Q4 FY20 BUSINESS UPDATE

Key highlights:

- During the Quarter the Board and Management undertook a strategic and operational review to determine how to best navigate the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. (Please see ASX Announcement "COVID-19 Business Review and Update 31 July 2020").
- Customer receipts declined significantly as a result of COVID-19 however this was offset by government support received.
- The Company undertook a range of cost reductions initiatives, establishing a reduced underlying operating cost base for the business moving forward.
- The Company maintained its investment in Research and Development to extend the capabilities of the Rewadle Platform and commenced preparing its FY20 R&D rebate submission.
- Secured support of Executive Chairman, Mr Ruwan Weerasooriya to extend the current unsecured, interest free loan of \$500,000 to \$1m.

Commenting on the Company's activities during the Q4 FY20, Rewardle founder and Executive Chairman, Ruwan Weerasooriya, said:

"COVID-19 has created a highly uncertain operating environment that the Company must navigate moving forward. While I am grateful for the government support that has been made available, it is important that we take control our our destiny and I have been delighted with how our team has risen to the challenge."

"While we reviewed our strategy and operations to determine how to best navigate the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic we have been able to implement a number of cost reduction initiatives and continued to invest in research and development to extend the capabilities of the Rewardle Platform."

"As we move forward, I have great confidence in our plan to survive and thrive and look forward to working with our team to drive the business towards cash flow break even before the JobKeeper support is removed."

Quarterly Cash Flow Commentary

Cash receipts from customers for Q4 FY20 were \$85k, a decrease of \$42k or 33% from \$127k for the previous quarter.

During Q4 FY20 government grants and tax incentives of \$104k were received relating to COVID-19 support.

Outgoing cash payments for Q4 FY20 were \$408k, a decrease of \$15k or 3% from \$423k for the previous quarter.

Net cash outflows from operating activities for Q4 FY20 were \$219k, a decrease of \$77k or 26% from \$296k for the previous quarter.

Cash at the end of Q4 FY20 was \$38k.

Cost reduction work undertaken during the quarter will set a lower underlying operating cost base for the business moving forward. In future periods, management expects to realise a reduction of up to 10% across product manufacturing and operating costs and staff costs.

Subsequent to Q4 FY20, Executive Chairman, Mr Ruwan Weerasooriya extended the current unsecured, interest free loan of \$500,000 to \$1 m. The loan is repayable at the Company's discretion when it has capacity.

COVID-1 Business review and update

In response to the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic the Company has reviewed its strategy and operations and developed a plan to navigate the business through this challenging period.

The Board and Management has determined that rebuilding Merchant Services(SaaS) revenue will remain challenging until local businesses return to unrestricted trading and the timing of this return is highly uncertain and out of the Company's control.

While the Company is eligible for State and Federal support, including JobKeeper, which provide some short term support, management expects that the impact of COVID-19 will likely extend beyond these programs and a more robust strategy to survive and thrive is required.

The Board and Management have determined that in the short term, the most prudent path forward is to leverage the Company's infrastructure and expertise to generate fee for service income.

While the amount and timing of services income is uncertain, based on the current activity and opportunity pipeline, the Company is confident that it can broadly achieve cash flow break even operations before the end of the JobKeeper program.

Working capital management

To support the Company's working capital requirements as the revised strategy is implemented, Executive Chairman, Mr Ruwan Weerasooriyas has extended the current unsecured, interest free, working capital loan of up to \$500,000 to \$1m. The loan is repayable at the Company's discretion when it has capacity.

While the Company is clearly operating in challenging times, management is confident that it will have sufficient working capital to meet its budget objectives for FY21 and beyond based upon:

- Ongoing reduction of operating costs
- Generation of technology licensing and professional services income
- Access to State and Federal Government COVID-19 support packages
- Development of corporate partnership opportunities
- Receipt of FY20 R&D rebate
- Access to R&D financing for FY21 activities
- Access to Director loan
- Improvements trading conditions and sales performance across Merchant Services and Brand Partnership revenue streams

The Board is regularly reviewing operating budgets and strategy taking into consideration a variety of commercial and corporate scenarios and opportunities.

During the quarter, Executive Chairman, Mr Ruwan Weerasooriya extended the unsecured, interest free working capital loan facility of \$500,000 to \$561,000. Subsequent to the period, the facility has been extended to \$1m.

Answer:

The Company expects to have negative operating cash flows but expects these to reduce in coming periods as the combination of cost reduction initiatives, government support and the Company's strategy to generate professional service income take effect and advance the Company's operations towards cash flow breakeven.

2. Has the entity taken any steps, or does it propose to take any steps, to raise further cash to fund its operations and, if so, what are those steps and how likely does it believe that they will be successful?

Answer:

The Board continues to believe it is in the best interests of shareholders to balance capital raising options against the operational progress of the business towards consistent cash flow positive operations.

As such, in considering funding requirements and options, the Board is closely monitoring progress of its strategy to supplement existing income streams with the generation of professional services income to achieve cash flow break even operations.

While the Board is primarily considering the Company's existing operations, from time to time the Company receives approaches to recapitalise the business, some in combination with the addition of new complimentary businesses.

The following options have been or are being considered by the Company. The Company is aware of its continuous disclosure requirements and will provide updates if the nature of any discussions with respect to the following options progresses to warranting such disclosure.

1. Recapitalisation/corporate transactions:

As previously outlined, from time to time the Company receives approaches to recapitalise the business, some in combination with the addition of new complimentary businesses.

These discussions remain relatively early stage and exploratory in nature and at this stage the Company considers their nature to be highly speculative.

2. Issue of shares:

The Company may elect to issue shares under the placement capacity approved by Shareholders at the most recent Annual General Meeting.

If a placement was undertaken, given the Company's current market capitalisation and subject to demonstrating the successful execution of its strategy to drive operations towards consistent cash flow break even, the Board believes that it is reasonable to expect broader support from existing shareholders and external parties than the most recent capital raising.

3. FY20 R&D rebate:

The Company's has previously received refunds under the Federal Government's Research and Development (R&D) Tax Incentive program and the receipt of an FY20 R&D refund is a key management assumption with respect to the Company's working capital needs.

The Company is in the process of preparing its FY20 R&D submission and expects to receive the rebate in the range of \$500,000 and \$700,000 prior to 31 October 2020.

4. FY21 R&D financing:

Due to its highly strategic nature, the Company is maintaining its commitment to investing in research and development during FY21.

While R&D expenditure is incurred progressively during the the Financial Year, the refunds from the program are typically received 3-9 months from the end of Financial Year. Due to this timing asymmetry a number of finance providers offer working capital advances against forecast R&D refunds.

As part of its cash flow management strategy the Company has previously used an R&D financing facility from Radium Capital (Radium).

Discussions with the Radium account management team has confirmed that the Company has the option of financing subsequent expenditure if the need arises.

The decision to access further R&D financing from Radium will be made by monitoring cash flow over coming months including consideration of the loan provided by Executive Chairman, Ruwan Weerasooriya, as outlined in point 5 below.

Updates will be provided in the case of the Company entering into formal financing agreements.

5. Director loans

In addition to the points above, Executive Chairman, Ruwan Weerasooriya, has extended the unsecured, interest free loan of up to \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 to support the Company's working capital needs during this challenging time.

Answer:
