DRILLING RESULTS - BINDI COPPER DEPOSIT

Highlights

- Further good RC drilling results from the Bindi Deposit
- Significant intersections:
 - 21CARC011, 32-136m, 104m @ 0.29% Cu

- Results are consistent with the geological model and support work to identify higher grade zones within the shallow area of the resource

Assay results for recently completed reverse circulation (RC) percussion drill holes at the Bindi Copper Deposit have been received. The results continue to show wide zones of mineralisation in the East Limb of the deposit and confirm visual estimates previously reported by the Company (see Caravel Minerals Ltd announcement dated 17 March 2021).

Regarding the results, the Managing Director of Caravel Minerals, Steve Abbott commented:

"Drilling is continuing to improve our geological confidence in resources at the Bindi deposit. These results will be incorporated in a resource estimate update and the higher-grade zones will be a key focus in the current pre-feasibility studies."

Drilling Results

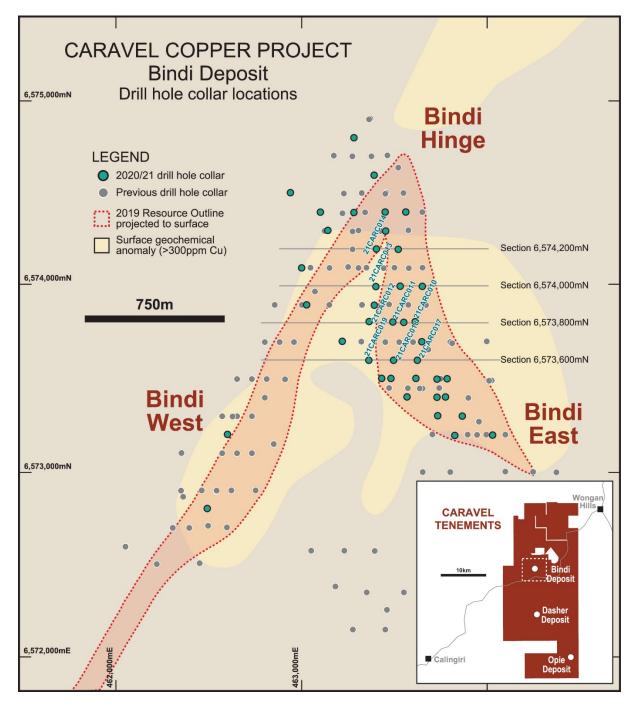


Figure 1: Drilling status plan of the Bindi copper deposit showing the locations of the reported RC percussion drill holes and previous drill collar locations.

The current RC percussion drilling program aims to locate higher grade material and confirm the wide occurrence of copper mineralisation in shallower parts of the Bindi Deposit (Figure 1). Mineralisation at Bindi occurs a zone of narrow stringers and disseminations of copper and molybenum sulphides (chalcopyrite and molybdenite) within a deformed and metamorphosed granite-gneiss host rock.

Assay results have been received for eight recently completed RC percussion drill holes, including 21CARC010 – 21CARC014 and 21CARC017 – 21CARC019 (Table 1). Significant mineralised intersections (greater than 0.15% Cu) from the drill holes are detailed in Table 2. Note that two of the holes were abandoned prior to the target depth due to drilling issues.

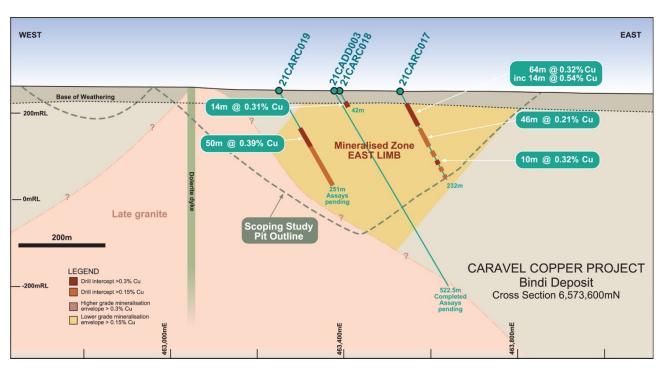


Figure 2: Schematic cross section of the Bindi Deposit (6,573,600mN) showing location of recent diamond (CADD prefix) and RC percussion (CARC prefix) drill hole collars. Hole 21CARC019 is a partial intersection only, results from 150m to EOH are still pending. Hole 21CADD003 was recently completed and assays are not yet available.

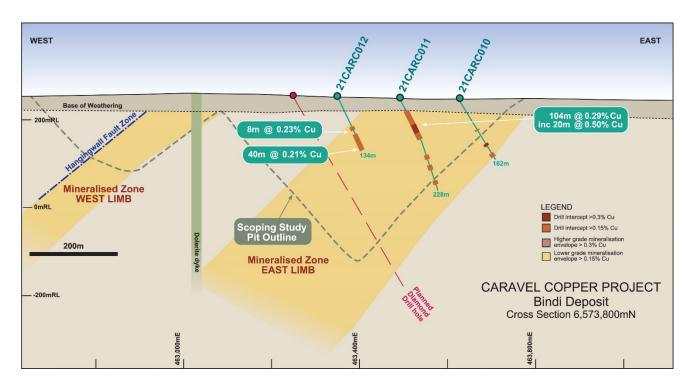


Figure 3: Schematic geological cross section of the Bindi Deposit (6,573,800mN) showing location of recent RC percussion drill holes.

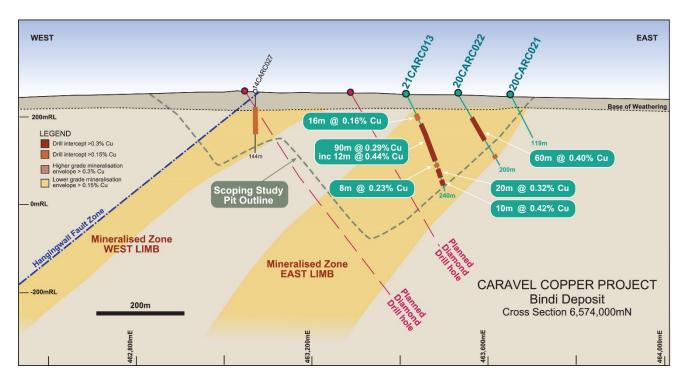


Figure 4: Schematic cross section of the Bindi Deposit (6,574,000mN) showing location of recent RC percussion drill hole collars and historical drilling intersections.

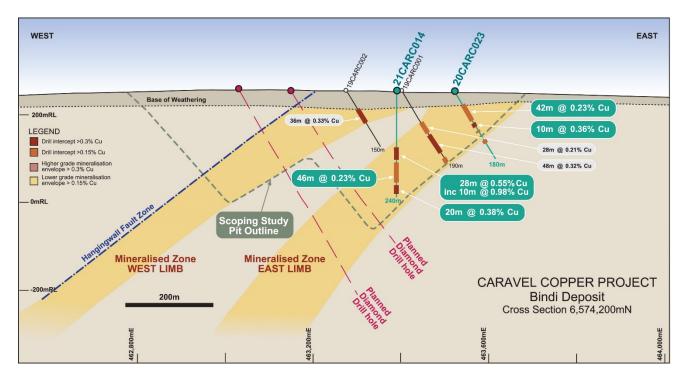


Figure 5: Schematic cross section of the Bindi Deposit (6,574,200mN) showing location of recent RC percussion drill hole collars and historical drilling intersections.

Further Work

RC percussion and diamond drilling programs are continuing at the Bindi deposit to further understand and define the continuity of higher-grade zones within the mineral resource and support the feasibility studies.

Two RC percussion drill rigs and a diamond drill rig are continuing to operate on-site. Further assay results are awaited and will be reported as they become available.

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ABOUT CARAVEL MINERALS

Caravel Minerals is currently engaged in feasibility studies for the development the Caravel Copper Project, a greenfields copper mining and processing project located 150km north-east of Perth in Western Australia's Wheatbelt region. The project is based on an Indicated and Inferred Mineral Resource of 661.9Mt @ 0.28% Cu (at 0.15% Cu cut-off) for a total of 1.86Mt contained copper, making it one of the largest undeveloped copper resources in Western Australia. A Scoping Study completed in 2019 by Caravel Minerals and MSP Engineering demonstrated a strong economic model for the Project and recommended proceeding with more advanced feasibility studies.

Caravel also holds a suite of exploration projects in the prospective South West Yilgarn Terrane and is rapidly advancing an exploration program to test these areas for gold and base metals.
