

QUARTERLY REPORT TO 30 SEPTEMBER 2024

During the quarter the Company continued with mineralogical and metallurgical test work to assess the potential benefits of the Kihabe-Nxuu Project with the inclusion of Gallium, Germanium and Vanadium Pentoxide.

High Mineralised / Minimal superficial cover

Of the 40 holes with cumulative 1,711.7m of drilling at the Nxuu Deposit, the average drill hole length is 42.8m to the base of mineralisation. The average Kalahari sand cover is 5.8m, after which the average length of the above low-cut grade Zn/Pb/Ag/V2O5/Ga/Ge mineralised quartz wacke equals 30m. Within the 30m, 25.1m contain Gallium which is more than double the average width of Zinc mineralisation of 12.4m. Within the 30m 11.9m contain Germanium which represents 96% of the zinc widths of mineralisation. Refer to Figures 1, 2 and 3.

Oxide Mineralisation

The Kihabe-Nxuu Project contains both oxide and sulphide mineralisation. The Nxuu Deposit is totally oxidized and the Kihabe Deposit's top $1/3^{rd}$ is oxidized with the bottom 2/3rds being sulphide.

The advantage of having oxide deposits is it is easier and more cost effective to produce metals on site from oxide ores compared to sulphide ores.

Test work conducted to date has shown that at the totally oxidised Nxuu Deposit:

- 93% Zinc metal can be recovered on site from smithsonite, through solvent extraction and electrowinning.
- 84% Vanadium Pentoxide can be recovered on site from gravity separation followed by subjecting the tail to flotation, using hydroximate acid for recovery.
- 82% of Silver is recovered on site from similar deposits.

Mineralogical and Metallurgical Test Work

Preliminary metallurgical test work was undertaken during 2024 as part of an ongoing assessment in the development of a robust process flowsheet for the extraction and recovery of the economic minerals.

The preliminary test work undertaken thus far included:

- Mineral assessment
- Diagnostic leach tests
- Size fraction Analysis

- Heavy media separation
- Flotation test work
- Dual leaching process

Mineral Assessment

A bulk sample was composited from the available Nxuu drill core, after which a mineral assessment was carried out by Panalytical Empyrean XRD and the crystalline phases and abundances determined are shown in the table below:

Diagnostic leach tests

Diagnostic leach tests were conducted on diamond drill core from holes NXDD066A and NXDD073 and NXDD102 at ambient and 40°C. The holes selected from the Nxuu deposit had extensive Ga and Ge mineralisation so as to establish a baseline response of the zinc oxides and micas (Ga/Ge host) in an acid environment.

Size Fraction Analysis and Heavy media separation

Heavy media separation (HMS) tests were undertaken on holes NXDD073 and NXDD102 with a density range of 3.3t/m³, 3.0t/m³ and 2.8t/m³. In addition, analysis by size fraction was also completed on the same holes as the heavy media test work.

The mineralisation within the Nxuu deposit is summarised in the table below, showing the mineral assemblage by density. Preliminary results indicate that physical separation can be attained to some degree by screening and gravity separation.

Flotation Test Work

Pre-float rougher flotation test work was completed to establish the recovery and concentrate parameters for gallium and germanium hosted within the mica (silica minerals). A mica concentrate containing the Ga / Ge minerals will then be subjected to leaching and the dissociated elements in the leach solution can then be recovered as high purity compounds, i.e. GaN or Ga_2O_3

Dual Leaching

A bulk sample was subjected to a dual leaching process. This consisted of an alkaline leach followed by an acid leach. Both leach tests were at a raised temperature and an elevated pressure. This test work is ongoing with further leach tests to be conducted to refine this process.

Ongoing Test Work

Test work is currently being conducted to see to what extent Gallium and Germanium can be recovered on site. Test work so far completed has shown that most of the Gallium and Germanium credits are hosted within micas which are amenable to flotation to produce a high percentage flotation concentrate.

Production of Metals on Site

The ability to produce metals on site will allow for mine gate metal sales, thereby avoiding costs associated with exporting concentrates to smelters for metal recovery. Smelter charges also include surrendering proportional credits for any subsidiary metals produced from the primary metal extraction.

Advantage for Botswana of Metals produced on Site

Once test work has shown Gallium and Germanium can be recovered on site, Botswana will be at the forefront of nations outside of China able to supply what are now classified as critical minerals by the US Geological Survey.

With Vanadium Pentoxide able to be produced on site, Botswana can take advantage of being able to provide supply for the manufacture of VRF batteries. With Botswana being a rural nation with long durations of sunlight, several local VRF battery units could provide storage of solar power for local populations without having to rely upon a central grid storage system.

Potential Contribution of Gallium, Germanium and Vanadium Pentoxide to the Nxuu Deposit

Of the 1,711.7m of drilling a total of **70%** or **1,198.5m** are mineralised (containing Zn/Pb/Ag/V2O5/Ga/Ge) above low-cut grades to the base of mineralisation. **(1,198.5m/1,711.7m to base of mineralisation).**

Low cut grades applied:

- Zn 1%
- Pb 1%
- Ag 10g/t
- V2O5 300ppm
- Ga 10g/t
- Ge 3g/t

The total of 1,198.5m of mineralisation has been included in the Mineral Resource Estimate.

Furthermore, the drill holes intersected **231.9m** of Kalahari sand cover, representing **13.55% (231.9m sand/1,711.7m to base of mineralisation)** of drill hole lengths to base of mineralisation, which is amenable to removal by scraper.

This leaves **1,479.8m (1,711.7m to base of mineralisation – 231.9m Kalahari sand)** of mineralised and below low-cut grade quartz wacke.

Within the **1,479.8m** of quartz wacke **1,198.5m (81%)** contains above low-cut grade Zn/Pb/Ag V2O5/Ga/Ge mineralisation.

Based on the above, the average length of geological units for the 40 vertical drill holes are:

- Depth to base of mineralisation = 42.8m (1,711m/40 holes)
- Kalahari sand cover = 5.8m (231.9m/40 holes)
- Sub-grade quartz wacke = 7.0m (1,479.8m 1,198.5m = 281.3m/40 holes)
- Mineralised quartz wacke = 30m (1,198.5m/40 holes)

The following figures show the potential contribution of Gallium, Germanium and Vanadium Pentoxide in graphical format.

- Figure 1 shows the content of Zinc, Lead and Silver in individual holes based on depths to base of mineralisation.
- Figure 2 shows the content of Gallium in individual holes based on depths to base of mineralisation.
- Figure 3 shows the content of Germanium in individual holes based on depths to base of mineralisation.
- Figure 4 shows the content of Vanadium Pentoxide in individual holes based on depths to base of mineralisation.
- Figure 5 shows the drill hole map.

The order of contribution of above low-cut grade mineralisation of each individual metal within the 1,479.8m of quartz wacke:

- 1. **Ga 1,004.7m** of mineralisation which = **67.89%** of **1,479.8m** of quartz wacke. This is made up of **581.06m** of mineralisation separate from Zn/Pb/Ag + **423.64m** of mineralisation coincident with Zn/Pb/Ag, which = **1,004.7m** of mineralisation.
- 2. **Zn 497.55m** of mineralisation which = **33.62%** of **1,479.8m** of quartz wacke.
- 3. **Ge 473.87m** of mineralisation which = **32.02%** of **1,479.8m** of quartz wacke. This is made up of **131.56m** of mineralisation separate from Zn/Pb/Ag + **342.31m** of mineralisation coincident with Zn/Pb/Ag, which = **473.87m** of mineralisation.
- 4. **V2O5 389.78m** of mineralisation which = **26.34%** of **1,479.8m** of quartz wacke. This is made up of **222.27m** of mineralisation separate from Zn/Pb/Ag + **167.51m** of mineralisation coincident with Zn/Pb/Ag, which = **389.78m** of mineralisation.
- 5. **Pb 243.59m** of mineralisation which = **16.46% of 1,479.8m** of quartz wacke.
- 6. **Ag 170.42m** of mineralisation which = **11.52%** of **1,479.8m** of quartz wacke.

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More Information:

About Mount Burgess Mining

The Company has been developing its polymetallic Kihabe-Nxuu project situated on the Namibian border in Western Ngamiland, Botswana, through its wholly owned subsidiary Mount Burgess (Botswana) Pty Ltd.

The project area is within Prospecting Licence PL43/2016 which covers an area of 1,000 square kilometers.

Originally seen as a sedimentary, exhalative (SEDEX) style Zinc/Copper/Lead/Silver project, recent assaying has included Gallium, Germanium and Vanadium as a consequence of international demand for their supply through their recent growth as modern strategic metals (Ref to uses of Ga/Ge/V2O5).

The Company has submitted an application to extend its title to PL43/2016 for a further two years to 31 December 2026.

Grant of Approval of an Environmental Impact Assessment

On 22 October 2024 the Department of Environmental Protection approved an Environmental Impact Assessment to conduct infill drilling at the Nxuu Deposit. Once complete a Measured/Indicated Mineral Resource can be estimated to quote a Reserve for a Definitive Feasibility Study in order to progress to mine planning and production.

About Vanadium Pentoxide (V₂O₅), Gallium and Germanium

Both Gallium and Germanium are subsidiary metals produced as biproducts from the extraction of primary metals. Gallium is produced from zinc and aluminium bauxite deposits and Germanium is produced from zinc and coal deposits. The extraction of biproducts from these primary metals can only be achieved commercially, if able to be extracted at low cost. Consequently, China is currently the largest producer of Gallium (95%) and Germanium (60%).

<u>Gallium</u>

Gallium, a soft silvery metal with a low melting point of 29.76 deg, has the following modern strategic uses:

- Gallium alloys are used in fibre optics, electronics and nuclear engineering because of their nontoxicity and resistance to nuclear radiation and beta decay.
- Gallium is also used as an alloy for aluminium, copper and tin to create Gallium Arsenide (GaAs), a critical component in semiconductors.
- Gallium Nitride (GaN) is used to convert power into light in light emitting diodes (LEDs). It is also used to power amplifiers, solar cells, military radar, laser technology and satellites.
- Gallium Arsenide (GaAs) chips are used in modern day 5th generation (5G) and 6th generation (6G) base stations, computers, laptops and smart phones to cope with the substantial increase in current internet traffic. Previously used silicon chips overheat with the increase in internet traffic.

Germanium

Germanium has modern strategic uses:

- Alloyed with other metals to create a strong lightweight alloy for use in aircraft construction.
- Germanium oxide (GaO) is used as an infra-red optical material and a catalyst in the production of polyethylene terephthalate (PET). Ge-68 is used in PET scans
- Semiconductors. Taiwan currently produces 92% of the world's most advanced semiconductors.
- Solar panels where Germanium can convert 40% of sunlight into power, compared to 20%, at best when using silicon
- Cameras and microscope lenses
- Aircraft and drones for night vision and night targeting
- Motor vehicle headlights for increased nighttime vision
- Fibre optics to cope with modern high speed internet communication

Analysts predict that by 2030 demand for Germanium will outstrip supply by more than six times

Vanadium Pentoxide

Vanadium Pentoxide (V_2O_5) is used in the manufacture of vanadium redox flow (VRF) batteries used for power storage. VRF batteries can store huge amounts of power over long periods of time. They can be subject to variable high/low power storage levels over short periods of time without impacting on power storage capacity.

Lithium-ion batteries must be kept at constant power storage levels otherwise they deteriorate rapidly.

All Mineral Resources figures reported in the table above represent estimates at November 2022. Mineral Resource estimates are not precise calculations, being dependent on the interpretation of limited information on the location, shape and continuity of the occurrence and on the available sampling results. The totals contained in the above table have been rounded to reflect the relative uncertainty of the estimate. Rounding may cause some computational discrepancies. For example, Inferred MR base metal (2,875,074t) rounds up to 2.9mt and Vanadium (371,857t) rounds up to 0.4mt. However, the two add up to 3,246,931t, which amounts to 3.2mt when rounded down, causing a computational discrepancy.

Mineral Resources are reported in accordance with the Australasian Code for Reporting of Exploration Results, Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves (The Joint Ore Reserves Committee Code – JORC 2012 Edition).

Zinc equivalent grades are estimated based on LME Zn/Pb prices, Kitco Silver Price for Ag, Live Vanadium Price for V2O5, Kitco Strategic Metals Prices for Ge/Ga, as at 21 October 2022 and calculated with the formula:

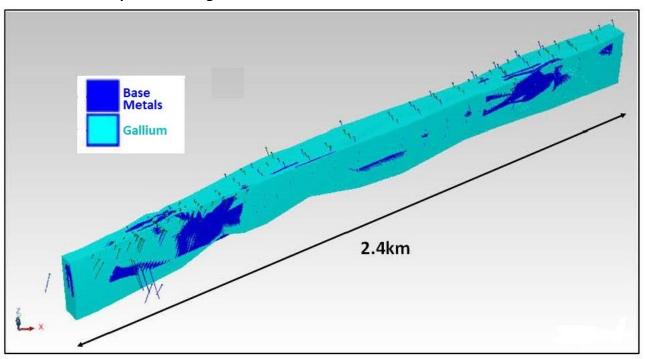

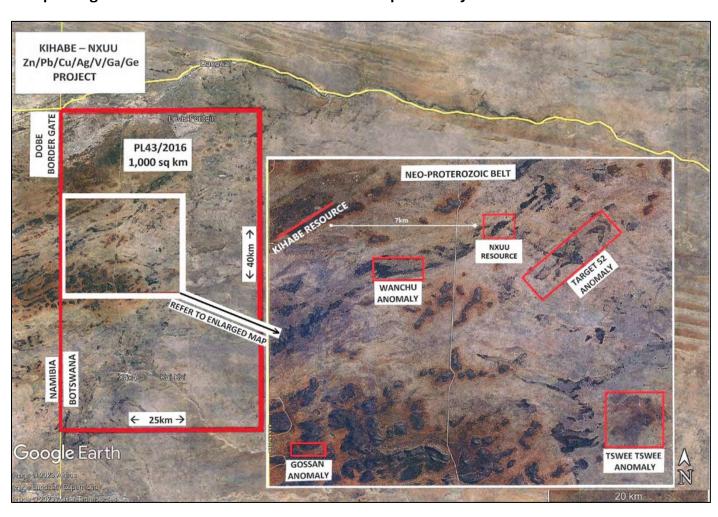

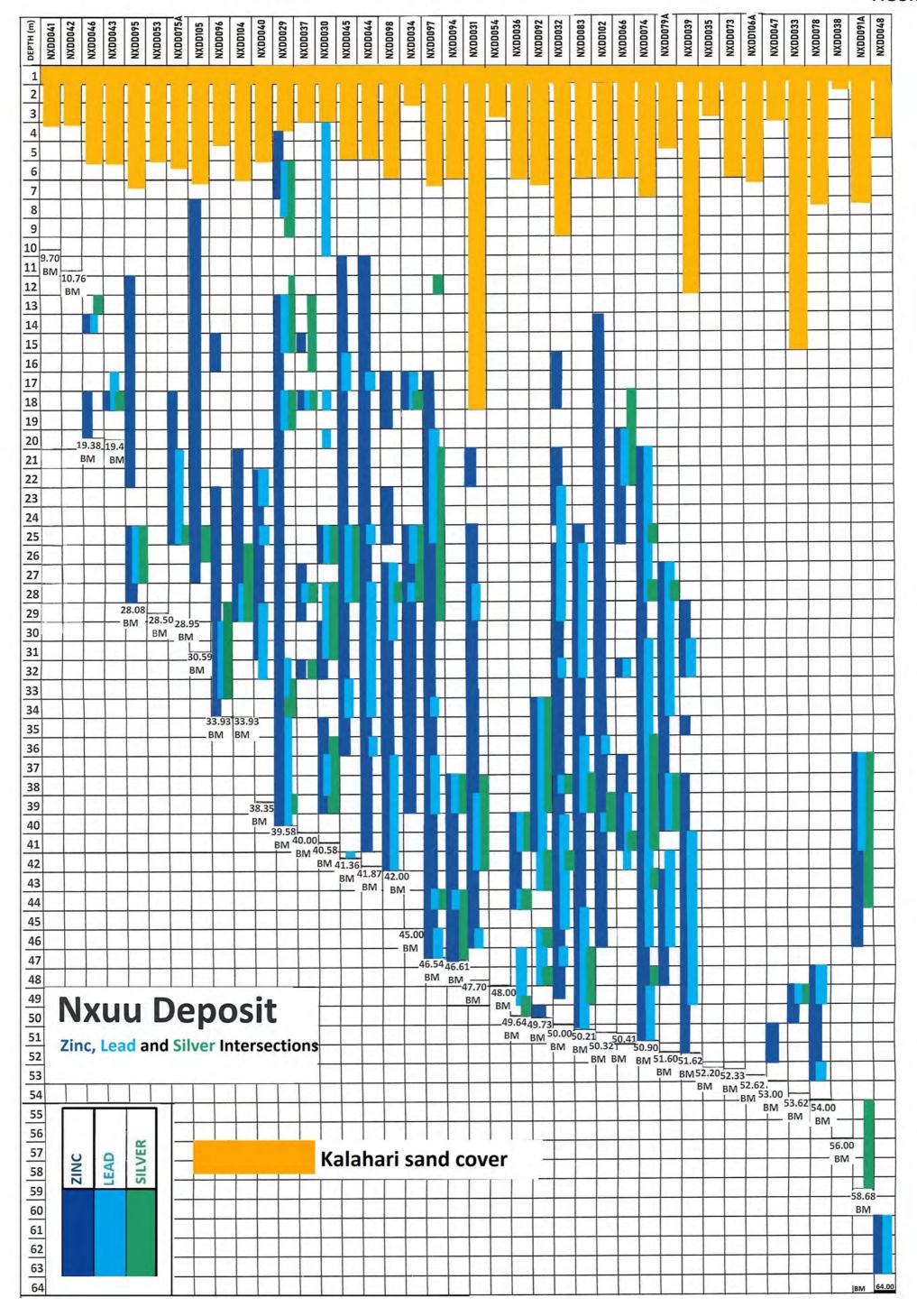
Kihabe Gallium Exploration Target



The Company plans to re-assay existing samples within the deposit area for gallium and germanium as well as additional drill testing.

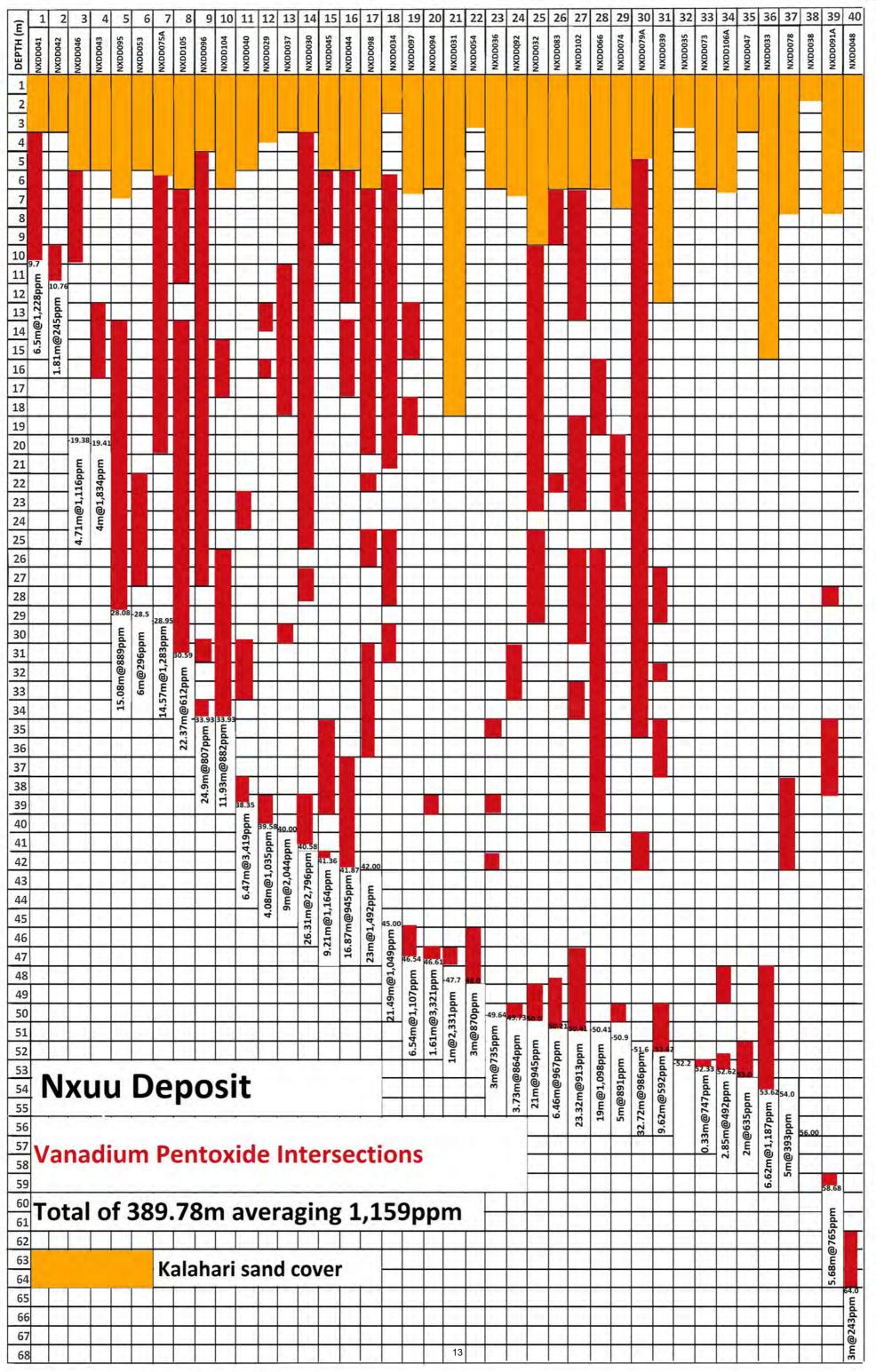

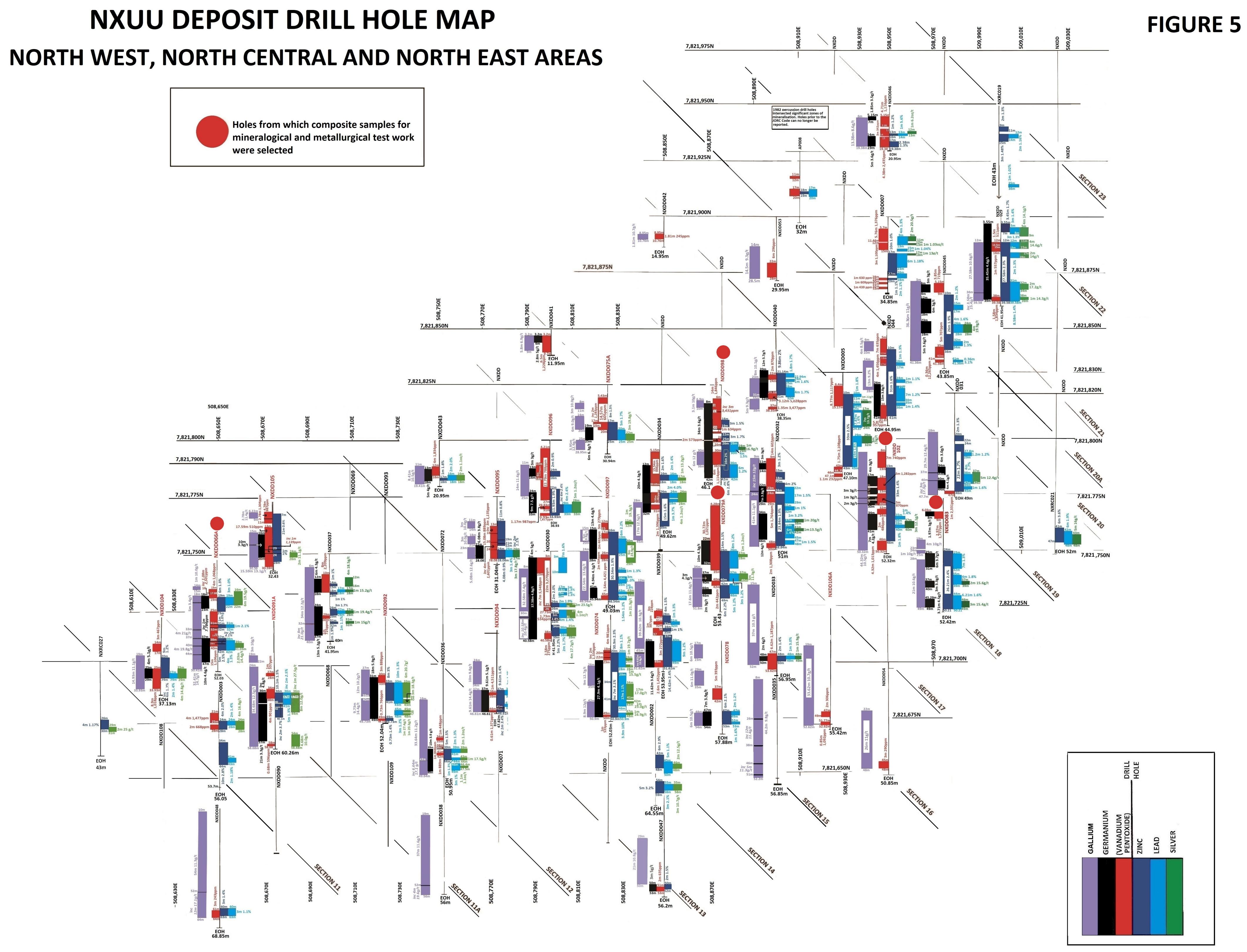

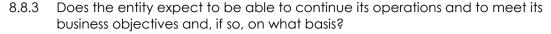
