Quarterly Activities Report Period ended 30 June 2020

Highlights:

- **Funds from €52 Million Loan Facility secured in March still delayed, and the Company is actively pursuing other alternatives.**
- **Bridging funding of AUD1.2 Million put in place with RiverFort Global GP LLC.**
- **Site activities and ore supply are on hold pending funding along with corona virus pandemic restrictions.**

Gulf Manganese Corporation Limited (ASX: GMC) ("Gulf" or "the Company") is pleased to provide shareholders with its Quarterly Activities Report for the period ended 30 June 2020.

Kupang Smelting Hub Project Overview

Gulf is committed to developing a world-class ferromanganese smelting business in West Timor, Indonesia to produce and sell medium and low carbon ferromanganese alloy.

Gulf's Kupang Smelting Hub facility will contain multiple furnaces built in stages over about five years, targeting the production of a premium quality manganese alloy. At full production, Gulf will aim to purchase and process over 525,000 tonnes of manganese ore per annum, producing over 200,000 tonnes of premium quality ferromanganese alloy. The first stage is two smelters which are currently onsite though the construction program is now halted pending further funding and a full review of the impacts of the current pandemic on future operations.

June Quarter Activity Overview

€52 Million Loan facility to complete Kupang Smelting Hub construction program

As announced on 8th January, Gulf executed a binding term sheet for the establishment of a €52 million Structured Loan Facility ("Loan Facility") with Glacier International Depository Ltd, Legal and General Investment Management Limited and HSBC Bank plc.

The funds were expected to be received in February, but due to a series of delays reported by Glacier, starting with Brexit and now with the Pandemic, funds have continued to be delayed and there is uncertainty with regard concluding the transaction. Consequently, the Company has reviewed its agreement with Glacier and is pursuing other options to ensure the integrity of the Company in the event that the transaction fails.

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Meanwhile, as discussed below, the Company has secured bridging funds to ensure liquidity whilst these other options are pursued, allowing Gulf to complete the construction and commissioning of the first two smelting furnaces at the Kupang Smelting Hub facility in West Timor, Indonesia. As discussed below, Gulf has taken steps to establish bridging funds to cover the delays in receiving the funds from Glacier.

As previously reported, construction of the facility is currently 60% complete, with approximately US\$13 million and a further 6-7 months' work required to complete the first two smelting furnaces. However, with isolation and travel restrictions delays should be expected both with remobilisation and the time to complete.

Corporate Activity Overview

Placement with Acuity Capital

As announced on March 9, 2018, the Company entered into a Controlled Placement Agreement ("CPA") with Acuity Capital. The CPA provides Gulf with up to \$5 million of standby equity capital and was due to expire in December 2019.

During the June Quarter, the Company did not exercise any placements with Acuity Capital, being in voluntary suspension for the period.

To date \$3.14 million has been raised under the CPA with a further \$1.86 million remaining.

Bridging Funds with RiverFort

During the quarter end, Gulf executed a share purchase agreement with RiverFort (SPA) pursuant to which RiverFort agrees to subscribe for A\$1,200,000 worth of fully paid ordinary shares in the Company (Shares), at an issue price of A\$0.004, replacing the previously announced term sheet with Obsidian Capital. Under the terms of the SPA, the Company has also agreed, subject to shareholder approval, to grant to RiverFort 60 million options with an exercise price of A\$0.005 and an expiry date of three years from grant (Options).

In conjunction with the SPA, the Company has entered into an equity sharing agreement with RiverFort (ESA). The ESA is expected to have a term of 12 months, but may be extended or settled earlier depending on ASX monthly market trading volumes of Gulf shares, with RiverFort disbursing monthly payments to the Company which, when aggregated, will equal (subject to any adjustments) A\$1,000,000, being a portion of the amount payable by RiverFort under the SPA. The remainder of the payment of A\$200,000 by RiverFort under the SPA will be made immediately to Gulf and will be used for working capital (Advance).

Selling restrictions and volume limits apply on any share sales by RiverFort and RiverFort may vary the timing and amount of any share sales.

A summary of the material terms of the SPA, ESA and Options is set out in the annexure to the announcement of 31 July 2020, "Gulf Corporate Update: A\$1,200,000 funding facility secured and share placement complete".

In addition, as in the same announcement, the Company has agreed a placement of A\$596,220 worth of Shares to sophisticated investors, also at an issue price of A\$0.004 (Placement) and has issued convertible notes to sophisticated investors to raise a further A\$500,000. Each note is convertible at A\$0.004 with one free attaching option at A\$0.004 cents and a term of two years. The options are subject to shareholder approval at the 2020 Annual General Meeting.

The Shares and Options to be issued to RiverFort under the SPA and the Shares to sophisticated investors pursuant to the Placement will be issued from the Company's available placement capacity under ASX Listing Rule 7.1.

Gulf advises that it has cut operating costs considerably, with measures including a freeze on Board remuneration since last year, reductions in staffing, wages and other costs, and the cessation of travel, both international and domestic. Gulf will continue to operate on this basis for the foreseeable future.

Commenting on the quarter's activities, Gulf's Managing Director, Hamish Bohannan said:

"A frustrating quarter in many regards with the delays to funding caused by major exogenous events. Notwithstanding, the continuing frustrations caused by the current Pandemic, the Company's focus continues to be securing funds to kick-start construction on site and expedite commissioning of the plant.

"As we will soon have the required capital, the Company's focus will be to re-commence construction while simultaneously fast-tracking mining and exploration programs in Indonesia, targeting its high-grade manganese ore deposits.

"I would like to thank our shareholders for their support throughout this process, and we look forward to providing further updates on the Company's operational milestones in the near-term."

As reported in the March 2020 quarterly cash flow, 'PT Gulf Mangan Grup, a subsidiary of Gulf Manganese Corporation Limited, has a remaining A\$5.157 million loan under the stand-by facility with PT Jayatama Global Investindo, a subsidiary of PT JTS. The loan will be repayable from the profits from commercial production of the Kupang Smelting Hub Facility. The loan is secured by a fiduciary charge over the manganese smelters, with 8% interest per annum and has a due date of 30 September 2020'.

This loan of A\$5.157 million loan under the stand-by facility and the matching loan of A\$16.348 million owed to Gulf Manganese Corporation by PT Gulf Mangan Grup reflect the monies paid by the respective companies to support the construction of the Kupang Smelting hub. Gulf Manganese Corporation and PT JTS, who own the project 74.9%:25.1% respectively, both expected the Project to be completed and in production by September 2020. With the challenges created by the Covid-19 Pandemic, this is now most unlikely.

Both amounts (being A\$5.157 million and A\$16.348 million) are owed by PT Gulf Mangan Grup and there is no liability for the amounts to be paid by either parent company. As noted above, the project is now on care and maintenance and both companies are working to secure the value invested in the Project once the restrictions of the Pandemic are relieved. PT Gulf Mangan Grup will be seeking an extension of the loan repayment date.

Gulf Manganese Corporation Limited has obtained has unsecured loans totalling \$1,075,564. The unsecured loans are at zero interest and are repayable at twice their face value upon the receipt of funding to complete project construction.
