Executive Chairman's Report

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE CHAIRMAN

Fellow Shareholders,

I have pleasure in presenting the 2022 Annual Report of Northern Minerals Limited.

The past year saw several, significant changes that transformed the Company, positioning it to take important steps towards establishing a commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range and to pursue development of the precinct to its fullest potential.

The Company's aspiration is to build its operation into a significant producer of ethically produced rare earth elements and separated products, including the heavy rare earths, dysprosium and terbium.

The neodymium iron-boron magnet (NdFeB) used in clean energy, military and high technology solutions contain the essential ingredients of dysprosium and terbium. Their unique characteristics enhance the performance of magnets at high temperatures and improve their resistance to demagnetisation. This is particularly desirable for magnets used in higher temperature operating conditions, such as large offshore wind turbines, electric vehicle motors, robotics in modern manufacturing, and energy-saving heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems.

China is responsible for almost 100% of rare earth magnet manufacturing. While only holding some 35% of known rare earth reserves, it represents 55-60% of rare earth mining production, about 85% of midstream separation and metal/refining capacity, and roughly 90% of NdFeB permanent magnet manufacturing.

Many equipment manufacturers in a wide variety of sectors are seeking to secure access to additional supply chains for strategic minerals, such as rare earths.

The Australian Government has created the Critical Minerals Facilitation Office while the US has created the Advanced Technology Vehicles Manufacturing Loan Program to provide support, including funding, for the development of critical mineral projects.

I believe Northern Minerals is well placed to take opportunities to participate in programs such as these. As one of only a few companies outside of China to have produced dysprosium and terbium, our Browns Range and other properties certainly qualify for consideration.

The strategic review, carried out by the Board during the year, confirmed that producing and marketing a mixed heavy rare earth concentrate from a commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range is the preferred near-term strategy, offering earlier access to cash flow and a lower risk profile.

The strategic review identified an opportunity for the Company to expedite production and bring forward cash flow from the high-grade Wolverine deposit at Browns Range. We have initiated steps to put together an experienced team to produce an updated Detailed Feasibility Study (DFS) for a commercial scale beneficiation plant, leveraging work undertaken in the earlier 2015 DFS. Included will be an assessment of the benefits (financial and otherwise) of alternative mining methods, inclusion of an ore sorter to increase product grade and de-risk mining dilution following the pilot plant achieving a 60% improvement in ore sorted product grade.

The Company began producing heavy rare earth carbonate in late 2018 as part of the pilot program. The program was aimed at assessing the economic and technical feasibility of a larger scale development at Browns Range. An ore sorter installed and commissioned during 2021 also tested for its economic and technical feasibility at the front end of the pilot plant. The Company completed the three-year test program on the Pilot Plant at Browns Range during the March 2022 quarter and the plant has been placed on care and maintenance.

Since inception the Company has produced 281 tonnes of carbonate from 1,140 tonnes of rare earth oxide concentrate from the Browns Range pilot plant.

Board renewal

I was privileged to be invited to join the Board as Chairman in November 2021 following the resignation of Colin McCavana. Colin was a founding director of the Company and was instrumental in its transition from an explorer to a producer of heavy rare earth elements, and we thank him for his contribution. I was appointed Executive Chairman in June 2022.

Bin Cai was appointed as a Non-Executive Director in July 2021 after acting as an alternate director since 2013. Mr Cai has been involved in the rare earth industry for over 15 years and has assisted the Company with critical financing and other activities over the years. He was appointed an Executive Director in June 2022.

Adam Handley was appointed a Non-Executive Director in December 2021. Adam is a Partner and China Markets Leader for MinterEllison and specialises in advising North Asian investors and their Australian counterparts to build successful business relationships across a range of sectors including Energy & Resources, Mining and Project Development. He is the National Vice President & Director of the Australia China Business Council, a member of the Murdoch University Vice Chancellor's Advisory Board, and a Board member of the World Services Group.

The Board continues to review its composition and we intend to continue the process of Board renewal, recognising the benefits of having directors with a broad range of skills, experience and perspectives.

Financial

During the year, Northern Minerals received total income of \$9.3 million, including \$3.8 million from sales of rare earth carbonate from the pilot plant and \$4.3 million for the R&D refundable tax offset.

The Company retains a strong balance sheet, with net cash of \$2.9 million at year end and a net working capital surplus of \$5.6 million. In addition, the claim for the refundable R&D tax offset for FY22, estimated at \$4.1 million, has been lodged and is expected to be received in the December 2022 quarter.

Finally, I would also like to reiterate the Board's belief that the future for Northern Minerals is bright. The Company is strategically placed to play an increasingly significant role in the international manufacturing supply chain for rare earth magnets.

Chief Executive Officer's Review

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REVIEW

The Company completed the three-year test program on the Pilot Plant at Browns Range during the March 2022 quarter and the Pilot Plant has been placed on care and maintenance. This represents the successful culmination of the research and development project to assess the economic and technical feasibility of the heavy rare earth mine and process.

During the first half of calendar 2022, the Company undertook a strategic review of the Browns Range Project under the direction of the Chairman. The review identified significant financial and commercial benefits available to the Company from accelerating the development of the Wolverine orebody, which we believe contains the highest grades of Dysprosium and Terbium of any deposit in Australia.

Wolverine is contained within a specific shear zone that is part of the Browns Range system, which retains significant potential for further mineralised shear zones. Wolverine will underpin the proposed mining resource for the forthcoming bankable feasibility study.

The review also noted the strong and growing use of rare earth magnets, giving rise to growth in demand for the Company's key products. Together with our improved understanding of the Browns Range metallurgy following three years of processing through the pilot plant, these macro fundamentals provide us with the confidence to move towards producing a bankable feasibility study as a precursor to production of a rare earth concentrate rich in dysprosium and terbium. We are also investigating commercial arrangements for downstream processing.

Following the commissioning of the ore sorter system in FY2021, the Company focused on testing the system and producing ore-sorted material during the FY2022 year. This material was converted to a ~30% Total Rare Earth Oxide (TREO) xenotime concentrate through the pilot beneficiation plant then further processed through the hydrometallurgical plant to produce a rare earth carbonate (REC). A total of 106,106 kg of REC was shipped for sale to thyssenkrupp.

The results of the Pilot Plant test programs, including results from the ore sorter, will be utilised in the Detailed Feasibility Study (DFS) for a commercial-scale beneficiation plant.

Strategic imperative driving demand for rare earths

Understanding of the global significance of rare earths has continued to grow, and especially the need for secure alternative supply chains to mitigate the influence of China, which holds a dominant position in the manufacture of rare earth metal componentry for magnets. Heightened geopolitical tensions are driving both increased investment in modern armament and the implementation of policy initiatives to support the development of non-Chinese sources of supply.

At the same time, product innovation and dramatic increases in community, industry and government demand for more sustainable energy solutions are contributing to the escalating demand for rare earths. Governments are increasingly requiring industry and companies to develop and deliver on plans to reduce carbon emissions, a process that has accelerated tremendously during the last year.

Demand for rare earth magnets from the electric vehicle industry and wind turbines (especially large offshore wind turbines) is leading growth, but demand is rising swiftly from other areas such as robotics for modern manufacturing, and products for clean-tech buildings (elevators, heating, ventilation, and air conditioning, etc).

As one of the few reliable sources of environmentally safe dysprosium outside China, Northern Minerals is well placed to be part of developing an alternative global supply chain. Our focus during the coming year will be on undertaking the DFS for construction of a commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range with the aim of being able to make a Final Investment Decision.

In the meantime, we will seek further exploration success on the back of increased drilling to expand our resource and reserve base.

Exploration

The Company's large landholdings in Western Australia and the Northern Territory are highly prospective for rare earths. The current portfolio consists of three projects, the flagship Browns Range Project and the John Galt Project in WA, and the Boulder Ridge Project located in the NT.

Browns Range currently has a JORC resource of over nine million tonnes averaging 0.67% TREO and 0.87% heavy rare earth oxides. Exploration to date has only examined approximately 15% of the Browns Range Dome, a large oval-shaped structure, approximately 60 kilometres by 30 kilometres, on the Western Australian Northern Territory border.

During the first half of FY2022, Northern Minerals conducted a drilling programme at Browns Range completing 18,650 (RC) Drilling, 3,100 metres of diamond drilling and 650 metres aircore drilling.

RC drilling targeted anomalous prospects within a 20km radius of the Browns Range pilot processing facility, whilst diamond drilling provided core samples from the Wolverine hanging wall for geotechnical and underground mine design purposes.

Encouraging drill results were received from the Cyclops, Rockslider and Banshee prospects.

Conclusion

Northern Minerals is privileged to have a dedicated workforce whose enthusiasm and commitment enable the Company to meet its goals and objectives.

Northern Minerals ran its first Training to Work program during the year. This program gives local Aboriginal people with limited to no experience an opportunity to live and train at Browns Range over a three-week period. Six people were selected from a group of over 30 applicants and completed both a Certificate I in Resources and Infrastructure Operations and practical skills workshops while completing tours and demonstrations of the different areas on site. All six students completed the course and were offered employment either with Northern Minerals or one of our on site contractors.

The graduation ceremony was attended by family members and community elders and was also featured in a Channel 7 news program on Browns Range.

Early 2022 saw the culmination of a highly successful three-year test work program at the Browns Range pilot plant operation. The end of the scheduled program resulted in the pilot plant being placed into care and maintenance and necessitated redundancies across our close-knit site-based operations team. I am extremely grateful for the contribution this team made to the Company. Through their tenacity, dedication, and commitment, they were a huge part of the success of the test work campaign.

On behalf of shareholders, I would also like to thank our Board, my executive team and all our employees and contractors for their hard work, resilience, and patience over a challenging three-year period.

I would especially like to acknowledge the contribution of our Chairman, Nick Curtis, whose counsel and vast experience in mining and finance are proving invaluable in driving our strategic direction. We benefit from insights gained from Nick's previous experience with Lynas Corporation, where he led the development of the Mt Weld rare earth deposit in Western Australia and the establishment of a large downstream rare earth processing plant in Kuantan in Malaysia.

I would also like to pay particular thanks to the Jaru and broader community. We acknowledge the Jaru people, the Traditional Custodians of the lands upon which we work, their rich culture and continuing connection to land, waters and community. We are proud to work, partner and engage with the Jaru people, and pay our respects to their Elders and leaders, past, present and emerging.

ENVIRONMENT, SOCIAL & GOVERNANCE

Stakeholder engagement

Northern Minerals maintains a strong working relationship with local communities as well as with Heytesbury Cattle Company which holds the pastoral lease that the project sits on. In 2022, the Company's engagement program of in-community meetings and events has resumed as COVID-19 restrictions have eased.

Northern Minerals staff were excited to reinstate the annual Ringer Soak Kids Christmas BBQ after the 2020 event was cancelled due to COVID restrictions. The event is a great opportunity for staff members to strengthen relationships with community members and present the children with Christmas gifts. This year, several staff were honoured to be given skin names by an elder and had the opportunity to participate in a cultural dance practice at the school.

The company works closely with the Ringer Soak community to provide assistance and improve outcomes in the area including working with the Directors of Ringer Soak to ensure COVID protocols were in place and respected. While this limited contact with community members, it ensured the health of local community members was protected.

In particular, given the high cost of cleaning products in remote areas, we were pleased to respond to a request from Ringer Soak to donate cleaning products to help limit the spread of infection. Other assistance included the provision of a grader to clear an area for cultural ceremonies, and personal donations by staff of clothes, toys, bedding, and other goods.

A Northern Minerals Facebook group was established to help local people maintain engagement while limiting the risk of infection in the community.

During the 2022 dry season, Northern Minerals engaged several Jaru Traditional Owners to assist with controlled burns around the camp and the process plant. This was a great opportunity for staff to learn how Traditional Owners look after their country, including traditional fire practices, while maintaining the safety of staff and infrastructure.

Along with Jaru Traditional Owners, Northern Minerals worked with Purnululu and Malarngowem Native Title groups to arrange heritage surveys for exploration works. The Company recognises and respects areas of special heritage and cultural significance and continues to honour our agreement

with the respective Native Title holders when managing land clearing, protecting heritage values, and environmental management and reporting. These values are embedded in our culture, policies and procedures and are reinforced through ongoing education and training.

Northern Minerals held the first Training to Work program at Browns Range in August 2021. The program is designed to provide employment opportunities to local Aboriginal people by giving them the opportunity to live and train at Browns Range over a three-week period. Traditional barriers to entry in mining environments like language and literacy and driver's license are addressed during the course and mitigated where possible.

Six local Aboriginal people were selected from a large group of applicants and prepared to start training. Only one participant had experience working at a mine site before, and two participants were new to employment. Utilising the purpose-built training room at the process plant, participants completed tours and work experience in various departments while completing a TAFE course and practical skills workshops on site.

Conducting the training on site allows for a realistic experience, which cannot be obtained from within a

classroom. By living at camp, the participants learnt the skills necessary to live away from home and built lasting relationships with staff members.

The training was a great success with all six students completing the course and subsequently being offered positions with either Northern Minerals or our contractors at site. Family members and community elders attended the graduation ceremony to celebrate the achievements of the group. Ongoing training and support are provided to all Aboriginal staff members after commencement.

Throughout 2021, Northern Minerals worked with a consultant to select and prepare a Jaru person or entity to deliver Cultural Awareness on site to all staff members. This process proved complicated due to no Jaru specific program being currently offered. The company has reassessed its approach and will now look to identify and develop suitable presenters with the assistance of the Implementation Committee and the Jaru Prescribed Body Corporate. The company is already working with other companies and organisations in the area to build capacity within the Jaru community to deliver training in a sustainable manner.

Northern Minerals organised a Working with Indigenous Employees course to be delivered to

all staff members on site. This day long course was very well received and gave staff members valuable insight into Indigenous history, culture, and language as well as providing practical lessons for creating a more inclusive work environment. The contribution to this course by Jaru staff members was invaluable with both Indigenous and non-Indigenous staff members leaving with a better understanding of both challenges and possible solutions.

Environmental management

Northern Minerals is committed to producing ethical rare earths and integrating risk-based environmental management throughout its operations. We strive for continual improvement of our environmental performance, efficient use of resources, and prevention and mitigation of pollution. We consider high environmental standards a critical part of our operations.

Following the completion of the Browns Range Pilot Plant program in April 2022, Northern Minerals submitted the Care and Maintenance Plan to the Department of Mines Industry Regulation and Safety (DMIRS). Key commitments included closing abandonment bunds around Wolverine and Gambit West pits (completed in August 2022) and addressing ongoing surface water issues. The exploration team have been instrumental in getting this work done efficiently.

Significant progress was made in Q3 and Q4 2021 to improve roads and drainage around the site to direct surface water run-off back into the bush and reduce scouring of the roads. These works form part of the ongoing drainage improvement program.

Northern Minerals strives to meet and improve our ongoing environmental reporting obligations, both internal and external. During the year Northern Minerals:

- progressed the Environmental Management System (EMS) components of the Integrated Management System (IMS) manual in alignment with ISO14001;
- submitted all required annual environmental reports to relevant State Government regulators; and
- maintained internal reporting procedures by including environmental incidents and issues in daily site reports and including environmental performance in monthly reports to the Board.

Northern Minerals reported one incident in the annual environmental report to DMIRS in Q1 2022. Several open sterilisation drill holes were discovered during a fauna survey in late 2021. Drilled in 2013/14, these holes had not been properly rehabilitated and subsequently re-opened. Following the discovery of the open drill holes, we undertook an audit of all 384 holes drilled for sterilisation and found 79 open holes. All open drill holes have now been stabilised and the collars rehabilitated.

In late 2021, hydrasleeves have been used for groundwater monitoring which resulted in considerable improvements. Hydrasleeves produce a more representative sample than bailers and pumps and reduce health and safety exposures by reducing the amount of manual work needed for the use of a generator and pump system. Further innovation in water sampling involved the use of a fishing drone to take water samples from 2 to 5 m in the centre of the open pit. This technique improves safety by removing the need to enter the open pit and provides better quality information through more representative sampling of the pit water quality. This information can better inform use and disposal of the waters when the pits are dewatered ahead of further mining.

In July 2022, we restarted environmental planning work and environmental studies to support long-lead time approvals. This work will be used to support the feasibility study for the full-scale beneficiation plant. Changes to the development envelope were finalised around the airstrip, tailings storage facility and site access road. A Miscellaneous Licence application has been submitted to DMIRS to widen the site access road corridor and to allow for additional linear infrastructure within the corridor.

Desktop flora and fauna studies have been commissioned and heritage survey planning has started. This work will support the application to amend the project development envelope in the existing Ministerial Statement 986 under Part IV of the Environmental Protection Act.

An engaged workforce is essential for our success and is monitored via employee engagement surveys. Northern Minerals wishes to acknowledge the contribution this group made to the success of the test work campaign and express its gratitude to them.

We thank all of our employees, past and present, for their hard work, resilience and patience over a what has been a challenging and rewarding three-year period.

The strong culture we have created has greatly influenced the success of our journey so far and we remain focused on continuing to nurture and grow this culture as we move forward into the next phase of growth.

Executive Chairman

Nick Curtis joined Northern Minerals as Non Executive Chairman in November 2021. In June 2022, Nick was appointed as Executive Chairman.

Nick is a fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors and has more than 30-years' experience in mining and finance, particularly in the rare earths sector.

In 2001, Nick led ASX-listed Lynas Corporation's transformation to become a rare earths focused company developing the Mt Weld deposit in Western Australia and ultimately led the construction of Lynas' downstream rare earth processing plant in Malaysia. Nick founded Sino Gold Limited which became a top 100 company on the Australian Stock Exchange before being taken over by Eldorado Gold of Canada in 2006. The company was privatised in 2014, and is now BBI Group Pty Ltd, focused on building a large-scale integrated iron ore system in the Pilbara.

Nick has been awarded a member of the Order of Australia for his services to the community through executive roles supporting medical research and healthcare organisations, and for his work fostering Australia-China relations.

Bin Cai was appointed to the role of Executive Director in June 2022 after serving as a Non-Executive Director (appointed July 2021) and an Alternative Director (appointed 2013) of Northern Minerals.

Bin is the Managing Director of Conglin International Investment Group Pty Ltd based in Brisbane. He has a record of successful strategic investments in emerging Australian resources companies based on his long experience in the resources sector.

COO REPORT

The past year represented a period of transition for Northern Minerals with the conclusion of the pilot plant program at Browns Range. The achievement of this milestone gave the company the opportunity to pause and review the strategy to becoming an internationally significant producer of heavy rare earths elements (HREE), in particular dysprosium and terbium.

Throughout 2022, and the preceding three years, Browns Range was the only significant producer of HREE outside China. Northern Minerals is extremely proud of this achievement and has spent 2022 focusing on refining the path to maintaining this status and potentially expanding our market footprint into the future.

Completion of the pilot plant program, along with all the hard work done over the last 12 years, has placed Northern Minerals in a unique position to build a business that positions itself as a key part of the supply chain for the growing rare earth permanent magnet industry.

Our focus for 2022 was the completion of a strategic review of mining and processing potential at Browns Range. In parallel to this, we continued our ongoing investment in exploration to expand the footprint of known mineralisation and Mineral Resources at Browns Range. While the feasibility study for a full scale beneficiation plant was paused to allow the strategic review, it remained central to our plans in 2022 and progression of the study represents a significant part of Northern Minerals' 2023 work program.

Having built up the Company's expertise and intellectual property on production of both xenotime concentrate and rare earth carbonate (REC) through work to date, 2023 will see the Northern Minerals team continue on the journey to full scale operations and commercialisation of the Browns Range Project.

Pilot Plant operations

During the financial year 2022, the Pilot Plant milled 8,493 tonnes of ore and produced 70,307kg of Rare Earth Carbonate (REC) containing 6,335kg of dysprosium oxide and 2,140kg of terbium oxide.

At year end, Northern Minerals' total production of REC export product from its Browns Range Pilot Plant since inception reached 281,416 kg, containing 139,852 kg of Rare Earth Oxides, which includes 16,086 kg of dysprosium oxide and 2,140 kg of terbium oxide.

After completion of the test work program in the March quarter, the Browns Range Pilot Plant was placed on care and maintenance as planned. The results of the program are now being used as the foundation for the feasibility study to develop a commercial scale mining and processing operation at Browns Range.

The pilot plant project was a three-year research and development project, aimed at assessing the economic and technical aspects of a heavy rare earth mine and processing facility, and provided valuable information to feed into the current study.

Using existing run-of-mine ore through the Browns Range pilot plant, including the ore sorting circuit, the company undertook large scale test work using different ore from existing stockpiles mined from two open pits at Browns Range.

This important data will be pivotal in designing the proposed circuit and specifications for commercial-scale operations at Browns Range and allow delivery of quality concentrate that meets customer specifications.

The pilot program has also provided the opportunity to gain significant production experience and to receive feedback on carbonate product specifications from Northern Minerals' European off-take partner, thyssenkrupp Materials Trading GmbH.

Ore sorting

Northern Minerals made significant steps towards increasing processing efficiency at Browns Range through the test work on large bulk ore samples using ore sorting equipment installed in July 2021. By selecting ore and rejecting waste based primarily on x-ray transmission detection, the ore sorting equipment effectively concentrates ore prior to entering the beneficiation circuit and increases the feed grade to the mill.

The continuous running of the plant simulated full scale operations and validated the potential impact of ore sorting to the economics of a future commercial scale beneficiation plant. A variety of ore types were tested, including lower grade stockpiles that were not previously feasible to process through the pilot plant. The potential to add lower grade material to the feed mix will extend the overall life of any future commercial operation.

The high grade total rare earth oxide (TREO) product from ore sorter test work is expected to increase the overall grade entering the beneficiation circuit by up to 60% for the target xenotime concentrate grade of 25% TREO. The higher feed grade will reduce the \$/kg TREO operational cost, as the fixed process operating costs account for ~46% of the overall cost and the TREO units produced will increase.

Processing higher grade feed can potentially reduce power consumption at Brown's Range, resulting from less tonnes milled for same TREO in

xenotime concentrate, and therefore reduce reagent consumption and carbon emissions as well as lowering overall processing costs.

A further potential outcome will be maximising the future beneficiation plant's throughput rate to take advantage of economies of scale, balanced with the available Mineral Resource base and practical mining rates.

Results from this bulk ore sorting test work will be considered in the feasibility study to produce a heavy rare earth xenotime concentrate from a commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range.

Strategy Review

In the March quarter, Northern Minerals undertook a review of the company's commercialisation strategy. The review confirmed that producing and marketing a mixed heavy rare earth concentrate from the proposed commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range is the preferred near-term strategy.

The emergence of local customers with capacity and interest in an off-take agreement to purchase the mixed heavy rare earth concentrate feedstock from Browns Range underpins the strategy.

A full scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range represents an accelerated pathway to commercial scale production and is a lower risk approach compared to pursuing a full-scale version of the Browns Range Pilot Plant, which includes both the beneficiation and hydrometallurgical processing circuits.

Developing the beneficiation plant first could potentially deliver cashflow to the Company at least two years earlier than a process plant that includes the hydrometallurgical circuit.

Subsequent to the review, a set of work programs were developed to address risk areas identified during the strategic review. These programs will be part of the feasibility study for a proposed commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range.

Feasibility Study

Work on the feasibility study for the full scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range was paused and reviewed as part of the strategic review undertaken in 2022. Work programs were slowed down to ensure the Company's resources are focused on supporting the right strategy.

The proposed beneficiation plant will produce a dysprosium and terbium-rich HREE concentrate product. Producing a concentrate at commercial scale as a first step will allow Northern Minerals to become more competitive and financially resilient.

Since the strategic review, Northern Minerals has been focused on translating the considerable intellectual property obtained through research and development activities into the feasibility study.

Research & Development (R&D)

The Company lodged its tax return and refundable Research and Development (R&D) tax offset claim with the Australia Taxation Office for the 30 June 2022 financial year. The Company's tax offset claim for the financial year 2022 is for \$4.1 million of eligible R&D work.

In financial year 2022, experiments were conducted on all areas of the plant, including ore sorting, fine grinding, magnetic separation, flotation, sulphation bake, leaching, purification, ion exchange, rare earth precipitation and wastewater treatment.

The major focus was on continuing testing the ore sorter on ore from the Wolverine and Gambit West deposits with additional ore sorting tests done on ore from the Banshee deposit.

Significant research effort was also put into testing the behaviour of the ore sorted material being processed in the beneficiation plant and subsequently in the hydrometallurgical plant.

The bulk ore sorting test work is a key input for the full-scale beneficiation plant feasibility study which will also leverage the substantial technical,



operational and economic data from the R&D test work at the Pilot Plant since 2018.

Work also continued on developing an alternative technology for the sulphation baking process to replace the conventional rotary kiln process.

Off-take and Market

Over 2021-22, Northern Minerals sold over 106 tonnes of heavy rare earth carbonate from the Browns Range Pilot Plant.

Market opportunities have been identified to produce and sell a HREE concentrate from a commercial beneficiation plant. Concentrate from Browns Range has the potential to support the broader critical minerals supply chain domestically as well as enable new export relationships with allied countries looking to partner with Australia to develop alternative supply chains.

Heavy rare earth pricing has experienced significant increases over the last two years – Dysprosium (Dy) prices have increased 39% from July 2020 to a June 2022 price of US\$375/kg, while Terbium (Tb) prices have increased 226% over the same period to a current price US\$2,135/kg. Yttrium (Y) has risen even more experiencing a 331% increase to US\$12.50/kg.

Dysprosium and terbium demand

The work done over the last 10 years has positioned Northern Minerals to prosper as a key part of the supply chain for the growing permanent magnet industry. Browns Range will produce critical metals for a low carbon future, where rare earth-based permanent magnet electric motors are going to increasingly power the way the world works, from vehicles, to homes, and to industry.

NdFeB permanent magnets used in electric drivetrains in passenger cars require both dysprosium (Dy) and terbium (Tb), the primary payable commodities from Browns Range production, and forecast demand is strong.

Global light vehicle production is forecast to increase significantly by 2030 with more than half of expected to be electric, full hybrid and mild hybrid electric vehicles. By 2030, the global light electric vehicle market is forecast to be dominated by permanent magnet motor powertrains.

The outlook for rare earths, and especially for magnet metals is very positive. Growing adoption of EVs, wind turbines and energy-efficient HVAC systems is driving increased demand for NdFeB permanent magnets.

Governments are adopting policies to reduce carbon intensity, and this is stimulating product innovation to improve energy efficiency. A leading driver for growth in demand will be the rapid uptake of large scale onshore and offshore wind turbines powered by large scale permanent magnets.

Another key driver will be the growth in demand in the electric vehicle industry as well as energy-saving elevators in energy-efficient buildings and growing use of robots in smart manufacturing designs.

This demand from industry is colliding with increased efforts by various governments to boost strategic defence capabilities, a trend only intensified by geopolitical developments.

However, rare earths used in drivetrains have been classified as “critical minerals” and global supply for HREE is limited due to the monopoly position of Chinese production. The forecast increase in electric vehicle sales and growth is at a risk because of restricted access and supply issues of raw and finished commodities – particularly HREE.

Exploration & Geology Report



EXPLORATION & GEOLOGY REPORT

Northern Minerals' tenements are located in the East Kimberley and Tanami regions of northern Western Australia and the Northern Territory and comprise three main project areas, namely Browns Range, John Galt and Boulder Ridge.




Figure 1: Northern Minerals Project Locations

Western Australian Exploration

During the financial year ending 30 June 2022, Northern Minerals conducted a major drilling program at Browns Range, completing 17,500 metres of reverse circulation (RC) drilling and 3,200 metres of diamond drilling.

The primary objective of the program was to increase the heavy rare earth Mineral Resource and life of mine potential at Browns Range. RC drilling targeted anomalous prospects within a 20 km radius of the Browns Range pilot processing facility, whilst diamond drilling provided core samples from the Wolverine deposit targeting the hanging wall for geotechnical and underground mine design purposes.




Figure 2: Browns Range Location and Prospects




Figure 3: Cyclops Mineralised TREO Intercept

Encouraging drill results were received from the Cyclops, Rockslider and Banshee prospects including 15.65m @ 1.83% total rare earth oxide (TREO) from 24.35m in BRCD0001 at Cyclops (Figure 3). The mineralisation style seen at Cyclops is very similar to that seen at the Company's flagship Wolverine deposit that has a current Mineral Resource estimate of 4.85 Mt @ 0.86% TREO.

Other encouraging assay results were returned from Dazzler, Rockslider, Banshee and Zero prospects. Best results included 23m @ 1.12% TREO from 30m in BRDR0175 at Dazzler, 103m @ 0.32% TREO from 15m in BRR0560 at Rockslider, 13m @ 0.59% TREO from 43m in BRBR0171 at Banshee and 12m @ 0.62% TREO from 36m in BRR0585A at Zero.

Northern Minerals will follow-up these results, and results at Cyclops, in the second half of 2022. Future exploration will prioritise higher-grade resources of the Dazzler unconformity related type targeting radiometric anomalies within the SE corridor from Dazzler to the NT border including the Rogue, Pulse and Quicksilver targets.

Northern Territory Exploration

While Northern Minerals' exploration activities over the past 10 years has centred around the Browns Range WA tenements, the Company holds approximately 3,600 square kilometres of prospective, granted tenure within the Northern Territory.

Desk top studies were completed on this tenure during the 2021/2022 wet season utilising internal and external geochemical and geophysical data sets to identify prospective geology that is likely to host HRE mineralisation. Helicopter supported geological reconnaissance during the first half of 2022 concentrated on the eastern side of the Browns Range Dome where the Company has identified numerous targets that share similar structural affinities with the Wolverine deposit. These will be followed up during the second half of 2022 with mapping and sampling programmes.

The Company undertook geological mapping and sampling over the highly prospective Boulder Ridge prospect, located 100 km to the south-east of Browns Range. Historical surface rock chip sampling returned highly anomalous TREO grades. This follow-up work involved geological mapping, rock chip sampling and pXRF surveys.

Mineralisation was identified within quartz vein breccias over several kilometres in strike. Further significant rock chip samples confirmed anomalous historical TREO results. best results included 6.49% TREO 5.77% TREO and 5.16% TREO from quartz breccia veins within the prospect area.

Based on the results from mapping and sampling, the Company has now planned a RC drill programme to test the strike and depth extent of this mineralisation. Drilling is expected to commence at the start of the dry season in 2023.

In 2001 Mr Curtis took control of ASX listed Lynas Corporation and refocused it as a rare earths company developing the Mt Weld rare earth deposit in Western Australia and a large downstream rare earth processing plant in Kuantan in Malaysia. He retired from Lynas in 2015 after the plant in Malaysia was fully commissioned.

DIVIDENDS

No dividends have been paid or declared by the Company during the financial year or subsequent to the year end.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the Company during the course of the financial year was the operation of a pilot scale project aimed at assessing the technical and economic feasibility of a full-scale commercial operation at its Browns Range Pilot Plant Project. The pilot plant was placed in care and maintenance in the March quarter of 2022.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

During the year, the Company continued operation at the Browns Range Pilot Plant Project. The pilot plant project was a three-year research and development project, to assess the economic and technical feasibility of a heavy rare earth mine and process, and forms part of a broader ongoing feasibility study to develop a commercial scale operation at Browns Range. The plant entered care and maintenance in the March quarter of the financial year after the completion of testwork.

Browns Range Pilot Plant Operations

Northern Minerals successfully completed the installation and commissioning of the ore sorting system at the end of the 30 June 2021 financial year. During this period, the Group focussed on the testing of the ore sorter system and producing ore sorted material. This material was then processed through the pilot beneficiation plant at Browns Range and converted to a ~30% TREO (Total Rare Earth Oxide) xenotime concentrate, which was then processed through the hydrometallurgical plant to produce a rare earth carbonate (REC). A total of 106,106 kg of REC was shipped for sale to thyssenkrupp.

The Group completed the three year test program on the Pilot Plant at Browns Range during the March 2022 quarter. The results of these test programs including results from the ore sorter will be utilised when the feasibility study is restarted. The Pilot Plant was put on care and maintenance at completion of this testwork.

Following the appointment of a new Chairman and Director in the period the Group undertook a review of the Group's strategy. The review concluded that producing and marketing a mixed heavy rare earth concentrate from the proposed commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range is the preferred near-term strategy for the Company.

As a result of the strategic review, a pause and review of the feasibility study for a full-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range was implemented post 31 December 2021. A set of work programs have been developed to address risk areas identified during the strategic review which, together with continuing discussions in relation to off-take agreement for the concentrate, will be required prior to restarting the Feasibility Study (FS) for a commercial-scale beneficiation plant at Browns Range.

EXPLORATION

During the second half of the 2021 calendar year, Northern Minerals conducted a drilling programme at Browns Range completing 17,500 metres of reverse circulation (RC) drilling and 3,200 metres of diamond drilling.

RC drilling targeted anomalous prospects within a 20km radius of the Browns Range pilot processing facility whilst diamond drilling provided core samples from the Wolverine hanging wall for geotechnical and underground mine design purposes.

Encouraging drill results were received from the Cyclops, Rockslider and Banshee prospects. Best result from Cyclops was 15.65m @ 1.83% total rare earth oxide (TREO) from 24.35m in BRCD0001. The mineralisation style seen at Cyclops is very similar to that seen at the Company's flagship deposit Wolverine that has a current Mineral Resource estimate of 4.85 Mt @ 0.86% TREO.

Other encouraging assay results were also returned from Dazzler, Rockslider, Banshee and Zero prospects. Best results included 23m @ 1.12% TREO from 30m in BRDR0175 at Dazzler, 103m @

0.32% TREO from 15m in BRR0560 at Rockslider, 13m @ 0.59% TREO from 43m in BRBR0171 at Banshee and 12m @ 0.62% TREO from 36m in BRR0585A at Zero.

The Company undertook geological mapping and sampling over the highly prospective Boulder Ridge prospect, located 150 km to the south-east of Browns Range. Historical surface rock chip sampling returned highly anomalous TREO grades. This follow up work involved geological mapping, rock chip sampling and pXRF surveys.

Mineralisation was identified within quartz vein breccias over several kilometres in strike. Further significant rock chip samples confirmed anomalous historical TREO results. Best results included 12.69% TREO, 12.22% TREO and 9.6% TREO from quartz breccia veins within the prospect area.

Based on the results from mapping and sampling, the Company has now planned a RC drill programme to test the strike and depth extent of this mineralisation. Drilling is expected to commence at the start of the dry season in 2023.

CORPORATE

R&D Funding

In December 2021, the Company received A\$4.3 million for its 2021 financial year refundable Research and Development tax offset for its eligible R & D work.

The net loss of the Group for the year ended 30 June 2022 of A\$24.4 million (2021: A\$8.5 million) was impacted by a reduction in the R & D rebate on eligible expenditure, due to the nature of the operations in the year, as well as all deferred revenue in relation to the BBRF grant being recognised in the prior year. This was partly offset by the A\$3.9 million of sales revenue for product sold in the year to our offtake partner thysseKrupp Materials Trading GmbH in the current financial year.

Depreciation expenses increased to A\$7.7 million (2021: A\$1.6 million) due to a change in estimate of the useful life of assets held as part of the pilot plant. When testwork was completed and the plant entered care and maintenance, a review was undertaken resulting in A\$3.6 million of additional depreciation. Additional depreciation was also incurred after completion of installation and commissioning of the ore sorter at the Browns Range Pilot Plant in the year.

There was an increase in exploration activities in the period including substantial drilling campaigns, as well as commencement of work on the feasibility study for a full-scale beneficiation plant. Exploration expenditure increased by A\$3.4 million in FY22 and feasibility study work programmes totalled A\$1.9 million.

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The Company's cash receipts for the year FY22 were A\$8.6 million (2021: A\$22.1 million). This included A\$3.8 million received for the sale of rare earth carbonate as well as the receipt of A\$4.3 million for the R&D refundable tax offsets due.

Investing cash flows decreased from A\$7.6 million FY21 to A\$0.5 million in FY22. The focus of this investing cash flows was related to the instalment and commissioning of the ore sorter circuit at the Browns Range Pilot Plant and also included A\$4.5 million in payments under the original EPC contract with Sinosteel in FY21.

Financing cash inflows for the FY22 included A\$0.3 million for the issue of shares (net of costs) as a result of the exercise of options.

The Company's receivables are A\$4.8 million as at 30 June 2022 of which A\$4.1 million is in relation to the R&D claim by the Company for FY22.

Property, plant and equipment has decreased from A\$12.2 million at 30 June 2021 to A\$5.0 million at 30 June 2022. This decrease primarily relates to the reassessment of the useful life of the pilot plant equipment at Browns Range on entering care and maintenance during the year.

Total interest-bearing liabilities represents the lease liabilities of equipment and the lease liability for office premises.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE STATE OF AFFAIRS

There were no significant changes in the state of affairs of the Group during the year other than as disclosed elsewhere in this report.

FINANCIAL POSITION

The financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activity and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business.

The Group has reported a net loss for the year ended 30 June 2022 of A\$24,356,842 (2021: A\$8,528,318) and experienced net cash outflows from operating activities of A\$16,929,326 (2021: A\$885,013). As at 30 June 2022 the Group had cash on hand of A\$2,857,574 (2021: A\$19,897,420) and a net working capital surplus of A\$5,616,912 (2021: A\$22,031,954).

In addition, the claim for the refundable R&D tax offset for FY22 has been lodged and expected to be received within the December 2022 quarter and is estimated at A\$4.1 million.

Management has prepared a cash flow forecast which indicates that the Group will need to raise additional funds. The Directors carefully manage discretionary expenditure in line with the Group's cash flow forecast.

The Directors consider the going concern basis of preparation to be appropriate based on forecast cash flows and preliminary and incomplete discussions regarding potential funding arrangements, giving then confidence in raising additional funds through the issue of new equity or through alternative funding arrangements. In the event that the Group is not successful in raising sufficient funds, there exists a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern and realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities in the normal course of business and at the amounts stated in the financial report.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS AND EXPECTED RESULTS

The Company proposes to continue with its development of the Browns Range Pilot Plant Project as detailed in the Review of Operations in the Annual Report.

ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATION AND PERFORMANCE

The exploration and mining activities of the Company are subject to environmental regulations imposed by various regulatory authorities, particularly those relating to ground disturbance and the protection of rare and endangered flora and fauna. The Company has complied with all material environmental requirements up to the date of this report. The Directors believe that the Company has adequate systems in place for the management of its environmental responsibilities and are not aware of any breaches of the regulations during the period covered by this report.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Group takes a proactive approach to risk management. The Board is responsible for ensuring that risks, and opportunities are identified on a timely basis and that the Group's objectives and activities are aligned with the risks and opportunities identified by the Board.

Northern Minerals has developed a framework for a risk management policy and internal compliance and control system that covers the organisational, financial and operational aspects of the Company's affairs. The responsibility for undertaking and assessing risk management and internal control effectiveness is delegated to management, and management are required to regularly report back to the Board. This involves the tabling of a risk register which is monitored and updated by management periodically. The CEO is responsible for ensuring the maintenance of, and compliance with, appropriate systems. The Board adopts practices to identify significant areas of risk and to effectively manage those risks in accordance with the Group's risk profile. Where appropriate the Board draws on the expertise of appropriate external consultants to assist in dealing with or mitigating risk.

In accordance with best practice corporate governance, the structure of non-executive director and executive remuneration is separate and distinct.

The Company does not currently have a policy pertaining to Directors hedging their exposure to risks associated with the Company's securities they receive as compensation.

The Company has not used any remuneration consultants in the year.

2. Non-executive Director Remuneration

The Board seeks to set aggregate remuneration at a level which provides the Company with the ability to attract and retain directors of the highest calibre, whilst incurring a cost which is acceptable to the shareholders.

Each of the Non-executive Directors receive a fixed fee for their services as a director. There is no direct link between cash remuneration paid to any of the directors and corporate performance such as bonus payments for achievement of certain key performance indicators.

The Constitution and the ASX Listing Rules specify that the aggregate remuneration of Non-executive Directors must be determined from time to time by a general meeting. An amount not exceeding the amount determined is then divided between the directors as agreed. The latest determination was on 22 July 2021 when shareholders approved an aggregate remuneration of A\$800,000 per year. Annual Non-executive Chairman and Non-executive Directors' base fees are presently A\$85,000 and A\$65,000 respectively, inclusive of superannuation, with A\$5,000 per annum paid for representation on each board committee.

The amount of aggregate remuneration sought to be approved by shareholders and the manner in which it is apportioned amongst directors is reviewed annually. The Board considers the fees paid to Non-executive Directors of comparable companies when undertaking the annual review process.

All Non- executive Directors enter into a service agreement with the Company in the form of a letter of appointment. This letter summarises the Board policies and terms, including remuneration, relevant to the office of director.

3. Executive Remuneration

Executives receive a fixed remuneration set to provide a base level commensurate with their position and responsibilities within the Company and so as to align the interests of executives with those of shareholders and ensure total remuneration is competitive by market standards.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This section sets out the accounting policies that relate to the financial statements of Northern Minerals Limited (“the Company”) and its subsidiaries (“the Group”). Where an accounting policy, critical accounting estimate, assumption and judgement is specific to a note, these are described within the note to which they relate. These policies have been consistently applied to all periods presented, except as described in Note 23 New standards and Interpretations.

The consolidated financial statements of “the Company” and “the Group” for the year ended 30 June 2022 were authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the directors on 31 August 2022.

1. Reporting Entity

Northern Minerals Limited is a company limited by shares incorporated and domiciled in Australia where its shares are publicly traded on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX), and the entity is a for profit entity.

The nature of the operations and principal activities of the Company are described in the Directors' Report.

2. Basis of Preparation

The financial report is a general purpose financial report, which has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001, Australian Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board. The financial report has also been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for derivative financial instruments and certain other financial assets and liabilities, which are required to be measured at fair value.

The financial report complies with Australian Accounting Standards, as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board.

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars which is the Group's functional currency and all values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

The Group has, where applicable, adopted all of the new and revised Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (the AASB) that are relevant to their operations and effective for the year ended 30 June 2022. Refer to note 23 New Standards and Interpretations for further details. The Group did not early adopt any Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have been issued or amended but are not yet effective.

a) Financial Position

The financial report has been prepared on the going concern basis, which contemplates the continuity of normal business activity and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the normal course of business.

The Group has reported a net loss for the year ended 30 June 2022 of A\$24,356,842 (2021: A\$8,528,318) and experienced net cash outflows from operating activities of A\$16,929,326 (2021: A\$885,013). As at 30 June 2022 the Group had cash on hand of A\$2,857,574 (2021: A\$19,897,420) and a net working capital surplus of A\$5,616,910 (2021: A\$22,031,954).

In addition, the claim for the refundable R&D tax offset for FY22 has been lodged and expected to be received within the December 2022 quarter and is estimated at A\$4.1 million.

Management has prepared a cash flow forecast which indicates that the Group will need to raise additional funds. The Directors carefully manage discretionary expenditure in line with the Group's cash flow forecast.

The Directors consider the going concern basis of preparation to be appropriate based on forecast cash flows and preliminary and incomplete discussions regarding potential funding arrangements, giving then confidence in raising additional funds through the issue of new equity or through alternative funding arrangements. In the event that the Group is not successful in raising sufficient funds, there exists a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern

and realise its assets and extinguish its liabilities in the normal course of business and at the amounts stated in the financial report.

b) Basis of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of Northern Minerals Limited and its subsidiaries as at and for the year ended 30 June 2022. A list of controlled entities at year end is contained within note 13.

The financial statements of subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting period as the parent company, using consistent accounting policies.

3. Critical Accounting Judgements, Estimates, Assumptions and Errors

(a) Significant estimates and judgements

In applying the Group's accounting policies management continually evaluates judgements, estimates and assumptions based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have an impact on the Group. All judgements, estimates and assumptions made are believed to be reasonable based on the most current set of circumstances available to management. Actual results may differ from the judgements, estimates and assumptions. Significant judgements, estimates and assumptions made by management in the preparation of these financial statements are outlined below:

Taxation

Balances disclosed in the financial statements and the notes thereto related to taxation are based on the best estimates of the Directors. These estimates take into account both the financial performance and position of the Group as they pertain to current income taxation legislation, and the Directors understanding thereof. No adjustment has been made for pending or future taxation legislation. The current income tax position represents the directors' best estimate, in respect of R & D and the decline in value of the pilot plant.

Share-based payment transactions

The Group measures the cost of equity-settled transactions with employees, vendors and suppliers by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted. The fair value is determined by an internal valuation using a Black-Scholes option pricing model, using the assumptions detailed in note 17.

Rehabilitation provision

The recognition of closure and rehabilitation provisions require significant estimates and assumptions such as requirements of the relevant legal and regulatory framework and the timing, extent and costs of required closure and rehabilitation activity. These uncertainties may result in future actual expenditure differing from the amounts currently provided. Refer to note 10(c).

Lease terms

In determining the lease terms for right-of-use-assets, management considers all facts and circumstances that create an economic incentive to exercise an extension option, or not exercise a termination option. Extension options (or periods after termination options) are only included in the lease term if the lease is reasonably certain to be extended (or not terminated). For leases of offices, the following factors are normally the most relevant:

- If any leasehold improvements are expected to have a significant remaining value, the Group is typically reasonably certain to extend (or not terminate).
- If there are significant penalty payments to terminate (or not extend), the Group is typically reasonably certain to extend (or not terminate).
- Otherwise, the Group considers other factors including historical lease durations and the costs and business disruption required to replace the leased asset.

The lease term is reassessed if an option is actually exercised (or not exercised) or the group becomes obliged to exercise (or not exercise) it. The assessment of reasonable certainty is only revised if a significant event or a significant change in circumstances occurs, which affects the assessment, and that is within the control of the lessee.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic

Judgement has been exercised in considering the impacts that the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has had, or may have, on the consolidated entity based on known information. This consideration extends to the nature of the activities and geographic regions in which the consolidated entity operates. Other than as addressed in specific notes, there does not currently appear to be either any significant impact upon the financial statements or any significant uncertainties with respect to events or conditions which may impact the consolidated entity unfavourably as at the reporting date or subsequently as a result of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

4. Exploration and evaluation expenditure

The Group's accounting policy for exploration expenditure is to expense costs as incurred in accordance with AASB 6 *Exploration for and Evaluation of Mineral Resources*. The Group has determined that expenditure in relation to the pilot plant can still be accounted for under AASB 6, given the main activity of the Company relates to evaluating the technical feasibility and commercial viability of extracting the mineral resource. Items of plant and equipment purchased as part of the pilot plant are capitalised.

- determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money;
- allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and
- recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods and services promised.

Current year revenue from contracts with customers has resulted from the sale of Rare Earth Carbonate ("REC") to a single external customer. Revenue from REC sales is brought to account when the significant risks and rewards of ownership have transferred to the buyer and selling prices are known or can be reliably estimated.

R&D rebates and government grants

The Company's accounting policy for R&D rebates and government grants is to recognise these when there is reasonable assurance that:

- The expenditure incurred during the financial period complies with relevant legislation and activities; and
- The rebates claimed will be received.

Rebates and grants relating to costs are deferred and recognised in the profit or loss over the period necessary to match them with the costs that they are intended to compensate.

Government grants relating to the purchase of property, plant and equipment are included in liabilities as deferred revenue and are credited to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the expected lives of the related assets.

For details of unfulfilled conditions or other contingencies attaching to these grants see Note 14.

A government grant is not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the entity will comply with the conditions attaching to it, and that the grant will be received. Receipt of a grant does not of itself provide conclusive evidence that the conditions attaching to the grant have been or will be fulfilled.

Financial assets not measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income are classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Typically, such financial assets will be either:

- held for trading, where they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the short-term with an intention of making a profit, or a derivative; or
- designated as such upon initial recognition where permitted.

Fair value movements are recognised in profit or loss. Despite these requirements, a financial asset may be irrevocably designated as measured at fair value through profit or loss to reduce the effect of, or eliminate, an accounting mismatch.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows have expired or have been transferred and the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. When there is no reasonable expectation of recovering part or all of a financial asset, its carrying value is written off.

Impairment of financial assets

The Group recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets which are either measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income. The measurement of the loss allowance depends upon the Group's assessment at the end of each reporting period as to whether the financial instruments credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, based on reasonable and supportable information that is available, without undue cost or effort to obtain.

Where there has not been a significant increase in exposure to credit risk since initial recognition, a 12-month expected credit loss allowance is estimated. This represents a portion of the assets lifetime expected credit losses that is attributable to a default event that is possible within the next 12 months. Where a financial asset has become credit impaired or where it is determined that credit risk has increased significantly, the loss allowance is based on the assets lifetime expected credit losses. The amount of expected credit loss recognised is measured on the basis of the probability weighted present value of anticipated cash shortfalls over the life of the instrument discounted at the original effective interest rate.

For financial assets measured at fair value through other comprehensive income, the loss allowance is recognised within other comprehensive income. In all other cases, the loss allowance is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities other than derivatives are initially recognised at fair value of consideration received net of transaction costs as appropriate and are subsequently carried at amortised cost. The Group derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled, or expire.

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate. The amortisation is included in finance costs in the statement of profit or loss.

For the interest-bearing liabilities, the fair values are not materially different to their carrying amounts, since the interest payable on those borrowings is either close to current market rates or the borrowings are of a short-term nature.

Level 1: Quoted (unadjusted) prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities

Level 2: Other techniques for which all inputs which have a significant effect on the recorded fair value are observable, either directly or indirectly

Level 3: Techniques which use inputs that have a significant effect on the recorded fair value that are not based on observable market data

All financial instruments measured at fair value use Level 2 valuation techniques in both years.

There have been no transfers between fair value levels during the reporting period.

9. Financial Risk Management

The Group's principal financial liabilities comprise loans and borrowings and trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial liabilities is to finance the Group's operations. The Group's principal financial assets include trade and other receivables and cash that derive directly from its operations.

The Group's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including currency risk, interest rate risk and price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk. The Group's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Group.

The Group takes a proactive approach to risk management. The Board is responsible for ensuring that risks, and also opportunities are identified on a timely basis and that the Group's objectives and activities are aligned with the risks and opportunities identified by the Board. The Board provides policies for overall risk management, as well as policies covering specific areas, such as foreign exchange risk, interest rate risk and credit risk.

a) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises interest rate risk, currency risk and other price risk.

The Group's revenue from contracts with customers is invoiced in US dollars. The Group did not enter into any FX hedging agreements in relation to its revenue transactions.

b) Credit Risk

Credit risk is managed on a Group basis. Credit risk arises from cash and cash equivalents and deposits with banks and financial institutions, as well as credit exposure relating to outstanding receivables and committed transactions. The Group has minimal credit risk with regards to its bank held deposits which are all held with reputable institutions. The Group has minimal credit risk in relation to its receivables.

The maximum exposure to credit risk at the reporting date is the carrying amount of the receivables. Collateral is not held as security. There are no significant concentrations of credit risk within the Group.

c) Liquidity Risk

Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash and the availability of funding through an adequate amount of committed credit facilities. The Group manages liquidity risk by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows and matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities. Group management aims at maintaining flexibility in funding by keeping committed credit lines available.

Management monitors rolling forecasts of the Group's liquidity reserve and cash and cash equivalents. In addition, the Group's liquidity policy involves projecting cash flows in major currencies and considering the level of liquid assets necessary to meet these and monitoring debt financing plans.

The Company:

- continuously monitors forecasts and actual cash flows and the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities to manage its liquidity risk;
- manages liquidity risk by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows and matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities. Surplus funds are invested in short-term bank deposits.

Financing arrangements

The Group has no access to undrawn borrowing facilities at the end of the reporting period.

Property, plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment charges. Cost is the fair value of consideration given to acquire the asset at the time of its acquisition or construction and includes the direct cost of bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for operation and its estimated future cost of closure and rehabilitation.

Subsequent costs are included in the assets carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Group and the cost of the item can be reliably measured. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of profit or loss during the reporting period in which they are incurred.

Any item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal.

Any gain or loss arising on derecognising of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the statement of profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

Depreciation and amortisation

The carrying amounts of property, plant and equipment are depreciated to their estimated residual value over the estimated useful lives of the specific assets concerned, or the estimated life of the associated project, if shorter. Estimates of residual values and useful lives are reassessed annually and any change in estimate is taken into account in the determination of remaining depreciation charges. Depreciation commences on the date the asset is ready and available for use. The major categories of property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis using estimated lives indicated below.

- Fixed payments (including in- substance fixed payments), less any lease incentives receivable;
- Variable lease payments that are based on an index or a rate, initially measured using the index or rate as at the commencement date;
- Amounts expected to be payable by the Group under residual value guarantees;
- The exercise price of a purchase option if the Group is reasonably certain to exercise that option; and
- Payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the group exercising that option.

Lease payments to be made under reasonably certain extension options are also included in the measurement of the liability.

The lease payments are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease. If that rate cannot be readily determined, the lessee's incremental borrowing rate is used, being the rate that the individual lessee would have to pay to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment with similar terms, security and conditions.

To determine the incremental borrowing rate, the Group:

- Where possible, uses recent third-party financing received by the individual lessee as a starting point, adjusted to reflect changes in financing conditions since third party financing was received
- Uses a build-up approach that starts with a risk-free interest rate adjusted for credit risk for leases held by the Company, which does not have recent third-party financing, and
- Makes adjustments specific to the lease, eg; term, country, currency and security.

Costs included in the provision encompass all closure and rehabilitation activity expected to occur progressively over the life of the operation and at, or after, the time of closure, for disturbance existing at the reporting date. Costs arising from unforeseen circumstances, are recognised as an expense and liability when the event gives rise to an obligation which is probable and capable of reliable estimation.

The timing of the actual closure and rehabilitation expenditure is dependent upon a number of factors such as the life and nature of the asset, the operating licence conditions and the environment in which they operate. Expenditure may occur before and after closure and can continue for an extended period of time dependent on closure and rehabilitation requirements.

Closure and rehabilitation provisions are measured at the expected value of future cash flows, discounted to their present value. Significant judgements and estimates are involved in forming expectations of future activities and the amount and timing of associated cash flows.

When provisions for closure and rehabilitation are initially recognised, the corresponding cost is capitalised as an asset, representing part of the cost of acquiring the future economic benefits of the operation, to the extent that the activity in which the provision is related to is capitalised. The capitalised cost of rehabilitation and closure activities is recognised in property, plant and equipment accordingly. The value of the provision is progressively increased over time due to the effect of discounting unwinding creating an expense recognised in finance expenses. Where the activity in which the provision relates is expensed in accordance with the exploration and evaluation expenditure, the provision expense is also expensed.

Closure and rehabilitation provisions are also adjusted for changes in costs and estimates. Those adjustments are accounted for as a change in the corresponding capitalised cost, except where a reduction in the provision is greater than the undepreciated capitalised cost of the related assets, in which case the capitalised cost is reduced to nil and the remaining adjustment is recognised first against other items in property, plant and equipment and subsequently to the consolidated statement of profit or loss.

Changes to the capitalised cost result in an adjustment to future depreciation.

Adjustments to the estimated amount and timing of future closure and rehabilitation cash flows are a normal occurrence in light of significant judgements and estimates involved.

Government Grants

To ensure that the Company has appropriate mechanisms to continue to attract and retain the services of Directors and employees of a high calibre, the Company has an established Share Plan.

The Directors and employees of the Company have been, and will continue to be, essential to the growth of the Company.

The Directors considered the Plan an appropriate method to:

- a) Reward Directors and employees for their past performance;
- b) Provide long-term incentives to participate in the Company's future growth;
- c) Motivate Directors and employees and generate loyalty in employees; and
- d) Assist to retain the services of valuable employees.

The Plan is used as part of the remuneration planning for senior Employees. ASX corporate governance guidelines recommend that executive remuneration packages involve a balance between fixed and incentive pay reflecting short and long-term performance objectives appropriate to the Company's circumstances and goals.

The Plan is also to be used as part of the remuneration package for non-executive Directors. Although this is not in accordance with the recommendations contained in the corporate governance guidelines, the Company considers that it is appropriate for non-executive Directors to participate in the Plan from time to time, given the size of the Company.

The Company obtained shareholder approval for the introduction of the Plan in November 2007 and lastly approved in November 2020, and any Shares issued under the Plan within 3 years of approval of the Plan, is an exception to Listing Rule 7.1.

Listing Rule 7.1 broadly provides, subject to certain exceptions, that a company may not issue or agree to issue securities representing more than 15% of the nominal value of the company's issued capital at the beginning of any 12-month period without shareholder approval.

Pursuant to the terms of the Plan, the Board or a duly appointed committee of the Board ("Committee") may, at such time as it determines, issue invitations to Directors and Employees of the Company to apply for Shares.
