

Appendix 4C Quarterly Cash Flow and Market Update

Australian Dairy Nutritionals Group Limited (**AHF** or the **Group**) today lodged its Appendix 4C and provided a review of the Group's progress for the fourth quarter ended 30 June 2024 (**Q4 FY24**).

Quarterly Activity Report (QAR)

Details of Group Business Activities for Q4 FY24

The Group's business activities during Q4 FY24 focussed on dairy farming and nutritional powders manufacturing.

The cash outflows reported relate primarily to:

- dairy farm operating costs including feed and employment costs;
- infant formula production costs including purchase of raw materials, packaging, employment and other associated manufacturing costs; and
- corporate costs in relation to the Group including employment costs, ASX fees, registry fees, and professional fees.

Financial Update

In line with expectations, net cash outflows from operations were \$1.19m for Q4 FY24 (Q3 FY24: \$977k). The Group ended Q4 FY24 with cash holdings of \$6.11m (Q3 FY24: 526k).

During Q4 FY24, \$7.02m was received from the settlement of the Brucknell South Farm sale.

In Q4 FY24 there were no additional drawdowns (Q3 2024: \$1.53m) on the Group's \$3m finance facility with Gippsreal Limited. The Group will repay the total drawn down facility amount of \$1.78m (net of prepaid interest) at the end of August 2024 and the unused facility of \$1.22m will be available to the Group if required post the repayment date.

With a closing cash balance of \$6.11m and total funding available of \$1.22m, we have an estimated 6 quarters of funding available in accordance with Section 8.5 of the attached Appendix 4C.

Directors, being related parties of the Group, were paid remuneration in the amount of \$44k during the June quarter.

Appointment of new Non-Executive Chairman

The Group announced on 3 June 2024 the Mr Peter Nathan was appointed as Non-Executive Chairman.

Peter is an experienced corporate executive with strong financial acumen and pioneer in the infant formula business. He is the former CEO of Asia Pacific for the a2 Milk Company (ASX:A2M) and was instrumental in a2's success, leading its most profitable business segment and delivering exceptional shareholder value and growing revenue from \$7m to \$1.3bn over his 14 year tenure.

Appointment of new Chief Executive Officer

The Group also announced on 18 June 2024 that Mr Mahinthan (Mahi) Sundaranathan was appointed as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) following the resignation of Peter Skene.

Mahi has over 20 years' experience in the dairy industry across the Australian, Chinese and other Asian markets. Mahi's extensive international experience and deep knowledge of the Infant Formula category will strengthen the existing skill set of management and boost capacity to identify, assess and prosecute opportunities.

A focused strategic review to be undertaken in coming weeks and the Board will provide further update to the market in due course.
