

Company Update

Australian internet of things (IoT) and healthcare technology company, Oakridge International Limited (ASX: OAK) ("Oakridge" or the "Company") is pleased to provide the following business update alongside its Appendix 4C Quarterly Cash Flow Report for the quarter ended 31 December 2022 (the "Period").

During the Period, the Company:

- Continued to focus on increasing its healthcare sales activities, the delivery of customer projects and product development to further enhance our existing product offerings.
- Continued to engage industry leaders from government departments and private organisations.
- Completed the design and fabrication of the latest versions of the P4000 and D3000 nurse call points.
- Developed a critical duress feature to be used on the Company's 'Nurse Call Management System' ("NUCAMS").
- Neared completion of a large Assistive Technology project with a leading disability accommodation developer.
- Commenced the deployment for a large project for a Victorian aged care provider.

The Company continues to look for opportunities to expand its business and revenue base by exploring other emerging business in the technology sector focusing on renewable energy, energy storage solutions, new energy vehicles and energy saving materials. These activities remain at an exploratory stage which may require shareholders and/or regulatory approval but there is no guarantee that the Company will enter any of these sectors. We shall keep the shareholders and the market informed if we decide to pursue any new such business or opportunity, if at all. The IoT and Healthcare sectors remain the focus of the Company.

During the Period, related party payments of \$63,498 relate to Director and Executive Officer fees.

Healthcare Business

JCT Healthcare ("JCT"), a wholly owned subsidiary of the Company, is a provider of innovative technology solutions for the healthcare sector. JCT develops and distributes its own range of nurse call hardware and software solutions for use across multiple healthcare sectors including hospitals, aged care, disability care and supported independent living.

JCT worked towards the practical completion of several large projects that feature JCT's nurse call' and 'assistive technology' solutions. Completion of two critical product upgrades were also completed. JCT's strategy to increase awareness through media platforms, sponsorship opportunities, and attendance at healthcare-related events remains a key focus.



JCT was expected to complete a large Assistive Technology project with a leading disability accommodation developer in December 2022, however, delays in building materials pushed completion into the first quarter of the 2023 calendar year. Once completed, JCT will focus on showcasing the project technology and the recently obtained NDIS certification via social media and traditional media platforms.

JCT successfully completed the design and fabrication of the latest versions of the P4000 and D3000 Nurse Call Points. These two products are popular and essential for many JCT clients. Additionally, JCT successfully developed a critical duress feature to be used on JCT's Nurse Call Management System ("NuCAMS") which is widely utilised by JCT clients throughout Australia.

Practical completion of a new company website was nearing completion. The new website, which is expected to be released in early 2023, will better showcase JCT's products, services, and overall capabilities.

The outlook for JCT remains robust and JCT continues to pursue projects through new and existing clients Australia wide.

Others

As announced on 2 January 2020, the Company completed a A\$250,000 share placement ("Placement Agreement") with Teko International Limited (Teko). On 28 July 2020, the Company held a discussion with Teko in respect to a potential claim asserted by Teko against the Company for allegedly misrepresenting the Company's unrecorded liabilities, including the Heuresy liability payment previously disclosed, by its then directors. The Board believes that there may be some exposure to the Company in respect to the representations made by the then Board members. If the Company were to be subject to legal action that could be taken by Teko, there could be no assurance as to the outcome or the costs required to defend any such action. The Company will continue to discuss the issue with our legal advisors and negotiate with Teko to seek the most desirable outcome for the Company and its shareholders.

This announcement has been approved by the Board.
