Summary

Significant activities for the quarter were:

- The capacity of the processing equipment at the Kangaroo Flat Coarse Sand Dam has been enhanced with the purchase of a set of spirals to capture a significant percentage of the gold and sulphides enabling the finer material to be captured in the concentrators.
- Preparations for mining the Harvest Home Open Pit Mine expansion continue to progress.
- The reopening of the Swan Decline at Kangaroo Flat and the program for underground exploration on the Nell Gwynne Line of Reef has the requisite approvals and is ready for implementation.

Introduction

GBM's objective is the establishment and operation of an economically viable underground mine (or series of mines) and associated facilities to exploit the Bendigo Goldfield. An analysis of the goldfield to determine the scope of mineralisation and the potential size and tenor of mineralised zones showed that:

- Systematic exploration beyond the centre of the field both in the historic deep mines and in the modern mine has the highest prospect of success.
- The best of the historic mines usually only worked one or two 'bonanza' reefs but that these were sufficiently rich to furnish a large net profit over the whole life of these mines.
- The initial focus of underground exploration will be the Nell Gwynne Dome in the vicinity of the historic Concord Mine where a prospective zone intersects the decline approximately one kilometre from the decline entrance and 180 metres below surface.

The Company's strategy to maximise the value of the Bendigo Assets is being realised. The Kangaroo Flat coarse sand dam project is in the final stages of implementation. The project is expected to take two to three years to complete.

The Harvest Home Open Pit Mine expansion is now ready to mine with final approvals being granted. A Bulk Sample Pit completed in June 2015 will be expanded in length, width and depth providing a low-cost ore source.

1.0 Mining and Exploration

1.1 Bendigo Project (MIN5344, MIN 5364, MIN 4878, EL 3327, EL 5035)

The most productive portion of the Bendigo Goldfield lies in an envelope some 16 kilometres long by 4 kilometres wide. Within this zone there are seventeen major anticlines, twelve of which account for the bulk of the 16 million ounces of hard rock gold production on the Bendigo Goldfield.

The Bendigo field is one of bonanzas. Instead of large bodies of uniform grade ore, gold at Bendigo is relatively coarse and occurs in shoots which may be of great richness and sometimes great length, in reefs of otherwise nearly barren quartz. The Bendigo reefs recur generally one below the other at irregular intervals, and in many cases one bonanza was sufficiently rich to provide a large net profit over the whole life of a mine.

Although most of the reefs are small in cross-section (though sometimes with considerable continuity along strike) some large saddle/fault reefs and spur zones were mined and remnant ore is likely to exist in and around historic workings at favourable locations.

Nell Gwynne Dome

The Swan Decline development crossed the Nell Gwynne Line of Reef passing within 50 metres of the Concord workings at a depth of approximately 180m below ground level (75mAHD). Drilling by Bendigo Mining from Stockpile 6 (at chainage 843m from portal) in 2009 targeted the Nell Gwynne anticline between -250mAHD and -350mAHD. This drilling revealed mineralisation on a cross-course fault that was named Nankervis Reef. A number of additional exploration targets were identified in the same area but were not followed up.

Research suggests that a structure revealed in the historic Concord Mine may correspond with the Central Nell Gwynne Reef worked profitably further to the north. This structure is estimated to be within tens of metres of the decline in an area of pitch reversal and double folding. Elsewhere on the Bendigo Goldfield this sort of structural complexity is frequently the site of gold mineralisation. The local structure was confirmed by detailed geological mapping of the decline conducted in 1999.

The exploration of the Nell Gwynne Dome is anticipated to take approximately two years to complete. The first stage of the project will entail re-equipping and re-entering the Swan Decline to a position approximately 1,100m from the decline portal. Reconnaissance diamond drilling will be undertaken from drill platforms from within the decline (between 1,000m and 1,100m from the portal) with a view to demonstrating mineralisation potential.

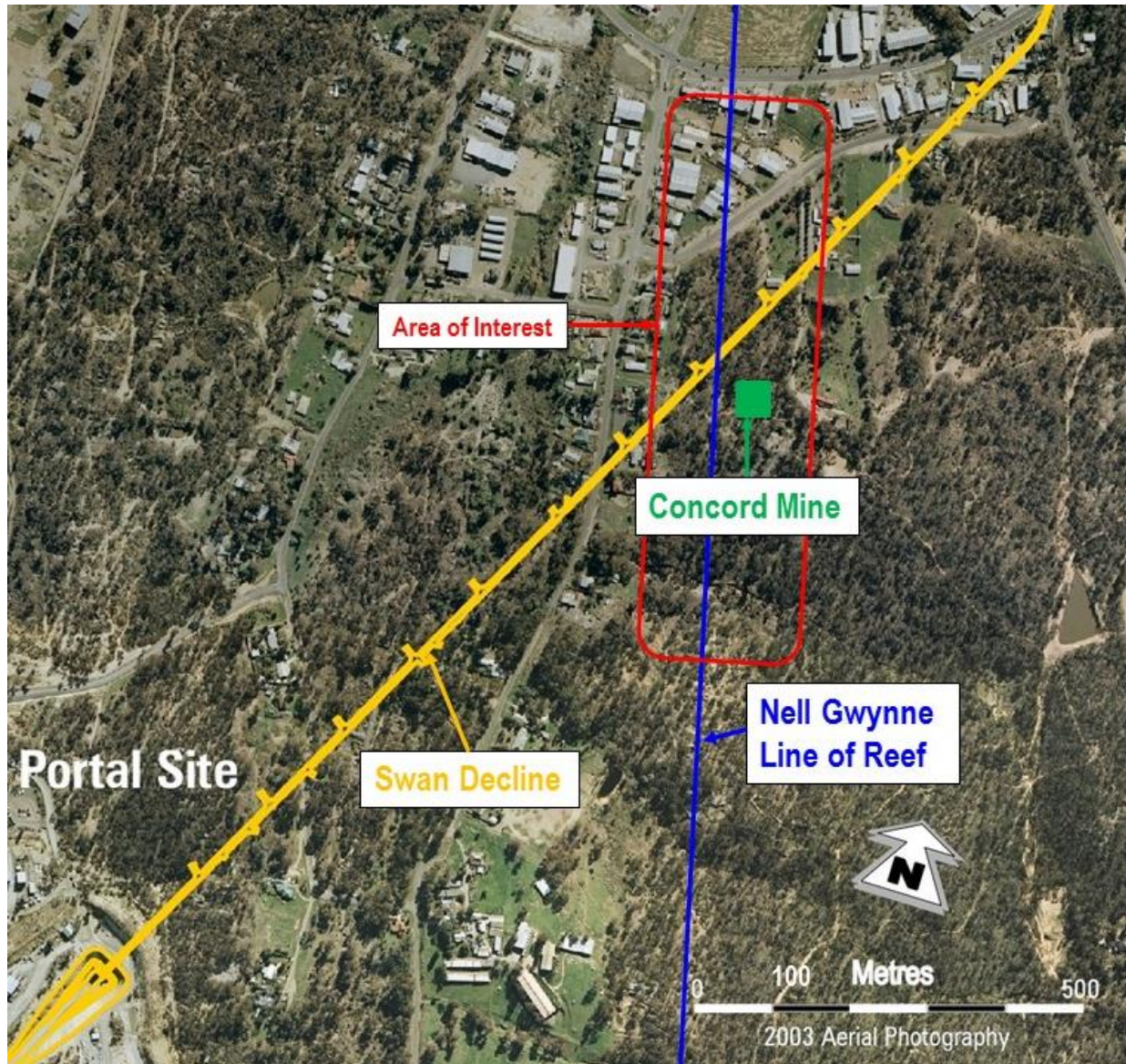


Figure 1: Nell Gwynne Target Exploration Area

The second stage of the project is developing new levels at approximately 1,050m from the portal for distances of approximately 300m north and south along strike of the Nell Gwynne Anticline (Figure 1). This development will be in the western limb of the anticline and will provide the opportunity to establish additional drill platforms for the purpose of defining a mineral resource.

Kangaroo Flat Sand Dam Project

As reported in the September 2017 Quarterly Report, GBM Gold Ltd entered into an agreement with Gold Miners Australia to jointly reprocess tailings sand in the Kangaroo Flat Coarse Sand Dam to recover the contained gold and sulphides.

The wash plant containing 2x35tph Great Engineering concentrators to recover the contained gold and sulphides have been installed and commissioned and is projected to be in operation early in 2019 (see Figure 2). Additional gravity separation equipment is being added to the circuit to increase the efficiency of the operation. The sand dam is estimated to hold 320,000 tonnes indicated and 110,000 tonnes inferred for a total of 430,000 tonnes of material containing 5,100 ounces of gold at a grade of 0.37 g/t as reported in the revised March 2017 Quarterly Report released in April 2017. The project is expected to take two to three years to complete. Profit will be shared 50/50 between the parties.

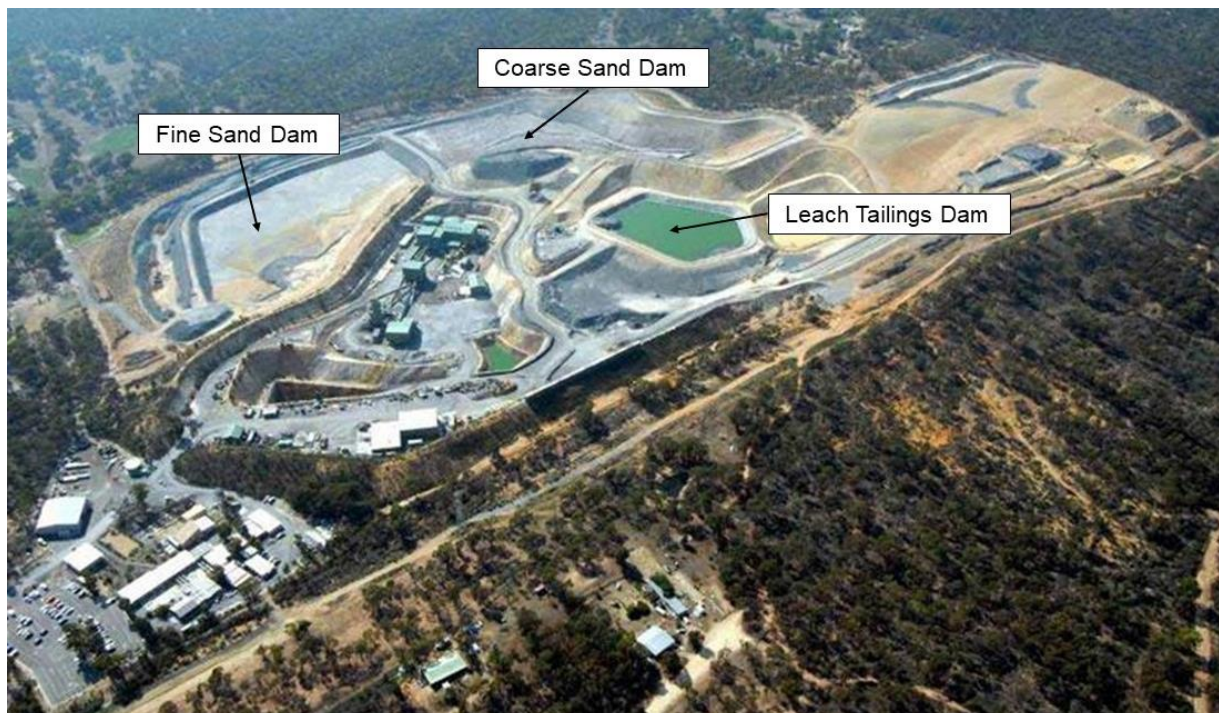


Figure 3: Kangaroo Flat Site

The design of the Kangaroo Flat Mine was focused on the beneficial reuse of by-products to reduce the environmental impact of the project in keeping with the principles of Economically Sustainable Development, and subsequently reduce the area required for by-product (rock and sand) storage. The majority of the tailings from the process plant were planned to be from early process stages that did not require the addition of chemicals for leaching. Implementing these principals resulted in the construction of separate dams for Coarse Sand, Fine Sand and Leached Tailings (Figure 3).

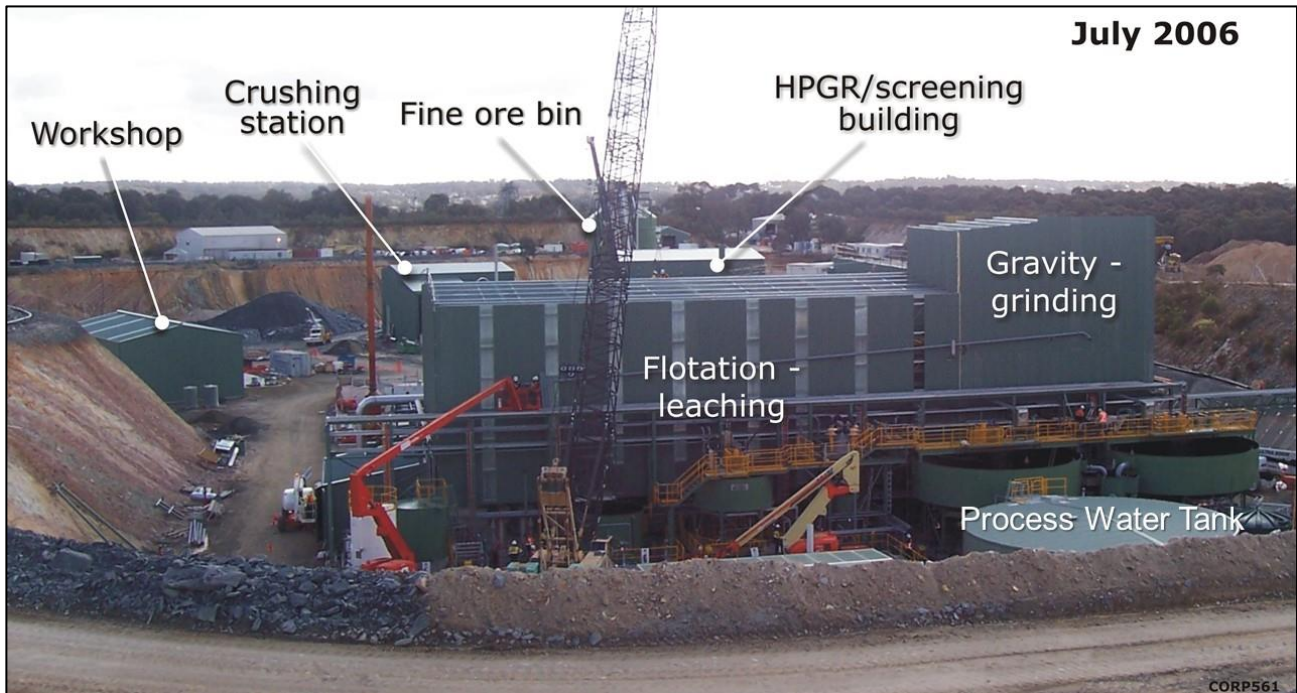


Figure 4: Kangaroo Flat Gold Processing Plant

To accommodate the expected production, Bendigo Mining constructed a 600,000 tonne per annum plant complete with crushing, grinding, gravity, flotation and leaching circuits at a cost of \$64 million (Figure 4). The mined ore tonnage was less than expected, which led to the gold processing plant operating four days per week from 2008 to 2011. Processing inefficiencies caused by the stop/start nature of the operation resulted in the loss of gold and sulphides to the coarse sand dam.

The plant produced 750,000 tonnes of tailings split into the following categories:

- Coarse Sand – 430,000 tonnes
- Fine Sand – 200,000 tonnes
- Leached Tailings – 20,000 tonnes

The concept for the Coarse Sand Dam (Figure 5) outlined in the 2004 Deborah Reef Supplementary EES was for the sale of the 430,000 tonnes of sand for reuse in markets such as the packing sand and concrete market, which did not occur. Reprocessing the sand will improve the quality and increases potential for reuse.

In addition to capturing gold that was lost to this dam during processing the environmental benefits of reprocessing the sand are:

- reduction in arsenic content;
- improved re-use potential, and
- Simpler rehabilitation processes.

The gravity separation wash plant uses no chemicals only water. Water used as an integral part of the separation process also carries the cleaned sand via a pipeline back to the sand dam. Water is then recovered through the return water system to the process water tank (Figure 4) where it is stored for reuse.

The gravity separation equipment in the existing 600,000 tpa plant are a Falcon Model: SB2500 and 4 x Inline Spinners - Gekko, Model: ISP3. The new Great Energy Concentrators operate on the same principals as the existing gravity separation equipment. Technology has advanced since the existing plant was constructed twelve years ago and the new concentrators are quieter and have a significantly higher degree of efficiency (Figure 6).

In summary:

- Gold and sulphide material will be recovered without the use of chemicals
- The gold and sulphide concentrate will be further processed off site to recover the contained gold
- The project will provide an environmental benefit by reducing arsenic content and improving sand reuse potential

1.2 Goldsbrough-Wehla Zone Projects (MIN 5510, EL 5528, MIN 5063 and EL 6369)

These projects lie in the western margin of the Bendigo Zone. The Avoca fault defines the western margin of this zone. The projects are along the 24 km long Goldsbrough–Wehla Shear Zone which forms part of the Wedderburn-Ballarat trend. Within the Goldsbrough–Wehla Shear Zone mineralised quartz reefs occur from Wehla (EL6369) in the north to Harvest Home (MIN 5510) and Queens Birthday in the south. The Queens Birthday Mine at Goldsbrough (EL 5528) and the mine at Stuart's Reef at Moliagul were significant producers of gold with over 100,000 ounces being mined from Queens Birthday.

The Goldsbrough – Wehla Shear Zone is a major deep penetrating structure that has provided fluid pathways for large quantities of gold and quartz. The host rocks are Ordovician deep marine sediments composed of siltstone and shale with minor well sorted and rounded fine grained sandstones. These rocks have been deformed resulting in a moderate west dipping sequence containing north-northwest trending folds that plunge gently (10°) either north or south.

Harvest Home (MIN 5510, 50% Joint Venture with Truelight Mining Pty Ltd)

MMIN 5510 is located approximately 5 kilometres north of Dunolly in Central Victoria on the eastern margin of the Goldsbrough – Wehla Shear. A broad zone of gold mineralisation trending north-northwest through MIN 5510 is approximately 3.5 km long and up to 0.4 km wide. Moran's Luck, Harvest Home, Mother O'Gold and Appleton's Gold mines have produced in excess of 60,000 oz. (1,860kg) of gold between them (Whitehouse and Watts 2009). A number of discrete smaller prospects are also contained within the tenement. The historical mine workings reached depths of up to 122m. A selective program of costeaning and infill drilling will build resource potential at Harvest Home and other prospects on the tenement.

The approvals processes for the development of a production pit that will encompass and extend the existing bulk sample pit is complete. Approximately 44,000 tonnes of ore at an estimated grade of 2.46g/t will be excavated in the next phase of the operation. Mining will be conventional drill & blast utilising hydraulic excavator and articulated trucks. Ore will be hauled from the pit to a stockpile location on site for progressive transfer to an offsite processing facility.

Queens Birthday (EL 5528)

This area is adjacent to and immediately to the south of Harvest Home. It contains the Queen's Birthday mine that historically yielded about 100,000 ounces of primary gold mineralisation and has the potential to expand the resources found on the Harvest Home tenement. GBM has carried out a field exploration survey of the tenement and is preparing the next stage of field sampling aimed at defining targets under cover.

Wehla (EL 6369)

Wehla is a shear hosted gold mineralised system that lies at the northern end of the Goldsbrough – Wehla Shear Zone. The main gold workings consist of north trending auriferous reefs; Adelaide, Prince of Wales, Frenchman's, Petticoat, Black, Bismarck and Little Nell with Scotchman's and Hungarian between 50 and 200 metres to the east. Each discrete set of gold workings provides an exploration target. GBM is preparing an exploration program.

McIntyre (MIN 5093)

The McIntyre project is located 50 kilometres northwest of Maldon just to the east of the Goldsbrough Wehla Shear Zone. Mining Licence MIN 5093 is centred on the Matrix Reef Mine, which is part of the Berlin goldfield. GBM is awaiting finalisation of the transfer of the tenement.

1.3 GBM Gold Exploration Projects**Fiddlers Creek (EL6155)**

There is an abundance of known workings associated with the Percydale Fault Zone. Planned exploration is directed towards known mineralization trends in the vicinity of Fiddlers Creek and Perseverance mines particularly near areas of historical workings.

1.4 Woodvale Evaporation Pond Complex (WEPC)

The remediation plan for this site has been subject to an environmental audit under Section 53V of the Environment Protection Act 1970. The Company is implementing the recommendations of the audit.

2.0 Activities Planned for the March Quarter**Bendigo**

- Commissioning and operating the gravity processing equipment for the coarse sand dam at Kangaroo Flat.
- Planning for exploration of Nell Gwynne exploration target in the Bendigo Goldfield.
- Woodvale Evaporation Pond Complex, implementing the recommendations of the s53v audit.

Harvest Home:

- Preparations for mining on the Open Pit Mine expansion.

4.0 Corporate

As previously advised, the loan of \$3.0 million secured for the Company from Silver Bright International Development Limited, GBM Gold's largest shareholder continues to be delayed. The Company is in discussions on securing an alternate funding package in the event that the funds cannot be released in the short term. This funding package is planned to secure the ability of GBM Gold to meet all of its financial and statutory obligations and set up the Company for the future and enable it to progress its operational plans.

As part of its ongoing capital raising commitment to fund its production and exploration program, GBM Gold also wishes to update the market that the Company is well advanced in its preparation of a fully underwritten rights issue with a plan to make an announcement about the full details of this and the overall funding package in the near future.
