Danakali Limited (ASX: DNK, **Danakali**, or the **Company**) is pleased to provide this quarterly update on the activities and financial position of the Company and CMSC's Colluli Potash Project located in Eritrea, East Africa. CMSC is progressing to become a leading producer and exporter of Sulphate of Potash (**SOP**), the premium potash fertiliser.

Project Financing & SOP Price Dynamics

- CRU indicative long term outlook for the weighted average netback price to Massawa has increased from US\$668/t last quarter to US\$762/t this quarter.
- The price impact of the conflict between Ukraine and Russia is impacting fertiliser prices globally and CRU considers potash is moving up on its lists of commodities most at risk.
- Strategic investors continue to engage with Danakali and senior lender interest remains at CMSC.

Project & Corporate Update

SOP Pricing

The long-term outlook for the weighted average netback price to Massawa for the target markets of Colluli SOP was established by CRU as US\$762/t. CRU stated in a recent report on the conflict between Ukraine and Russia that potash is moving up its list of commodities most at risk.

FCA NW Euro SOP prices hit US\$1,112/t this quarter with MOP prices in Brazil hitting US\$1,200 for the first time in history. To reiterate the last quarterly report, the current NPV in the Colluli FEED study was based on a long-term SOP price of US\$569/t.

Appointment

Mr Greg MacPherson was appointed as Chief Financial Officer commencing 1 March 2022. Mr MacPherson held the position of Head of Finance for the last year and prior to this role held the position of Financial Controller for the Company since 1 October 2018.

Mr MacPherson has a strong technical finance background and is a qualified Chartered Accountant. He holds a PGDip (Fin), BCom (Hons), BAccS and has extensive experience in the mineral resources sectors across project finance, debt and equity structuring as well as compliance and risk management related to resource projects.

Investment In Joint Venture

During the quarter the company invested an additional A\$1.9M to further develop the project.

Cash

Consolidated cash on hand was A\$19.1M as at 31 March 2022. Please refer to the Appendix 5B for the quarter which estimates that available funding is sufficient for more than 5 quarters.

Securities

As at 31 March 2022, there were a total of 368,334,346 fully paid ordinary shares on issue. There were no shares issued during the quarter.

As at 31 March 2022, there were a total of 12,650,000 unlisted options on issue at various exercise prices and expiry dates. No unlisted options were issued or exercised during the quarter. A total of 2,614,112 unlisted options expired during the quarter.

As at 31 March 2022, there were a total of 360,000 performance rights on issue. No performance rights were issued, converted or lapsed during the quarter.

Related Party Transactions

In accordance with ASX Listing Rule 5.3.5, payments to related parties of the Company and their associates during the quarter totaled A\$0.12m. The Company advises that this relates to Director fees. Refer to the Remuneration Report in the Financial Report for further details on director remuneration.

The 7 Mining Licenses awarded to CMSC span over 60km² of the 100km² Mining Agreement area. There were no mining exploration activities undertaken during the quarter.

About Danakali

Danakali Limited (ASX: DNK) (**Danakali**, or the **Company**) is an ASX-listed potash company focused on the development of the Colluli Sulphate of Potash Project (**Colluli** or the **Project**). The Project is 100% owned by the Colluli Mining Share Company (**CMSC**), a 50:50 joint venture between Danakali and the Eritrean National Mining Corporation (**ENAMCO**).

The Project is located in the Danakil Depression region of Eritrea, East Africa, and is ~75km from the Red Sea coast, making it one of the most accessible potash deposits globally. Mineralisation within the Colluli resource commences at just 16m, making it the world's shallowest known potash deposit. The resource is amenable to open cut mining, which allows higher overall resource recovery to be achieved, is generally safer than underground mining, and is highly advantageous for modular growth.

The Company has completed a Front-End Engineering Design (FEED) for the production of potassium sulphate, otherwise known as Sulphate of Potash or SOP. SOP is a chloride free, specialty fertiliser which carries a substantial price premium relative to the more common potash type; potassium chloride (or MOP). Economic resources for production of SOP are geologically scarce. The unique composition of the Colluli resource favours low energy input, high potassium yield conversion to SOP using commercially proven technology. One of the key advantages of the resource is that the salts are present in solid form (in contrast with production of SOP from brines) which reduces infrastructure costs and substantially reduces the time required to achieve full production capacity.

The resource is favourably positioned to supply the world's fastest growing markets. A binding take-or-pay offtake agreement has been confirmed with EuroChem Trading GmbH (EuroChem) for up to 100% (minimum 87%) of Colluli Module I SOP production.

Development Finance Institutions, Africa Finance Corporation (AFC) and African Export Import Bank (Afreximbank), have obtained formal credit approval to provide CMSC with US\$200M in senior debt finance. The credit documentation was executed in December 2019, allowing drawdown of CMSC senior debt on satisfaction of customary conditions precedent. This represents the majority of funding required for the development and construction of the Colluli.

Project execution has commenced and the Company's vision is to bring Colluli into production using the principles of risk management, resource utilisation and modularity, using the starting module (Module I) as a growth platform to develop the resource to its full potential.
