment System provider. Current and prospective customers, particularly within Acute Care settings and Aged Care environments can now benefit from exciting bedside entertainment options which will complement JCT’s existing product range.

Legacy Issues

All downhole plugging and abandonment work has been completed on the Salamander 1 well. The well site water bore has also been abandoned. Work has commenced on the remediation of the site in consultation with the Landholder. The final step in the remediation process for the Penola geothermal well is due to be completed in the coming quarters. Once completed, a \$100,000 security bond will be returned to the Company.

Others

As announced on 2 January 2020, the Company completed a A\$250,000 share placement (“Placement Agreement”) with Teko International Limited (Teko). On 28 July 2020, the Company held a discussion with Teko in respect to a potential claim asserted by Teko against the Company for allegedly misrepresenting the Company’s unrecorded liabilities, including the Heuresy liability payment previously disclosed, by its then directors. The Board believes that there may be some exposure to the Company in respect to the representations made by the then Board members. If the Company were to be subject to legal action that could be taken by Teko, there could be no assurance as to the outcome or the costs required to defend any such action. The Company will continue to discuss the issue with our legal advisors and negotiate with Teko to seek the most desirable outcome for the Company and its shareholders.
