The Company has a bond and credit card facility financed through Commonwealth Bank of Australia with a limit of \$367,335. This facility is denominated in Australian dollars and is secured against cash deposits of the same amount shown as restricted cash in Item 5.4 of this report. An annual performance bond fee is charged at market rates. No amounts are payable under these facilities, other than the annual fee, unless the consolidated entity does not adhere to the terms of the agreements guaranteed.

The Company's Revolving Credit Facility with BNP Paribas was reduced to \$27.5 million following the first scheduled repayment of \$2.5 million in March 2023. The RCF remains fully drawn. Key terms and conditions are as follows:

Amount	A\$27.5 million
Tenor	March 2024. The term may be extended for a further 18 months.
Interest rate	Based on current markets, the interest rate remains consistent with the Project Finance Facility ¹ .
Mandatory Hedging	In April 2021 ¹ , as required under the Project Finance Facility, the Company completed the mandatory hedge program with the execution of forward contracts for 4,666 nickel tonnes at an average price (after bank margin) of between A\$21,000/t and A\$22,000/t, over the period September 2022 to February 2024. At 31 March 2023, 1,245 nickel tonnes of future production remain hedged under the mandatory hedge program, whilst 2,443 nickel tonnes remain to be cash settled.
