3.1 Risk Factors

4. DETAILS OF THE OFFER

4.1 Summary of the Offer

Under this Prospectus, the Company invites investors identified by the Directors to apply for up to 10,000 Shares at an issue price of \$0.01 per Share payable in full on application, to raise up to \$100.

The Offer will only be extended to specific parties on invitation from the Directors. Application Forms will only be provided by the Company to these parties.

All of the Shares offered under this Prospectus will rank equally with Shares on issue at the date of this Prospectus.

The primary purpose of this Prospectus is to remove any trading restrictions that may have attached to Shares issued by the Company prior to the Closing Date.

Relevantly, Section 708A(11) of the Corporations Act provides that a sale offer does not need disclosure to investors if:

- (a) the relevant securities are in a class of securities that are quoted securities of the body; and
- (b) either:

5.3 Financial Effect of the Offer

6. RIGHTS AND LIABILITIES ATTACHING TO SHARES

The following is a summary of the more significant rights and liabilities attaching to Shares to be issued pursuant to this Prospectus. This summary is not exhaustive and does not constitute a definitive statement of the rights and liabilities of Shareholders. To obtain such a statement, persons should seek independent legal advice.

Full details of the rights and liabilities attaching to Shares are set out in the Constitution, a copy of which is available for inspection at the Company's registered office during normal business hours.

6.1 General meetings

Shareholders are entitled to be present in person, or by proxy, attorney or representative to attend and vote at general meetings of the Company.

Shareholders may requisition meetings in accordance with section 249D of the Corporations Act and the Constitution of the Company.

6.2 Voting rights

Subject to any rights or restrictions for the time being attached to any class or classes of shares, at general meetings of shareholders or classes of shareholders:

- (a) each Shareholder entitled to vote may vote in person or by proxy, attorney or representative;
- (b) on a show of hands, every person present who is a Shareholder or a proxy, attorney or representative of a Shareholder has one vote; and
- on a poll, every person present who is a Shareholder or a proxy, attorney or representative of a Shareholder shall, in respect of each fully paid Share held by him, or in respect of which he is appointed a proxy, attorney or representative, have one vote for each Share held, but in respect of partly paid shares shall have such number of votes as bears the same proportion to the total of such Shares registered in the Shareholder's name as the amount paid (not credited) bears to the total amounts paid and payable (excluding amounts credited).

6.3 Dividend rights

Subject to the rights of any preference Shareholders and to the rights of the holders of any shares created or raised under any special arrangement as to dividend, the Directors may from time to time declare a dividend to be paid to the Shareholders entitled to the dividend which shall be payable on all Shares according to the proportion that the amount paid (not credited) is of the total amounts paid and payable (excluding amounts credited) in respect of such Shares.

The Directors may from time to time pay to the Shareholders any interim dividends as they may determine. No dividend shall carry interest as against the Company. The Directors may set aside out of the profits of the Company any amounts that they may determine as reserves, to be applied at the discretion of the Directors, for any purpose as they think fit.

Subject to the ASX Listing Rules and the Corporations Act, the Company may, by resolution of the Directors, implement a dividend reinvestment plan on such

terms and conditions as they think fit under which the whole or part of a dividend due to members who participate in the plan on their shares or any class of shares may be applied in subscribing for securities of the Company or of a related body corporate.

6.4 Winding-up

If the Company is wound up, the liquidator may, with the authority of a special resolution, divide among the Shareholders in kind the whole or any part of the property of the Company, and may determine how the division is to be carried out as between the Shareholders or different classes of Shareholders.

The liquidator may, with the authority of a special resolution, vest the whole or any part of any specific assets, cash, shares or other securities in a trustee on such trusts for the persons entitled to the property as may seem expedient to the liquidator.

6.5 Shareholder liability

As the Shares issued will be fully paid shares, they will not be subject to any calls for money by the Directors and will therefore not become liable for forfeiture.

6.6 Transfer of shares

Generally, shares in the Company are freely transferable, subject to formal requirements, the registration of the transfer not resulting in a contravention of or failure to observe the provisions of a law of Australia and the transfer not being in breach of the Corporations Act and the ASX Listing Rules.

6.7 Future increase in capital

The issue of any new Shares is under the control of the Directors of the Company. Subject to restrictions on the issue or grant of securities contained in the ASX Listing Rules, the Constitution and the Corporations Act (and without affecting any special right previously conferred on the holder of an existing share or class of shares), the Directors may issue Shares as they shall, in their absolute discretion, determine.

6.8 Variation of rights

Under section 246B of the Corporations Act, the Company may, with the sanction of a special resolution passed at a meeting of Shareholders vary or abrogate the rights attaching to shares.

If at any time the share capital is divided into different classes of shares, the rights attached to any class (unless otherwise provided by the terms of issue of the shares of that class), whether or not the Company is being wound up, may be varied or abrogated with the consent in writing of the holders of three quarters of the issued shares of that class, or if authorised by a special resolution passed at a separate meeting of the holders of the shares of that class.

6.9 Alteration of constitution

In accordance with the Corporations Act, the Constitution can only be amended by a special resolution passed by at least three quarters of Shareholders present and voting at the general meeting. In addition, at least 28 days written notice specifying the intention to propose the resolution as a special resolution must be given.

7. RISK FACTORS

7.1 Introduction

The Shares offered under this Prospectus are considered highly speculative. An investment in the Company is not risk free and the Directors strongly recommend potential investors to consider the risk factors described below, together with information contained elsewhere in this Prospectus and to consult their professional advisers before deciding whether to apply for Shares pursuant to this Prospectus.

There are specific risks which relate directly to the Company's business. In addition, there are other general risks, many of which are largely beyond the control of the Company and the Directors. The risks identified in this section, or other risk factors, may have a material impact on the financial performance of the Company and the market price of the Shares.

The following is not intended to be an exhaustive list of the risk factors to which the Company is exposed.

7.2 Company specific

(a) Transaction risk

On 5 August 2014, the Company announced that it had entered into an agreement to acquire an interest in diamond licenses in Mozambique and subsequently on 20 October 2014, announced that it had entered into further agreements to acquire an interest in further graphite assets in Mozambique that will see the Company transform from an oil and gas exploration company to a diamond and graphite exploration company following the completion of the transaction and the re-compliance with the ASX Listing Rules.

Until the transaction is completed and the Company is re-instated to trading on ASX, there is a risk that the transaction may not complete either because of issues that may arise with the various assets in Mozambique or where the Company is unable to satisfy the conditions for the re-instatement to trading of the Company's Shares on ASX.

The Company will undertake all actions necessary to mitigate this risk.

(b) Reinstatement to ASX's official list

It is anticipated that the Company's Shares will be suspended or placed in a trading halt prior to market open on the date of the meeting to consider the transaction outlined in (a) above. In the event the relevant resolutions are approved at the meeting, it is anticipated that the Company's securities will remain suspended until completion of the acquisition of the Mozambique assets, re-compliance by the Company with Chapters 1 and 2 of the ASX Listing Rules and compliance with any further conditions ASX imposes on such reinstatement. There is a risk that the Company will not be able to satisfy one or more of those requirements and that its listed Securities may consequently remain suspended from quotation.

(c) Existing business

The Company is focussing on the acquisition of new assets in Mozambique as a means of generating Shareholder value. Accordingly, the Company has been managing its existing assets in a different manner in which than it may where those assets were to be the Company's main focus moving forward. This has included considering opportunities to divest those assets or decrease the Company's interests in those assets. Where the Company is unsuccessful in completing the acquisition of the interests in the Mozambique diamond and graphite assets, the Company may need to reconsider its strategy in relation to its existing assets or may have limited options in terms of dealing with those assets.

(d) Risks associated with operating in Mozambique

The projects to be acquired by the Company are located in Mozambique, which is considered to be a developing country and as such subject to emerging legal and political systems compared with the system in place in Australia. Investing and operating in foreign jurisdictions carry political, economic and other uncertainties, including, but not limited to, changes in mining and exploration policies or the personnel administering them, nationalisation or expropriation of property, cancellation or modification of contractual risk, foreign exchange restrictions, currency exchange rate fluctuation, royalty and tax increase and other risks arising out of foreign government sovereignty over the areas in which the Company's operations will be conducted. Any of these factors could result in conditions that delay or in fact prevent the Company from exploring or ultimately developing any of the foreign projects.

If the proposed acquisition is successful, the Company will be exposed to the risks of operating in such a jurisdiction, including, without limitation:

- (i) political difficulties in obtaining effective legal redress in the courts whether in respect of a breach of law or regulation or in an ownership dispute;
- (ii) a higher degree of discretion held by various government officials or agencies;
- (iii) the lack of political or administrative guidance on implementing applicable rules and regulations, particularly in relation to taxation and property rights;
- (iv) inconsistencies or conflicts between and within various laws, regulations, decrees, orders and resolutions; or
- (v) relative inexperience of the judiciary and court in matters affecting the Company.

The commitment to local business people, government officials and the judicial system to abide by legal requirements and negotiated agreements may be more uncertain, creating particular concerns with respect to licences and agreements for business. These may be susceptible to revision or cancellation and legal redress may be uncertain or delayed.

No assurance can be given regarding future stability in these or any other country in which the Company may have an interest.

(e) Tenure and access for tenements in Mozambique

Mining and exploration tenements in Mozambique are subject to periodic renewal. Where a licensee has met the terms of the grant, renewal will not be denied. However, if development conditions are not met there is no guarantee that current or future tenements or future applications for production tenements will be approved.

(f) Environmental and other regulatory risks

Environmental legislation is evolving in a manner which will likely require stricter standard and enforcement, increased fines and penalties for non-compliance, more stringent environmental assessments of proposed projects and a heightened degree of responsibility for companies and their officers, directors and employees. There can be no assurance that future changes in environmental regulations in Mozambique, if any, will not materially and adversely affect the Company's business, prospects, financial condition and results of operations.

Various governmental approvals and permits will also be required in connection with various aspects of the Company's operations from time to time. To the extent such approvals or permits are required and not obtained; the Company may be delayed or prevented from proceeding with planned exploration or development.

(g) Additional requirements for capital risk

The Company's capital requirements depend on numerous factors. Depending on the Company's ability to generate income from its operations, the Company may require further financing in the future. Any additional equity financing will dilute shareholdings and debt financing, if available, may involve restrictions on financing and operating activities. If the Company is unable to obtain additional financing as needed, the Company may be required to reduce the scope of its operations and scale back its mining and exploration programmes as the case may be.

(h) Exploration and development risks

The business of graphite exploration, project development and production, by its nature, contains elements of significant risk with no guarantee of success. Ultimate and continuous success of these activities is dependent on many factors such as:

- (i) the discovery and/or acquisition of economically recoverable reserves;
- (ii) access to adequate capital for project development;
- (iii) design and construction of efficient development and production infrastructure within capital expenditure budgets;
- (iv) securing and maintaining title to interests;

- (v) obtaining consents and approvals necessary for the conduct of exploration, development and production; and
- (vi) access to competent operational management and prudent financial administration, including the availability and reliability of appropriately skilled and experienced employees, contractors and consultants.

Whether or not income will result from the existing projects or the new assets, undergoing an exploration and development program depends on successful exploration and establishment of production facilities. Factors including costs and reliability and commodity prices affect successful project development and operations.

Mining activities carry risk and as such, activities may be curtailed, delayed or cancelled as a result of weather conditions, mechanical difficulties, shortages or delays in the delivery of equipment.

Industry operating risks include fire, explosions, industrial disputes, unexpected shortages or increases in the costs of consumables, spare parts, plant and equipment, mechanical failure or breakdown and environmental hazards such as accidental spills or leakages, or geological uncertainty. The occurrence of any of these risks could result in legal proceedings against the Company and substantial losses to the Company due to injury or loss of life, damage to or destruction of property, natural resources or equipment, pollution or other environmental damage, clean-up responsibilities, regulatory investigation, and penalties or suspension of operations. Damage occurring to third parties as a result of such risks may give rise to claims against the Company.

There is no assurance that any exploration on current or future interests will result in the discovery of an economic deposits. Even if an apparently viable deposit is identified, there is no guarantee that it can be economically developed.

(i) Competition risk

The Company will be participating in a highly competitive market, however there are few if any specific competitors who have a dominant market share and dictate the structure or practices in the market.

The fact that there are no dominant competitors makes market entry and penetration easier but not without the need to ensure that the Company can position and differentiate itself to gain market share. There is no certainty that the Company will be successful in this market.

(j) Reliance on key personnel and the need to attract qualified staff

The Company's success depends on the core competencies of its Directors and management team to operate in the resource and mining industry. The loss of one or more of these persons could adversely affect the growth prospects, operating results and financial performance of the Company.

There can be no assurance that the Company will be able to attract or retain sufficiently qualified personnel on a timely basis or retain its key management personnel.

7.3 General risks

(a) Additional requirements for capital

The Company will require further financing in addition to amounts recently raised. Any additional equity financing will dilute shareholdings, and debt financing, if available, may involve restrictions on financing and operating activities. If the Company is unable to obtain additional financing as needed, it may be required to reduce the scope of its operations and scale back its exploration and development programmes as the case may be. There is however no guarantee that the Company will be able to secure any additional funding or be able to secure funding on terms favourable to the Company.

(b) **Economic**

General economic conditions, movements in interest and inflation rates and currency exchange rates may have an adverse effect on the Company's exploration, development and production activities, as well as on its ability to fund those activities.

(c) Commodity Price Risk

If the Company achieves success leading to mineral production, the revenue it will derive through the sale of commodities exposes the potential income of the Company to commodity price and exchange rate risks. Commodity prices fluctuate and are affected by many factors beyond the control of the Company. Such factors include supply and demand fluctuations for precious and base metals, technological advancements, forward selling activities and other macro-economic factors.

Furthermore, international prices of various commodities are denominated in United States dollars, whereas the corporate overhead expenditure of the Company are and will be taken into account in Australian currency, exposing the Company to the fluctuations and volatility of the rate of exchange between the United States dollar and the Australian dollar as determined in international markets.

(d) Competition risk

The industry in which the Company will be involved is subject to domestic and global competition. Although the Company will undertake all reasonable due diligence in its business decisions and operations, the Company will have no influence or control over the activities or actions of its competitors, which activities or actions may, positively or negatively, affect the operating and financial performance of the Company's projects and business.

(e) Government policy changes

Adverse changes in government policies or legislation may affect ownership of mineral interests, taxation, royalties, land access, labour relations, and exploration, development and mining activities of the

Company. It is possible that the current systems of exploration, development and mine permitting in the USA may change, resulting in impairment of rights and possibly expropriation of the Company's properties without adequate compensation.

(f) Risk of international operations generally

International sales and operations are subject to a number of risks, including:

- (i) potential difficulties in enforcing agreements (including joint venture agreements) and collecting receivables through foreign local systems;
- (ii) potential difficulties in protecting intellectual property;
- (iii) increases in costs for transportation and shipping; and
- (iv) restrictive governmental actions, such as imposition of trade auotas, tariffs and other taxes.

Any of these factors could materially and adversely affect the Company's business, results of operations and financial condition.

(g) Reliance on and availability of key personnel

The Company is reliant on key personnel. Loss of such personnel may have a material adverse impact on the performance of the Company. Further, in order to undertake the Company's planned development activities, it may require additional financial, administrative, permitting and operational personnel. While the Company believes that it will be successful in attracting and retaining qualified personnel, there can be no assurance of such success.

(h) Market conditions

Share market conditions may affect the value of the Company's quoted securities regardless of the Company's operating performance. Share market conditions are affected by many factors such as:

- (i) general economic outlook;
- (ii) introduction of tax reform or other new legislation;
- (iii) interest rates and inflation rates;
- (iv) changes in investor sentiment toward particular market sectors;
- (v) the demand for, and supply of, capital; and
- (vi) terrorism or other hostilities.

The market price of securities can fall as well as rise and may be subject to varied and unpredictable influences on the market for equities in general and resource exploration stocks in particular. Neither the Company nor the Directors warrant the future performance of the Company or any return on an investment in the Company.

(i) Dividends

Any future determination as to the payment of dividends by the Company will be at the discretion of the Directors and will depend on the financial condition of the Company, future capital requirements and general business and other factors considered relevant by the Directors. No assurance in relation to the payment of dividends or franking credits attaching to dividends can be given by the Company.

(j) Taxation

The acquisition and disposal of Shares will have tax consequences, which will differ depending on the individual financial affairs of each investor. All potential investors in the Company are urged to obtain independent financial advice about the consequences of acquiring Shares from a taxation viewpoint and generally.

To the maximum extent permitted by law, the Company, its officers and each of their respective advisors accept no liability and responsibility with respect to the taxation consequences of subscribing for Shares under this Prospectus.

7.4 Speculative investment

Therefore, the Shares to be issued pursuant to this Prospectus carry no guarantee with respect to the payment of dividends, returns of capital or the market value of those Shares.

8. ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

8.1 Litigation

As at the date of this Prospectus, several class action suits had been filed in the United States against the operator of the Dugas & Leblanc #1 well and the joint venture partners. Commercial settlement has been reached between the landowners affected by the well blow out and the joint venture partners. The settlement was achieved without additional cash outlay by the Company.

The Company continues to have (as a joint venture partner) ongoing personal injuries cases that are pending. In addition under the settlement with the landowners, the joint venture partners remain obligated to complete the remaining remediation of the land affected by the blowout. As at the date of this Prospectus, the Company does not expect any material costs to eventuate given the level of the Company's insurance. Any eventuating costs and insurance reimbursements are unable to be quantified as this time.

Mr Paul Page and Petro-Raider LLC, "Petro Raider" together a party to a previous agreement with a subsidiary of Arturus Capital Limited in connection with the Permian project leases (which the Company sold on 11 June 2014) have enjoined the Company in an action to enforce an option agreement previously entered into by Arturus Capital Limited with the parties prior to the sale of the leaseholds to the Company.

The parties are seeking to transfer the option agreement to a US based subsidiary of the Company. The primary claims by Petro-Raider are its rights to a 5% net profits interest and 20% working interest back-in. The working interests back-in would not have vested until the Company's capital costs had been recovered. Petro-Raider also contends that when the Company recovers 110% of the amount of its capital costs that the back-in increases to 25%.

Petro-Raider, makes no claim to the balance of the working interest. Petro Raider also claims fraud, tortious interference and civil conspiracy. The Company also claims tortious interference against Mr Page and Petro-Raider LLC.

The Company has in place an indemnity provided by Arturus Capital Limited against the actions by the party, although on 6 June 2013 Arturus Capital Limited was placed in liquidation and therefore the value of this indemnity is uncertain.

The Company has lodged a proof of debt with the liquidator in regard to certain legal, royalties and administration costs that the Company considers that Arturus Capital Limited is required to pay.

The action has been stayed by the court in Reagan County Texas, USA until the Arturus Capital Limited liquidation proceedings are completed in Australia.

Following the sale of the Permian interest, the purchaser has withheld U\$\$500,000 which is currently held in escrow. Should the matter not be resolved by March 2015, then the purchaser retains this amount and assumes all potential liabilities relating to this matter. The Company has fully provided for this receivable as at 30 June 2014, as it expects the matter will not be resolved by this time.

8.2 Continuous Disclosure Obligations

The Company is a "disclosing entity" (as defined in section 111AC of the Corporations Act) for the purposes of section 713 of the Corporations Act and, as such, is subject to regular reporting and disclosure obligations. Specifically, like all listed companies, the Company is required to continuously disclose any information it has to the market which a reasonable person would expect to have a material effect on the price or the value of the Company's securities.

This Prospectus is a "transaction specific prospectus". In general terms a "transaction specific prospectus" is only required to contain information in relation to the effect of the issue of securities on a company and the rights attaching to the securities. It is not necessary to include general information in relation to all of the assets and liabilities, financial position, profits and losses or prospects of the issuing company.

This Prospectus is intended to be read in conjunction with the publicly available information in relation to the Company which has been notified to ASX and does not include all of the information that would be included in a prospectus for an initial public offering of securities in an entity that is not already listed on a stock exchange.
