ABOUT THE COMPANY

Citigold Corporation Limited (ASX:CTO) is an Australian gold exploration and development company located in northeast Australia. The Company's prime focus is the high-grade Charters Towers Gold Project. It is production-ready after successfully completing 100,000 ounces of gold production¹ test mining and establishing its mine site. The Company continues to advance its core activities including broad regional exploration programs, mine design, engineering, and working to restart its gold mine.

Our aim is to be a 300,000 plus ounces per annum ultra-low-cost gold producer using state-of-the-art technologies and efficiencies, all with the aim of returning substantial profits to shareholders in harmony with the local environment².

Citigold holds 175 square kms of prospective exploration grounds surrounding the Central Mine mineralisation area and is actively exploring new reefs to further increase our known mineral resources over time.

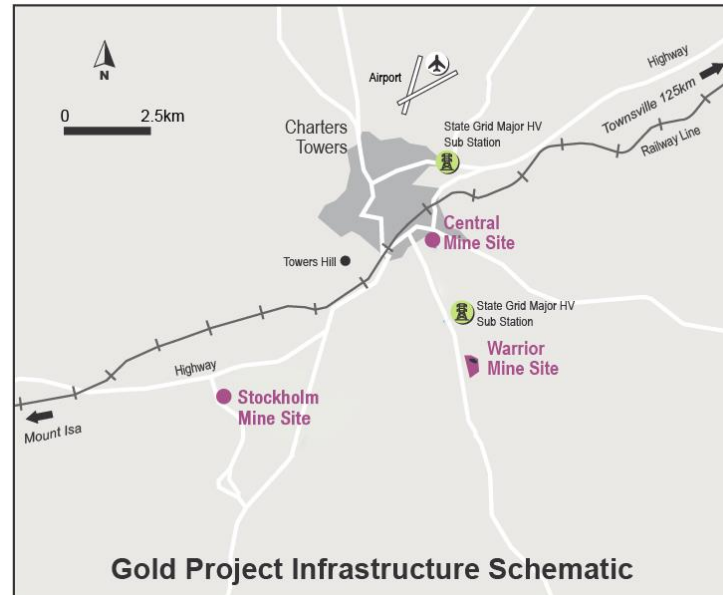

MINE DESIGN AND ENGINEERING

Mine planning during the quarter focussed on reviewing the regional mine plan in regard to the locations where we require access to the surface for services such as power, water, communications and entry portals.

A review of the long-term mine plan continued during the period with a focus on optimising the deployment of major mining equipment across underground work areas.

Central Mine design and engineering continued to be optimised during the period. Other Central Mine design and engineering activities continued to progress including planning, scheduling, and optimisation reviews.



GEOLOGY AND EXPLORATION

Geology & Mineral Resources

Mineral resources and reserves are summarised below¹:

Citigold's Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves for the overall Gold Project are reported in accordance with the Australasian JORC Reporting Code 2012¹. Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves remained unchanged during the Quarter. The material assumptions and technical parameters underpinning the

estimates continue to apply and have not materially changed¹.

Exploration Update September 2023

Exploration over the last two years has returned to grassroots, taking a fresh look at revised three-dimensional modelling of the geological structures and fractures that have been shown to host mineralization. Initial sampling followed conventional processes of stream sediment and float sampling, following up anomalous drainage basins with rock chip, float and soil sampling to define the spread of metals across the weathering profile.

Surface sampling has picked up new mineralised areas and confirmed demagnetised zones in rocks mapped as uniform or unaltered return low to medium-grade gold and base metal values as gold is dispersed during weathering and groundwater transport. The mineralization is dispersed during weathering, and low gold values (less than 1 g/t Au) are expected in soil, with anomalous samples regarded as those returning 0.1 g/t Au or higher. Rock chip sampling of outcrop or rock float samples

(loose pieces detached from outcrop and dispersed by mechanical weathering processes) may return assay values higher than 1 g/t Au.

Assay results continue to come in, with the latest batch of 167 rock outcrop, float and soil samples being returned. The program sampled areas across three Exploration Permits located about four kilometres to the south of Charters Towers with 147 sites sampled and 20 repeat or duplicate samples taken at selected sites for quality control. Samples comprised 1-2 kg of rock chips from outcrop or float and

unscreened soil samples if outcrop was absent. Sample site numbers were 770 to 916.

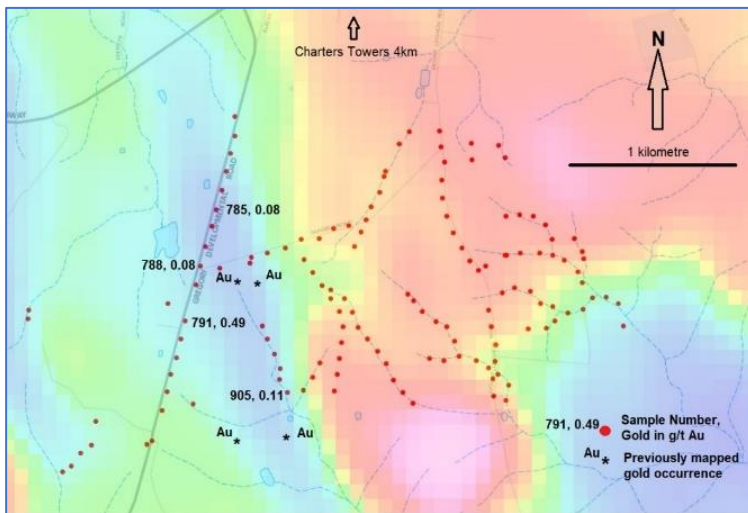
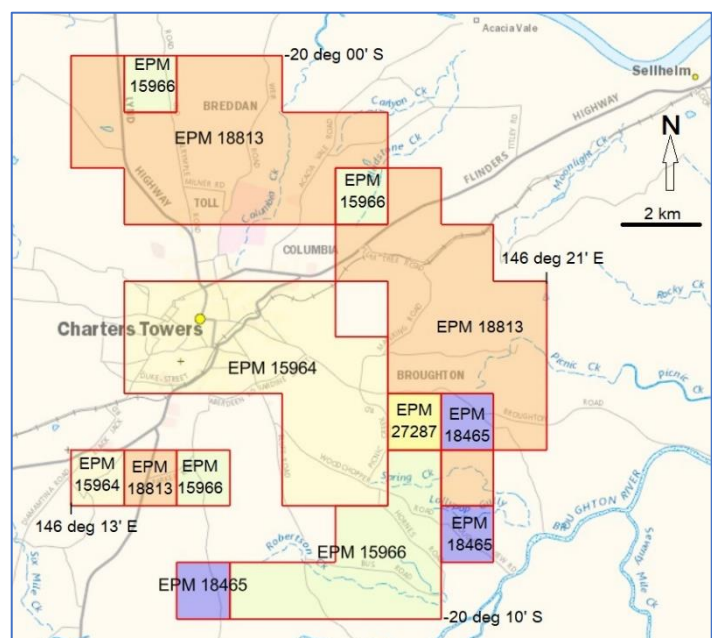


Figure 1. Sample site locations for the 167 samples recently assayed. Red dots are sample locations. Anomalous sample numbers are shown with the gold assay in grams of gold per tonne (g/t Au). Black asterisks are previously mapped gold occurrences. The darker blue areas are demagnetised zones in rocks mapped as uniform Towers Hill Granite.

The Company holds five Exploration Permits for Minerals (EPMs) surrounding Charters Towers, as shown below in Figure 2. Recent work has focused on three sub-blocks of EPMs 15964, 15966 and 18813 located four kilometres south of Charters Towers.

Figure 2. Location map of Citigold's Exploration Permits (EPMs) around Charters Towers. Exploration this Quarter has focussed on the three conjoined sub-blocks of EPMs 15964, 18813 and 15966 in the southwest corner of the map.

Of the 167 samples taken, 21 samples contained detectable gold and of these, four were considered anomalous. The anomalous samples are on the margin of a demagnetised zone in rocks mapped as uniform Towers Hill Granite, as shown in Figure 1. The demagnetised zone strikes north-northeast for about two kilometres and is about 300m wide and hosts five previously mapped gold occurrences.

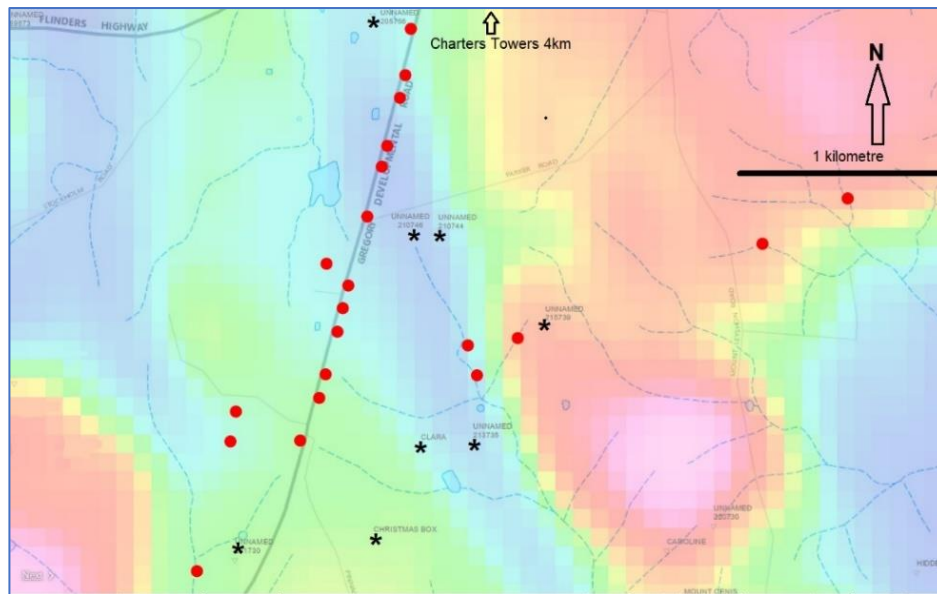


Figure 3. All the detectable gold samples (red dots) and previously mapped gold occurrences (black asterisks) are located within or marginal to demagnetised zones (darker blue areas).

The sampling has outlined anomalous gold results coincident with a demagnetised zone that hosts previously-mapped gold occurrences and warrants further investigation. All the detectable gold samples are located in or marginal to the demagnetised zones as shown below in Figure 3. The demagnetised zones may indicate areas of the granite that have been altered by mineralising fluids,

resulting in the oxidation of the magnetic mineral magnetite to the non-magnetic hematite, creating a demagnetised zone within the granite.

The sampling program is ongoing with follow-up sampling of earlier stream sediment anomalies progressing to the southeast of Charters Towers and results will be reported in due course.

Exploration analysis, preparation of studies, review and maintenance of data, and other exploration activities continued. During the Quarter, no new exploration drilling was undertaken. Normal regulatory compliance reporting for exploration, mine and environmental continued during the Quarter.

Citigold is continuing to work with parties who are at various stages of discussions regarding funding opportunities.

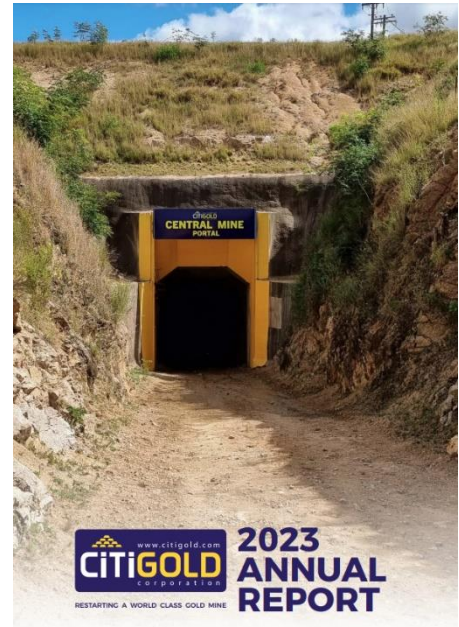
The Company has in the past undertaken broad shareholder share purchase plans and share placements. The Company further has the ability to raise funds from the forward sale of gold in the ground and drawing on loan facilities as previously announced.

Appendix 5B Disclosures

The Company's accompanying Appendix 5B (Quarterly Cash Flow Report) includes amounts in item 6.1 & 6.2 which constitute directors' accrued fees during the Quarter.

During the period, the Company made a payment of \$52,000 (capitalised), on exploration activities at its Charters Towers Gold Project, which included a regional exploration sampling program, desktop studies, review of historical data, and exploration technologies. Exploration payments totalling \$279,000 (expense) included tenement management costs, mining rent and environmental fees. Development payments totalling \$26,000 (capitalised) as reported in item 2.1(f) included mine design and engineering optimisation, scheduling, planning, reviewing data and economic evaluation etc. Development payments totalling \$3,000 (expense) included site management and maintenance costs. Payment for administration and corporate costs amounted to \$109,000 and included listing, compliance, consultants, administration, and project marketing activities.
