Quarterly Activities Report

Q4 FY24 headlines:

- Challenging market conditions in key Asian markets will persist for the remainder of the season putting pressure on margins and cashflow;
- Wingara cash position stabilised during March quarter with focus on cost control to continue in current environment;
- Management pursuing transaction opportunities in Agriculture sector

Wingara AG Limited (ASX: WNR), the owner and operator of value-add, mid-stream assets specialising in the processing, storage and marketing of agriculture produce for export markets, is pleased to provide this quarter's activities report alongside its Appendix 4C (Quarterly Cashflow Report) for the three months ended 31 March 2024 (Q4 FY24).

Commenting on Q4 FY24, Wingara's Managing Director and Chief Executive Officer Marcello Diamante said:

"The quarter's performance has largely been in line with expectation being the first quarter where ample hay was available for production throughout the quarter. I'm happy to note that the Epsom site is running well with 2023/24 hay being received, processed and exported.

With the 2023/24 cutting season now complete we have seen above average yields recorded and high-quality export grades being easily sourced. This contrasts with WA where below average yields have been recorded, and SA achieving high yields but relatively poorer quality to Vic/WA. This has resulted in higher-than-expected oaten hay prices in Victoria as processors bid strongly for high quality hay.

Economic activity in our key markets of Japan, China and South Korea in the agricultural space continues to be subdued as plentiful supply of oaten hay in Australia, and Alfalfa/Timothy Hay in America has translated into lower export prices for fodder in all export markets. A weak Yen against the USD and no significant stimulus measures from China will continue to weigh down on export prices this season. Combined with record high prices for domestic oaten hay pressure on profit margins and cash generation will continue for the remainder of the calendar year.

Notwithstanding the above, we are focusing on areas within our control, including ensuring the Epsom site is operating efficiently and by minimising non-core operational expenditure. We have increased our cash position in the March quarter compared to the December quarter however, inventory build up will see cash reserves being utilised in the coming quarters.

Wingara management are actively pursuing market opportunities that suit the Wingara platform."



Commercial activities:

The Epsom site has been processing 2023/24 hay. The business is now seeing the fruits of its investment of time and resources into the site with overall capacity and reliability operating in line with expectations. We continue to focus on opportunities to increase production capacity with minimal or no new capital expenditure.

Financial results:

Receipts from customers and net cash from operating activities were \$2.288 million and a surplus of \$0.556 million respectively for Q4 FY24.

Summary of expenditure for the March 2024 quarter and related party payment include:

- Product manufacturing and operating costs \$0.527 million: this includes payments for inventory processing, shipping, maintenance and equipment hire; and
- Staff costs \$0.523 million: this includes staff costs associated with the production, sales and marketing, maintenance, finance and management of the Company.

Current cash and cash equivalents as at 31 March 2024 sit at \$2.267 million.

In accordance with ASX Listing Rule 4.7C.3, payments to related parties and their associates outlined in the Company's Appendix 4C for the quarter relate to fees and salaries paid to directors.
