## SUCCESSFUL DRILLING AT ROOT BAY UNCOVERS NEW STACKED PEGMATITES STRENGTHENING RESOURCE EXPANSION POTENTIAL

### HIGHLIGHTS

- The 14 hole deep extensional diamond drilling program at the Root Bay lithium deposit was completed and all assays received defining 20 stacked pegmatites and thick pegmatite extensions up to 450m below the current estimated Mineral Resource
- All assays have been received for the program targeting underground resource growth and have successfully demonstrated thick, high-grade results below the current open pit design with significant intercepts of :
  - RB-24-008: **17.3m @ 1.43% Li<sub>2</sub>O** from 410.7m
  - RB-24-013: **17.3m @ 1.18% Li<sub>2</sub>O** from 671.0m
  - RB-24-014: **10.9m @ 1.39% Li<sub>2</sub>O** from 380.8m
  - RB-24-009: **11.3m @ 1.10% Li<sub>2</sub>O** from 663.3m
- Additional significant results across the program include
  - RB-24-002: **17.3m @ 1.80% Li<sub>2</sub>O** from 611.9m
  - RB-24-004: **17.6m @ 1.44% Li<sub>2</sub>O** from 509.6m
- Results confirm strong potential for resource expansion at Root adding to the Company's current combined global resource of 24.9Mt<sup>1</sup>
- The Root Bay deposit remains open at depth and strike, with the southern edge being highly prospective for increased strike length from recent thick, high-grade pegmatite intercepts
- Pegmatites demonstrate strong continuity over 1,200m downdip from surface and over 700m below an open pit design

Green Technology Metals Limited (ASX: GT1) (GT1 or the **Company**), a Canadian-focused multi-asset lithium business, is pleased to provide an update following conclusion of the deep extensional drilling program at the Root Lithium Project located in Ontario, Canada.

**We are pleased to report the success of the deep extensional drilling program at Root Bay, further confirmed by the latest batch of assay results. This program has identified additional stacked pegmatites, bringing the total at Root Bay to 20.**

***These results reinforce the project's significance as a key component of the Company's strategy to establish a reliable long-term feed source for our proposed lithium conversion facility in Thunder Bay.***

***The latest assays have also confirmed pegmatite extensions extending 450m below the existing Mineral Resource, strengthening our confidence in delivering more tonnes in an updated Mineral Resource Estimate.***

***Additionally, we see significant exploration upside at Root Bay, with further drill testing planned for the future.***

***We look forward to announcing an updated Mineral Resource Estimate, which will build on our current global resource base of 24.9Mt.***

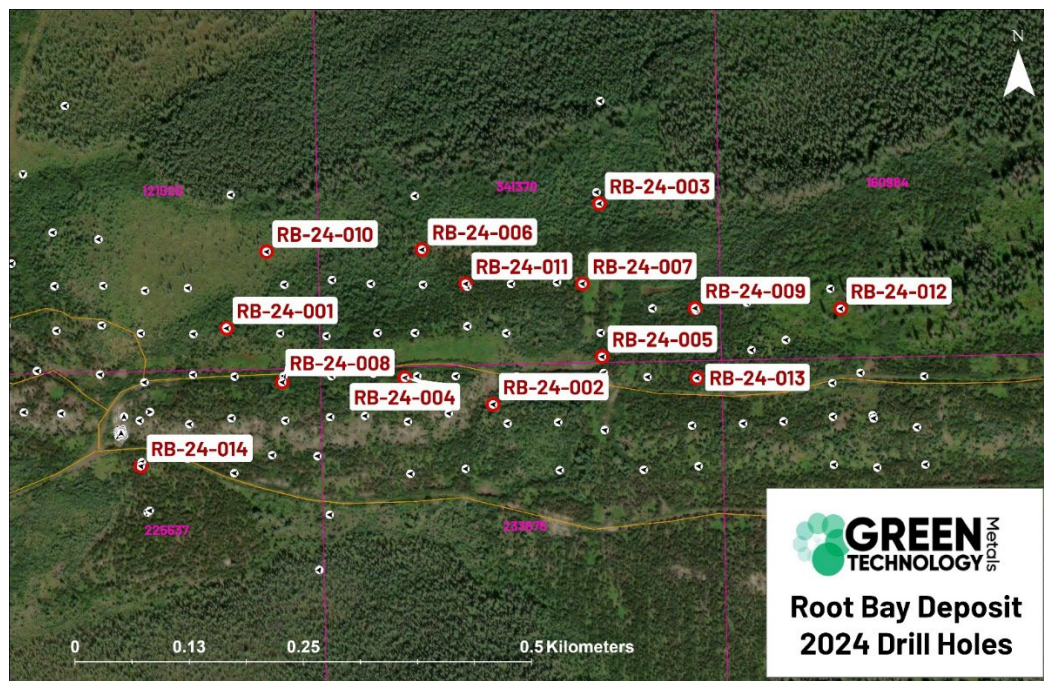

## ROOT BAY DEEP EXTENSION DRILLING

The deep extension drilling program at Root Bay was completed in December 2024, with a total of 14 drill holes for 9,132 metres completed. The program targeted mineralisation depth extension below the existing Mineral Resource<sup>2</sup> with drill hole depths ranging from 462 metres to 942 metres.

**The Root Bay deposit remains open at depth and strike, with the southern edge being highly prospective for increased strike length from recent thick, high-grade pegmatite intercepts.**

Drilling successfully intersected multiple wide zones of lithium-caesium-tantalum (LCT) pegmatites and newly discovered pegmatites at depth, reinforcing the potential for deeper resource extensions. These results are critical for enhancing the geological understanding of the deposit and advancing studies for potential future underground mining operations.

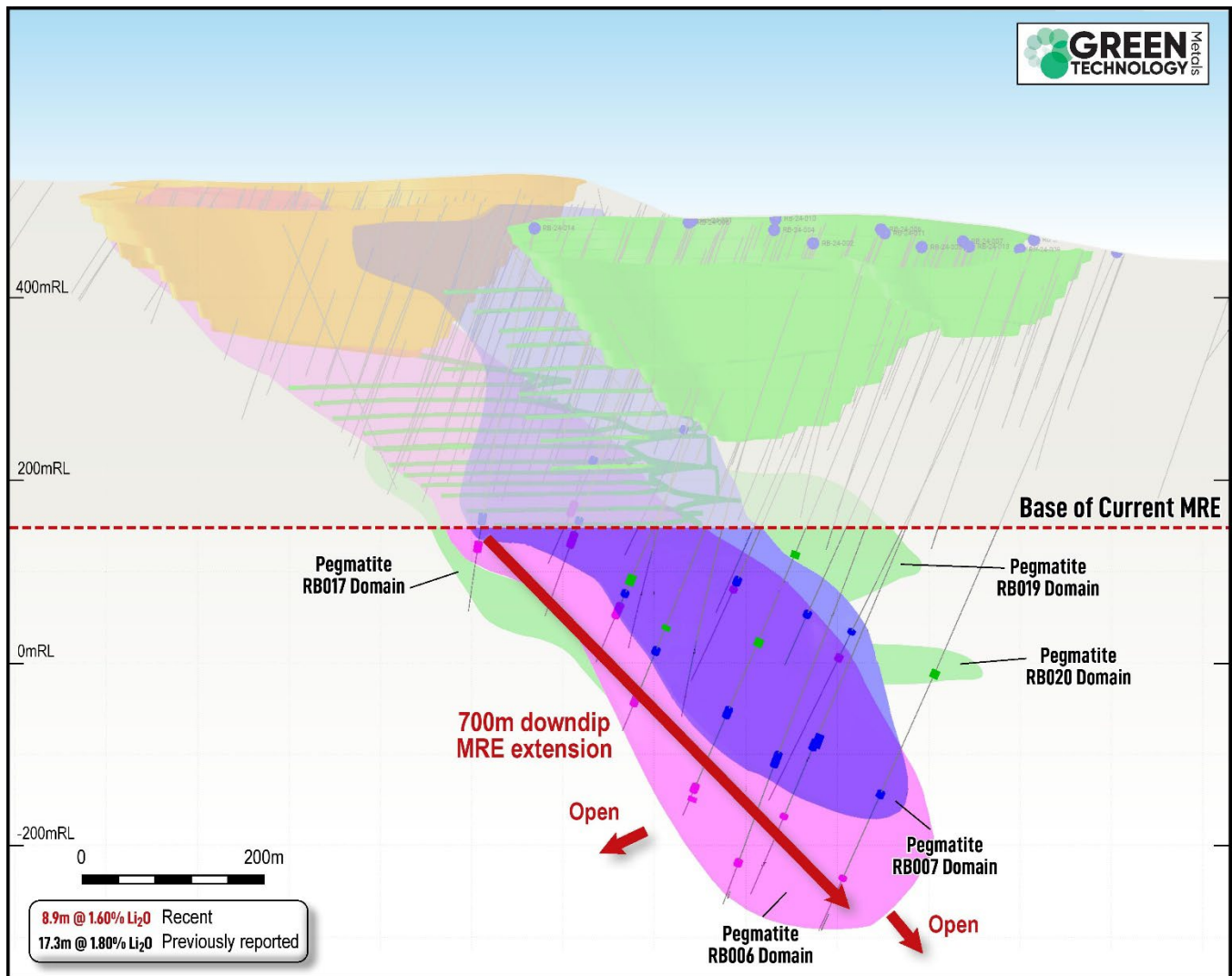


**Figure 1 Plan View of drillhole collar locations at Root Bay**

The drilling program successfully defined the main pegmatites RB006 and RB007, extending their interpretation a further 450m below the existing Mineral Resource.

Significant mineralised pegmatite drill intercepts, over 17 m thick were identified in the southern portion of the deposit and extending to the north over a 150-200m strike length.

The thicker intercepts in the south demonstrate high lithium grades consistent with those noted in shallower intercepts hosted within pegmatites RB006 and RB007. 20 pegmatites have been identified to date with the recent drilling identifying three new pegmatites at depth RB017, RB019 and RB020.

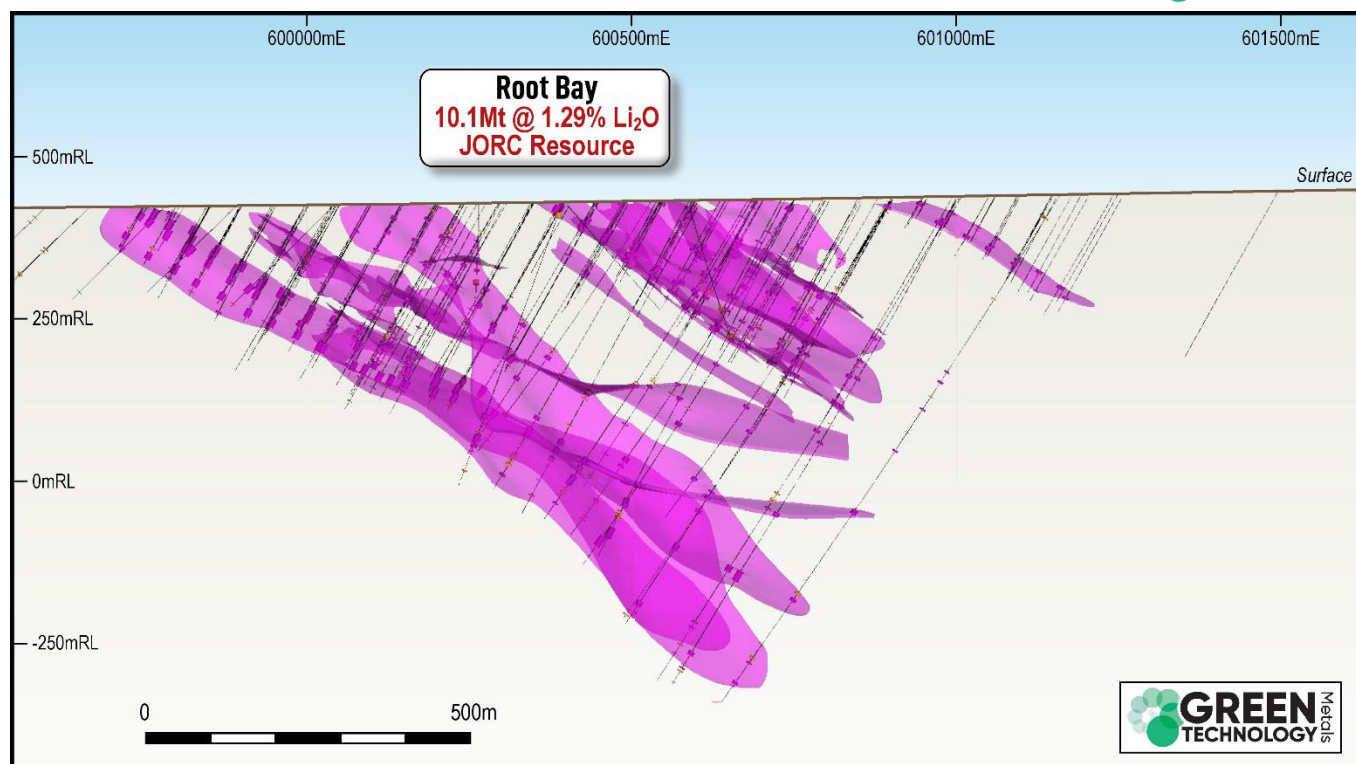


**Figure 2 Oblique View looking North Westerly showing concept underground development and open pit designs with pegmatites RB006 and RB007 pink and blue respectively. Other significant pegmatites are coloured green. Only pegmatites and intercepts with underground mining potential are displayed for clarity.**

The pegmatites strike North-North Easterly and dip moderately to the south-east, with the strike rotating further northeasterly with depth along with a steeper dip. The thicker intervals and encouraging assay results on the south edge of the deposit to date are in line with the characteristics required to support an underground mining study.

To date, GT1 have defined the main pegmatites over 1,200 metre downdip extent from surface and up to 700 metres vertically below surface. The Company plans to update the Mineral Resource to incorporate these deeper drill holes and initiate further integrated open pit and underground mining study work to optimise the mineral resource further.





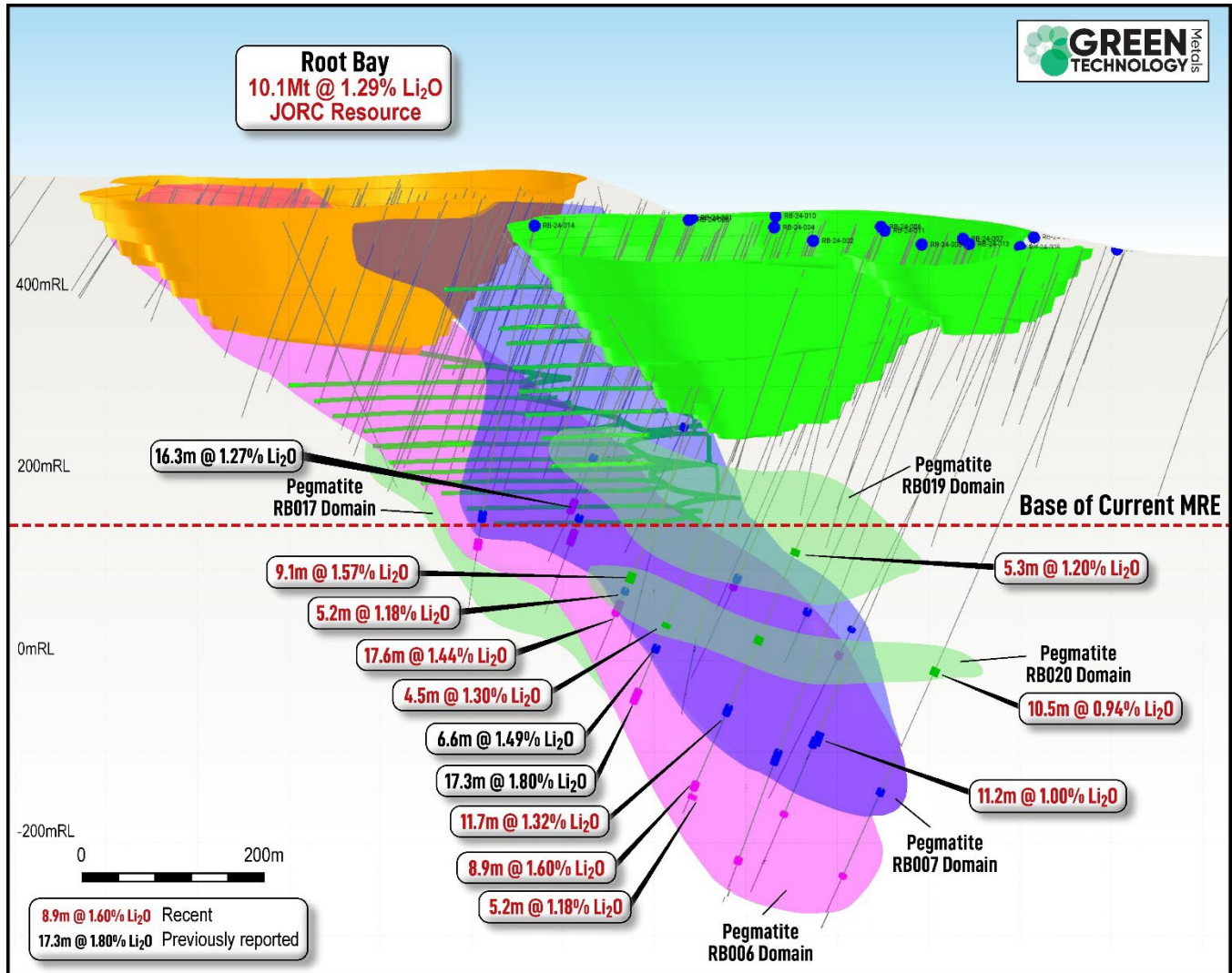
**Figure 3: 20 Stacked pegmatites at Root Bay, view looking North**

Mineralisation is hosted almost exclusively by fine to medium grained white to green coloured spodumene crystals set in a largely quartz, feldspar, mica groundmass with occasional tourmaline banding +/- apatite occurrences.

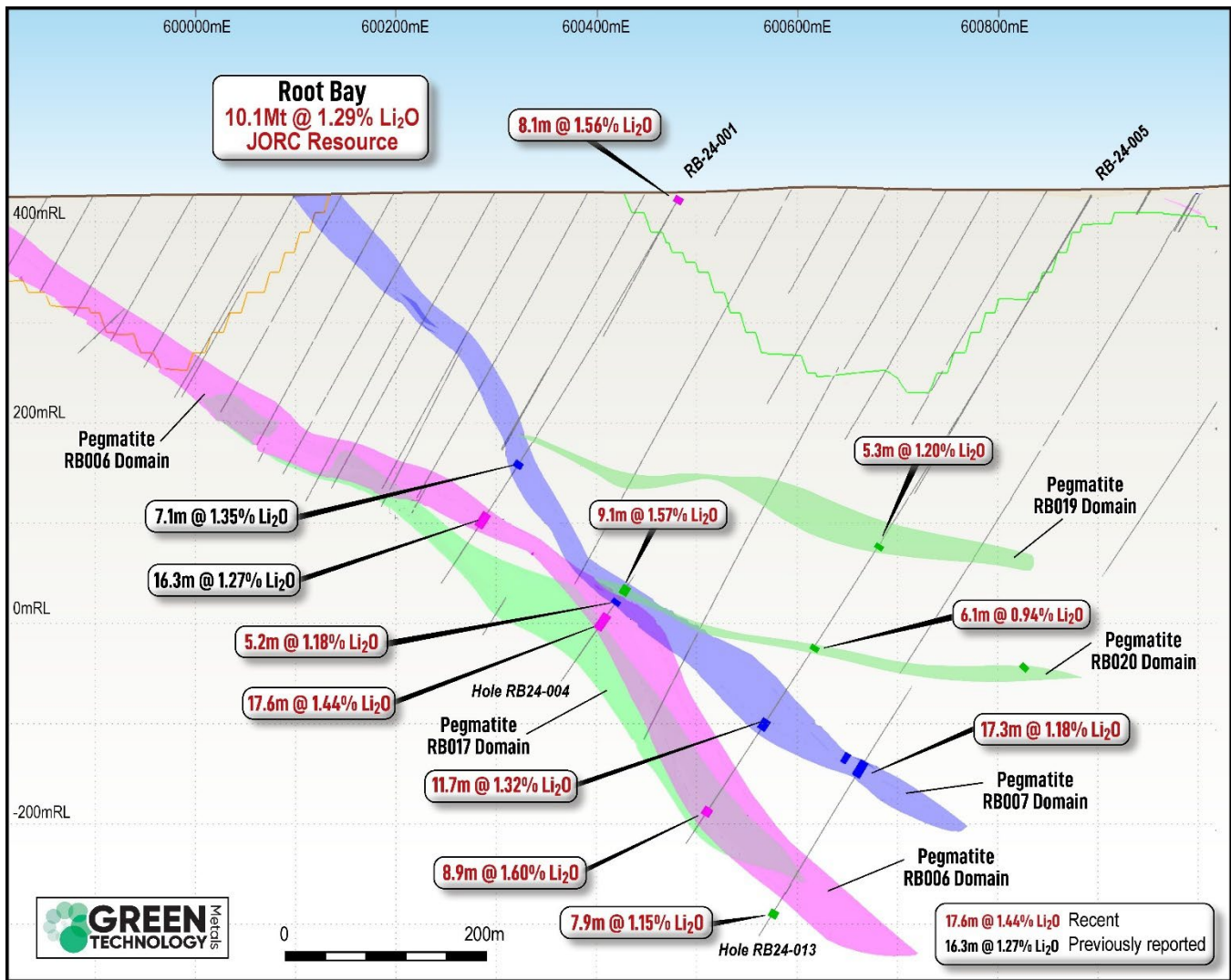
