

# **December 2018 Quarter Update**

## **Activity Highlights:**

- WestStar orderbook stands at \$30M half way through FY2019;
- WestStar's engineering contractor subsidiary SIMPEC Pty Ltd ("SIMPEC")
  was awarded \$18M of contracts in the quarter including its largest to date –
  an \$8M contract with MSP Engineering at the Tianqi Lithium Kwinana
  processing plant;
- SIMPEC working on two **Rio Tinto** projects including a \$4.5M direct engagement at the Cape Lambert Port Facility;
- Prefabricated concrete subsidiary Precast Australia Pty Ltd added more than \$2M in contracts including further work at the Forrestfield-Airport Link Project with the Salini Impregilo - NRW Joint Venture.

## **Corporate Highlights:**

- The Group posted a record \$5.8M in cash receipts banked resulting in a \$1.2M cash flow positive quarter from operating activities;
- Working capital facility of up to \$1M in place to ensure the Group is fully funded to complete newly awarded contracts.

The Directors of **WestStar Industrial Limited** (the "Company", ASX: WSI) are pleased to report on the Company's performance for the quarter ended 31 December 2018. The quarter may prove to be a turning point for the Company with a strong operational result and several large tenders awarded to the Group.

## SIMPEC OPERATIONS

SIMPEC is demonstrably gaining traction in the market. Leveraging a growing portfolio of completed works, SIMPEC added \$18.2M worth of contracts to the Group's order book in the December 2018 quarter alone.

SIMPEC has built a strong working relationship with **MSP Engineering ("MSPE")** which began with SIMPEC's successful ongoing work at the Talison Lithium Mine in Greenbushes, Western Australia.

SIMPEC's involvement in MSPE's world-class work portfolio has been extended with the award of an **\$8M contract (SIMPEC's largest contact award to date) at the Tianqi Lithium** Kwinana processing plant (ASX: 11 December 2018) under construction at Kwinana, Western Australia. SIMPEC will look to continue to build on its relationship with MSPE.

Aside from MSPE, SIMPEC was awarded a contract by international mineral sands company **Iluka Resources Limited** at their Cataby Project in Western Australia. Under the ~\$1.7 million contract, SIMPEC will construct a Flocculant Plant Package consisting of four tanks and related structural, mechanical and piping works.

This is SIMPEC's second award at the Cataby Project having successfully completed a key Mechanical, Electrical and Communications contract in the construction of 2 separate accommodation camp facilities for use by Iluka and Tronox Limited respectively. The Flocculant Plant Package Contract is a direct engagement with Iluka.

SIMPEC was also able to gain a foothold into the substantial work on offer from **Rio Tinto Iron Ore**. Firstly, SIMPEC was awarded a \$4M contract by ATCO Structures and Logistics (ASX: 4 December 2018) in the construction and deconstruction of a 600-room camp at Rio Tinto's West Angelas iron ore mine in the Pilbara region of Western Australia. This award built on the portfolio of camp work packages successfully undertaken by SIMPEC. Following this, SIMPEC was awarded a \$4.5M contract directly by Rio Tinto Iron Ore (ASX: 18 December 2018) at the Cape Lambert Port Facility.

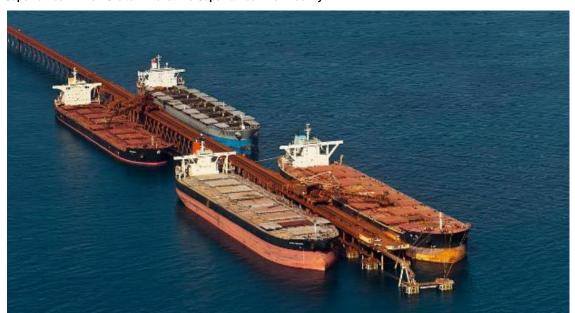


Figure: Cape Lambert A Iron Ore terminal at the Cape Lambert Port Facility

Under the contract, SIMPEC will design and construct a Remote Draft Survey System which will aim to increase ship turnaround and safety at the Port. This award directly with Rio Tinto is a major milestone for SIMPEC and a strong endorsement of SIMPEC as a capable engineering contractor.

SIMPEC expects further significant contracts, which have been tendered for, to be awarded in the coming weeks. The awards to date form an excellent platform for SIMPEC to fulfil much larger contracts with its growing team.

#### PRECAST AUSTRALIA OPERATIONS

During the quarter, the Company announced that Precast Australia was awarded scope extensions totalling \$800k by the **Salini Impregilo – NRW Joint Venture** on the Forrestfield-Airport Link Project (ASX: 14 November 2018).

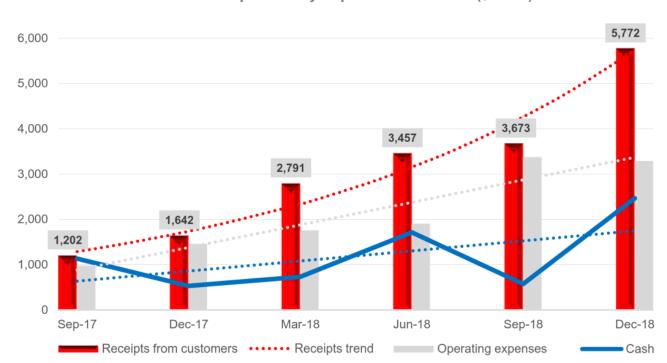
The Forrestfield-Airport Link is one of Western Australia's most transformational public transport projects, consisting of a train line connecting Forrestfield to the city, opening up Perth's eastern suburbs to rail for the first time. Under the scope extensions, Precast Australia will supply precast concrete elements for railway stations and service buildings along the rail line. This work will include supply of precast stairs and precast walls for the railway stations and emergency egress shafts.

Given its involvement to date, Precast Australia is well placed to win further work on this substantial project as overall construction work progresses.

In addition, Precast Australia won a further \$1.3M of contracts largely from repeat clients such as Vaughan Constructions and ADCO Constructions.

#### **COMPANY FINANCIAL OVERVIEW**

During the December 2018 quarter, the Company banked total net cash receipts of ~\$5,772,000 (Q1 FY2019: \$3,673,000), a new historical high for the Company for quarterly cash receipts. At the end of the period, the Company reported a cash balance of \$2,465,000.

SIMPEC's operations returned \$4,640,000 in cash receipts from its multiple projects, materially higher than the \$2.2M banked in the previous quarter. Precast Australia activities were lower than the prior quarter with \$1.1M of receipts banked versus \$1.4M in Q1 FY2019. Overall, receipts are trending up on the back on SIMPEC's increasing activities.

Operating payments for the quarter totalled ~\$3,284,000 (Q1 FY2019: ~\$3,369,000). As noted in the September quarterly report, last quarter the Company made payments to key suppliers with short or zero day credit terms to commence and execute its new contracts. As these substantial payments (~\$610,000) were made in the previous quarter, operating payments made in the December quarter were disproportionately lower.

Group staffing costs were the best indicator of the increased activities at ~\$754,000 (Q1 FY2019: \$631,000) compared to the previous period.

Overall net cash inflow from operating activities for the quarter was \$1,189,000 (Q1 FY2019: outflow of \$864,000). As above this reflects the increase in SIMPEC's activities with higher cash receipts. This result also reflects the lower figure for operating payments due to the upfront payments made last quarter.

On 12 December 2018, the Company announced that it had received firm commitments for an unsecured working capital debt facility of up to \$1M with interest of 10% payable on the drawn balance. As the end of the quarter, the Company had drawn down \$650k.

#### **OUTLOOK**

At WestStar level, the Board continues to identify and assess potential projects and acquisitions complementary to the current business units. Ultimately the Board's focus is to grow the business such that it is a strong prospect for institutional investment.

For SIMPEC, now that a strong order book and client list has been established, the focus will be to execute its contracts efficiently and profitability. While focused on contracts delivery, SIMPEC will position itself to target increased on site scope.

Precast Australia will also be focussed on profitability and looking for opportunities to expand product line and increased on site scope. Precast Australia's pipeline of future work is appealing and the Company looks forward to adding several of these awards to its order book.

Property division Distinct Developments continues to lay the groundwork at its first project, construction of a mixed-use commercial building in West Perth, Western Australia. Development plans and feasibilities are progressing, and regulatory submissions are on track.

Overall, the Company has converted a major portion of its strong contract pipeline onto its order book. Although, the awards have been significant, both SIMPEC and Precast Australia are expected to win further awards based on tendering efforts along with scope extensions on existing contracts. Now that strong revenues are being achieved, the Company will focus on ensuring that its growth is managed effectively and sustainably.
