The independent Directors of the Company are Brett Lambert, Michael Bohm, Liza Carpena and Peter Bewick. The date of appointment for each Director is set out in the Directors' Report in the Company's 2022 Annual Report. Former Managing Director, Mr David Southam was not considered independent as he was engaged in an executive capacity as Managing Director. Following Mr Southam's resignation on 12 August 2022, Mr Brett Lambert was appointed as Interim Executive Chairman until the expected commencement date of incoming Managing Director, Ms Gabrielle Iwanow in November 2022. The Board has considered this role and formed the view that the interim executive role has not compromised Mr Lambert's independence.

The Audit and Risk Committee is currently structured in accordance with Recommendation 4.1. The Company has established a Procedure for the Selection, Appointment and Rotation of its External Auditor which is displayed on the Company's website. The Board is responsible for the initial appointment of the external auditor and the appointment of a new external auditor when any vacancy arises. Candidates for the position of external auditor must demonstrate complete independence from the Company through the engagement period. The Board may otherwise select an external auditor based on criteria relevant to the Company's business and circumstances. The performance of the external auditor is reviewed on an annual basis by the Audit and Risk Committee and the Board. Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu Limited was appointed as the Company's auditors at the Annual General Meeting held in November 2019 and continues to hold this position.
