HIGH GRADE NICKEL-COPPER-COBALT-PGE MINERALISATION AT INVESTIGATORS CONFIRMED BY ASSAYS

HIGHLIGHTS:

- Assay results for drill hole MAD60 at the Investigators Prospect indicate an exceptional intersection of:
 - > 5.3m @ 4.95%Ni, 2.75%Cu, 0.16%Co and 4.55g/t total PGEs from 157.9m which includes
 - 3m @ 6.40%Ni, 3.55%Cu, 0.21%Co and 5.25g/t total PGEs from 159.38m and
 - 0.3m @ 5.93%Ni, 3.54%Cu, 0.20%Co and 4.36g/t total PGEs from 162.9m
- MAD60 confirms a new zone of high grade nickel-copper-cobalt-PGE mineralisation in the central part of the Investigators Prospect
- Untested electromagnetic (EM) conductors have been identified along strike and potentially down dip from MAD60 within a 200m x 175m SAMSON EM anomaly and may represent additional high grade mineralisation
- Assays for other recently completed drill holes at Investigators also confirm six additional intersections of high grade nickel-copper-cobalt-PGE sulphides, including within the eastern section of Investigators within a large 350m x 300m SAMSON EM anomaly
- Additional off-hole downhole EM (DHEM) conductors have been identified by the latest DHEM surveys at Investigators and will be prioritised for testing in the next drill programme for the Mt Alexander Project

DRILLING SUCCESS AT THE INVESTIGATORS PROSPECT

St George Mining Limited (ASX: **SGQ**) ('St George Mining' or 'the Company') is pleased to announce that laboratory assays received to date for the recently completed drill holes at the Investigators Prospect have confirmed multiple intersections of high grade nickel-copper-cobalt-PGE mineralisation over a broad area.

The high powered SAMSON fixed loop EM survey completed earlier this year over the Investigators Prospect identified two large EM anomalies – a total field SAMSON EM anomaly of 350m x 300m in the eastern part of Investigators, and a total field SAMSON EM anomaly of 200m x 175m in the central part of Investigators. A number of EM plates within these SAMSON EM anomalies were tested by the recent diamond drill programme at Mt Alexander.

Drilling results now confirm that each of these large SAMSON EM anomalies hosts high grade nickel-copper sulphides. Importantly, there is strong prospectivity for additional massive sulphide mineralisation within these target areas as the mineralisation intersected to date at Investigators does not fully account for the larger conductive areas of the SAMSON EM anomalies. The continuity of the mineralisation will be tested by further drilling within the large EM anomalies.



St George Mining Executive Chairman, John Prineas said:

"The latest drilling at Investigators has delivered strong results at this underexplored prospect.

"We are particularly excited by the outstanding intersection in MAD60 which represents a new zone of high grade mineralisation in an area that had never been drilled.

"It is also very pleasing to see high grades of copper, cobalt and PGEs along with the high grade nickel sulphide. These additional commodities are likely to deliver significant credits in any potential mining operation at Mt Alexander.

"We are confident that our systematic work at Investigators will continue to deliver exploration success."




Figure 1 – a plan view of the Investigators Prospect showing the large SAMSON total field EM anomaly (in purple) in Channel 18 (44ms) in the eastern and central parts of Investigators. The contours shown are 0.05pT/A which highlight areas of stronger electromagnetic conductivity. Drill holes from the recent programme are shown together with untested SAMSON EM plates and DHEM plates.

Modelling of the SAMSON EM plates and DHEM plates shown in Figure 1 is continuing in conjunction with Newexco. Further details of these EM targets will be provided ahead of the next drill programme at the Mt Alexander Project.

NEW SIGNIFICANT INTERSECTIONS AT INVESTIGATORS

Twelve drill holes to test modelled EM plates were completed at the Investigators Prospect in the recent diamond drill programme at Mt Alexander. Seven of these drill holes intersected massive nickel-copper sulphides that could explain the modelled EM plates. The remaining five drill holes intersected only minor disseminated or blebby sulphides.

Table 1 contains significant intersections from laboratory assays received to date in the recent drilling at Investigators. Assays for drill holes MAD41, MAD42, MAD47, MAD61 and MAD63 at Investigators are pending.

ABOUT THE MT ALEXANDER PROJECT

The Mt Alexander Project is located 120km south-southwest of the Agnew-Wiluna belt which hosts numerous world class nickel deposits. The Project comprises four granted exploration licences – E29/638, E29/548, E29/962 and E29/954.

The Cathedrals, Stricklands and Investigators nickel-copper-cobalt-PGE discoveries are located on E29/638, which is held in joint venture by Western Areas Limited (25%) and St George (75%). St George is the Manager of the Project with Western Areas retaining a 25% non-contributing interest in the Project (in regard to E29/638 only) until there is a decision to mine.




Figure 3 – a map of the Cathedrals Belt (against high resolution Total Magnetic Intensity) showing the multiple intersections of massive nickel-copper-cobalt-PGE sulphides ("\$M") at Investigators, Stricklands and Cathedrals which have established recurrent high grade mineralisation over a strike length of 3.5km. The high resolution magnetic data is set against TMI RTP magnetics from regional GSWA aeromagnetic surveys.
