EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This Explanatory Statement has been prepared to provide information which the Directors believe to be material to Shareholders in deciding whether or not to pass the Resolutions.

1. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND REPORTS

In accordance with the Corporations Act, the business of the Meeting will include receipt and consideration of the annual financial report of the Company for the financial year ended 30 June 2024 together with the declaration of the Directors, the Directors' report, the Remuneration Report and the auditor's report.

The Company will not provide a hard copy of the Company's annual financial report to Shareholders unless specifically requested to do so. The Company's annual financial report is available on its website at www.beaconminerals.com.au.

2. RESOLUTION 1 – ADOPTION OF REMUNERATION REPORT

2.1 General

The Corporations Act requires that at a listed company's annual general meeting, a resolution that the remuneration report to be adopted must be put to the shareholders. However, such a resolution is advisory only and does not bind the company or the directors of the company.

The remuneration report sets out the company's remuneration arrangements for the directors and senior management of the company. The remuneration report is part of the directors' report contained in the annual financial report of the company for a financial year.

The chair of the meeting must allow a reasonable opportunity for its shareholders to ask questions about or make comments on the remuneration report at the annual general meeting.

2.2 Voting consequences

A company is required to put to its shareholders a resolution proposing the calling of another meeting of shareholders to consider the appointment of directors of the company (**Spill Resolution**) if, at consecutive annual general meetings, at least 25% of the votes cast on a remuneration report resolution are voted against adoption of the remuneration report and at the first of those annual general meetings a Spill Resolution was not put to vote. If required, the Spill Resolution must be put to vote at the second of those annual general meetings.

If more than 50% of votes cast are in favour of the Spill Resolution, the company must convene a shareholder meeting (**Spill Meeting**) within 90 days of the second annual general meeting.

All of the directors of the company who were in office when the directors' report (as included in the company's annual financial report for the most recent financial year) was approved, other than the managing director of the company, will cease to hold office immediately before the end of the Spill Meeting but may stand for re-election at the Spill Meeting.

Following the Spill Meeting those persons whose election or re-election as directors of the company is approved will be the directors of the company.

2.3 Previous voting results

At the Company's previous annual general meeting the votes cast against the remuneration report considered at that annual general meeting were less than 25%. Accordingly, the Spill Resolution is not relevant for this Meeting.

3. RESOLUTION 2 – ELECTION OF A DIRECTOR - BRETT HODGINS

3.1 General

The Constitution allows the Directors to appoint at any time a person to be a Director either to fill a casual vacancy or as an addition to the existing Directors, but only where the total number of Directors does not at any time exceed the maximum number specified by the Constitution.

Pursuant to the Constitution and Listing Rule 14.4, any Director so appointed holds office only until the next annual general meeting and is then eligible for election by Shareholders but shall not be taken into account in determining the Directors who are to retire by rotation (if any) at that meeting.

Brett Hodgins, having been appointed by other Directors on 3 September 2024 in accordance with the Constitution, will retire in accordance with the Constitution and Listing Rule 14.4 and being eligible, seeks election from Shareholders.

Further information in relation to Brett Hodgins is set out below.

Other material information	The Company conducts appropriate checks on the background and experience of candidates before his appointment to the Board. These include checks as to a person's experience, educational qualifications, character and bankruptcy history. The Company undertook such checks prior to the appointment of Brett Hodgins.

As an additional consequence, this may detract from the Board and Company's ability to execute on its strategic vision.

4. RESOLUTION 3 – RE-ELECTION OF A DIRECTOR - SARAH SHIPWAY

4.1 General

The Constitution sets out the requirements for determining which Directors are to retire by rotation at an annual general meeting.

Sarah Shipway, who has held office without re-election since 21 November 2022, and being eligible retires by rotation and seeks re-election.

Further information in relation to Sarah Shipway is set out below.

Ms Shipway has a Bachelor of Commerce from Murdoch University and is a member of Chartered Accountants Australia and New Zealand.</p> <p>Sarah Shipway is also a Director of St George Mining Limited (ASX: SGQ) and Company Secretary for American West Metals Limited (ASX: AW1) and St George Mining Limited (ASX: SGQ) and previously Cardinal Resources Limited (previously ASX/TSX: CDV).</p>
Term of office	Sarah Shipway has served as a Director since 11 June 2015 and was last re-elected on 21 November 2022
Independence	If re-elected, the Board considers that Sarah Shipway will be an independent Director.
Board recommendation	Having received an acknowledgement from Sarah Shipway that she will have sufficient time to fulfil her responsibilities as a Director and having reviewed the performance of Sarah Shipway since her appointment to the Board and the skills, knowledge, experience and capabilities required by the Board, the Directors (other than Sarah Shipway) recommend that Shareholders vote in favour of this Resolution.

4.2 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If this Resolution is passed, Sarah Shipway will be re-elected to the Board as an independent Director.

If this Resolution is not passed, Sarah Shipway will not continue in her role as an independent Director. The Company may seek nominations or otherwise identify suitably qualified candidates to join the Company. As an additional consequence, this may detract from the Board and Company's ability to execute on its strategic vision.

5. BACKGROUND TO RESOLUTIONS 4 AND 5

On 18 September 2024, the Company lodged a prospectus with ASIC and ASX (**Prospectus**) with respect to a pro-rata non-renounceable entitlement issue of one (1) Share for every eight (8) Shares held by those Shareholders registered at the record date at an issue price of \$0.022 per Share together with one (1) free Option (**New Option**) for every one (1) Share applied for and issued, exercisable at \$0.03 each on or before five (5) years from the date of issue, to raise up to \$10,331,112 (**Entitlement Offer**).

The Entitlement Offer is fully underwritten by Argonaut PCF Limited (ACN 099 761 547) (AFSL 221 476) (**Underwriter**). The Underwriter entered into a number of sub-underwriting agreements, including sub-underwriting agreements with Directors Graham McGarry and Geoffrey Greenhill (or their respective nominees) (**Related Party Sub-Underwriting Agreements**).

The material terms of the Related Party Sub-Underwriting Agreements are as follows:

- (a) Graham McGarry agreed to sub-underwrite \$500,000 (22,727,273 Shares and 22,727,273 New Options);
- (b) Geoffrey Greenhill (or his nominee(s)) agreed to sub-underwrite \$200,000 (9,090,910 Shares and 9,090,910 New Options);
- (c) the Underwriter agreed to pay / issue Messrs McGarry and Greenhill:
 - (i) a 4% cash fee of the value of their individual sub-underwritten amounts; and
 - (ii) two (2) Options for every \$1.00 sub-underwritten, on the same terms as the New Options (**Sub-Underwriting Options**); and
- (d) the Related Party Sub-Underwriting Agreements shall terminate if the Underwriter's obligations under the underwriting agreement with the Company (**Underwriting Agreement**) cease or are terminated.

The issue of the Sub-Underwriting Options is subject to Shareholder approval pursuant to Resolutions 4 and 5.

The Related Party Sub-Underwriting Agreements are otherwise made on terms and conditions considered standard for an agreement of this nature.

6. RESOLUTIONS 4 AND 5 – APPROVAL TO ISSUE SUB-UNDERWRITING OPTIONS TO RELATED PARTIES

6.1 General

This Resolution seeks Shareholder approval for purposes of Listing Rule 10.11 for the issue of an aggregate of 1,400,000 Sub-Underwriting Options to Directors Graham McGarry and Geoffrey Greenhill (or their nominee(s)), in part consideration for their sub-underwriting services.

6.2 Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act

Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act requires that for a public company, or an entity that the public company controls, to give a financial benefit to a related party of the public company, the public company or entity must:

- (a) obtain the approval of the public company's members in the manner set out in sections 217 to 227 of the Corporations Act; and
- (b) give the benefit within 15 months following such approval,

unless the giving of the financial benefit falls within an exception set out in sections 210 to 216 of the Corporations Act.

The issue constitutes giving a financial benefit and Graham McGarry and Geoffrey Greenhill are related parties of the Company by virtue of being Directors.

The Directors (other than Graham McGarry who has a material personal interest in Resolution 4) consider that Shareholder approval pursuant to Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act is not required in respect of the issue because the Sub-Underwriting Options will be issued to Graham McGarry (or his nominee(s)) on the same terms as New Options issued to non-related party sub-underwriters and as such the giving of the financial benefit is on arm's length terms.

The Directors (other than Geoffrey Greenhill who has a material personal interest in Resolution 5) consider that Shareholder approval pursuant to Chapter 2E of the Corporations Act is not required in respect of the issue because the Sub-Underwriting Options will be issued to Geoffrey Greenhill (or his nominee(s)) on the same terms as New Options issued to non-related party sub-underwriters and as such the giving of the financial benefit is on arm's length terms.

6.3 Listing Rule 10.11

Listing Rule 10.11 provides that unless one of the exceptions in Listing Rule 10.12 applies, a listed company must not issue or agree to issue equity securities to:

- 10.11.1 a related party;
- 10.11.2 a person who is, or was at any time in the 6 months before the issue or agreement, a substantial (30%+) holder in the company;
- 10.11.3 a person who is, or was at any time in the 6 months before the issue or agreement, a substantial (10%+) holder in the company and who has nominated a director to the board of the company pursuant to a relevant agreement which gives them a right or expectation to do so;
- 10.11.4 an associate of a person referred to in Listing Rules 10.11.1 to 10.11.3; or
- 10.11.5 a person whose relationship with the company or a person referred to in Listing Rules 10.11.1 to 10.11.4 is such that, in ASX's opinion, the issue or agreement should be approved by its shareholders,

unless it obtains the approval of its shareholders.

The issue falls within Listing Rule 10.11.1 and does not fall within any of the exceptions in Listing Rule 10.12. It therefore requires the approval of Shareholders under Listing Rule 10.11.

6.4 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolutions 4 and 5 are passed, the Company will be able to proceed with the issue within one month after the date of the Meeting (or such later date as permitted by any ASX waiver or modification of the Listing Rules). As approval pursuant to Listing Rule 7.1 is not required for the issue (because approval is being obtained under Listing Rule 10.11), the issue will not use up any of the Company's 15% annual placement capacity.

If Resolutions 4 and 5 are not passed, the Company will not be able to proceed with the issue and no further funds will be raised.

Resolutions 4 and 5 are independent of one another. If one or more of the Resolutions is not carried, and one or more of the other Resolutions are passed, then the Company may still proceed with the issue of the Sub-Underwriter Options to the relevant related party in respect of which the issue of Sub-Underwriter Options have been approved.

7. RESOLUTION 6 – RENEWAL OF PROPORTIONAL TAKEOVER PROVISIONS IN THE CONSTITUTION

7.1 General

A proportional takeover bid is a takeover bid where the offer made to each shareholder is only for a proportion of that shareholder's shares.

Pursuant to section 648G of the Corporations Act, an entity may include a provision in its constitution whereby a proportional takeover bid for shares may only proceed after the bid has been approved by a meeting of shareholders held in accordance with the terms set out in the Corporations Act.

In accordance with section 648G(1) of the Corporations Act, such clause will cease to apply at the end of three years from the incorporation of the Company, insertion of the clause or renewal of the clause (as appropriate) unless otherwise specified. When this clause ceases to apply, the constitution will be modified by omitting the clause.

A company may renew its proportional takeover approval provisions in the same manner in which a company can modify its constitution (i.e., by special resolution of shareholders).

The proportional takeover provisions contained in clause 36 of the Constitution are no longer operative as it has been more than three years since they were last approved by Shareholders.

This Resolution is a special resolution which will enable the Company to modify its Constitution by re-inserting proportional takeover provisions into the Constitution in the form of clause 36. The new clause 36 is in the same form as the existing clause 36 (as set out in Annexure A of this Notice).

The Company is permitted to seek further Shareholder approval to renew this clause for further periods of up to three years on each occasion.

7.2 Technical information required by section 648G(5) of the Corporations Act

Overview	<p>A proportional takeover bid is a takeover bid where the offer made to each shareholder is only for a proportion of that shareholder's shares.</p> <p>Pursuant to section 648G of the Corporations Act, the Company has included in the Proposed Constitution a provision whereby a proportional takeover bid for Shares may only proceed after the bid has been approved by a meeting of Shareholders held in accordance with the terms set out in the Corporations Act.</p> <p>This clause of the Proposed Constitution will cease to have effect on the third anniversary of the date of the adoption of last renewal of the clause.</p>
Effect of proposed proportional takeover provisions	Where offers have been made under a proportional off-market bid in respect of a class of securities in a company, the registration of a transfer giving effect to a contract resulting from the acceptance of an offer made under such a proportional off-market bid is prohibited unless and until a Resolution to approve the proportional off-market bid is passed.
Reasons for proportional takeover provisions	A proportional takeover bid may result in control of the Company changing without Shareholders having the opportunity to dispose of all their Shares. By making a partial bid, a bidder can obtain practical control of the Company by acquiring less than a majority interest. Shareholders are exposed to the risk of being left as a minority in the Company and the risk of the bidder being able to acquire control of the Company without payment of an adequate control premium. These amended provisions allow Shareholders to decide whether a proportional takeover bid is acceptable in principle, and assist in ensuring that any partial bid is appropriately priced.
Knowledge of any acquisition proposals	As at the date of this Notice, no Director is aware of any proposal by any person to acquire, or to increase the extent of, a substantial interest in the Company.
Potential advantages and disadvantages of proportional takeover provisions	<p>The Directors consider that the proportional takeover provisions have no potential advantages or disadvantages for them and that they remain free to make a recommendation on whether an offer under a proportional takeover bid should be accepted.</p> <p>The potential advantages of the proportional takeover provisions for Shareholders include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) the right to decide by majority vote whether an offer under a proportional takeover bid should proceed; (b) assisting in preventing Shareholders from being locked in as a minority;

SCHEDULE 1 – TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF SUB-UNDERWRITING OPTIONS

(a) **Entitlement**

(g) **Timing of issue of Shares on exercise**

Within 5 Business Days after the Exercise Date, the Company will:

- (i) issue the number of Shares required under these terms and conditions in respect of the number of Options specified in the Notice of Exercise and for which cleared funds have been received by the Company;
- (ii) if required, give ASX a notice that complies with section 708A(5)(e) of the Corporations Act, or, if the Company is unable to issue such a notice, lodge with ASIC a prospectus prepared in accordance with the Corporations Act and do all such things necessary to satisfy section 708A(11) of the Corporations Act to ensure that an offer for sale of the Shares does not require disclosure to investors; and
- (iii) if admitted to the official list of ASX at the time, apply for official quotation on ASX of Shares issued pursuant to the exercise of the Options.

If a notice delivered under (g)(ii) for any reason is not effective to ensure that an offer for sale of the Shares does not require disclosure to investors, the Company must, no later than 20 Business Days after becoming aware of such notice being ineffective, lodge with ASIC a prospectus prepared in accordance with the Corporations Act and do all such things necessary to satisfy section 708A(11) of the Corporations Act to ensure that an offer for sale of the Shares does not require disclosure to investors.

(h) **Shares issued on exercise**

Shares issued on exercise of the Options rank equally with the then issued shares of the Company.

(i) **Reconstruction of capital**

If at any time the issued capital of the Company is reconstructed, all rights of an Optionholder are to be changed in a manner consistent with the Corporations Act and the ASX Listing Rules at the time of the reconstruction.

(j) **Participation in new issues**

ANNEXURE A – PROPORTIONAL TAKEOVER PROVISIONS

1. PARTIAL TAKEOVER PLEBISCITES

1.1 Resolution to Approve Proportional Off-Market Bid

- (a) Where offers have been made under a proportional off-market bid in respect of a class of securities of the Company (**bid class securities**), the registration of a transfer giving effect to a contract resulting from the acceptance of an offer made under the proportional off-market bid is prohibited unless and until a resolution (in this clause 1 referred to as a **prescribed resolution**) to approve the proportional off-market bid is passed in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.
- (b) A person (other than the bidder or a person associated with the bidder) who, as at the end of the day on which the first offer under the proportional off-market bid was made, held bid class securities is entitled to vote on a prescribed resolution and, for the purposes of so voting, is entitled to one vote for each of the bid class securities.
- (c) A prescribed resolution is to be voted on at a meeting, convened and conducted by the Company, of the persons entitled to vote on the prescribed resolution.
- (d) A prescribed resolution that has been voted on is to taken to have been passed if the proportion that the number of votes in favour of the prescribed resolution bears to the total number of votes on the prescribed resolution is greater than one half, and otherwise is taken to have been rejected.

1.2 Meetings

- (a) The provisions of this Constitution that apply in relation to a general meeting of the Company apply, with modifications as the circumstances require, in relation to a meeting that is convened pursuant to this clause 1.2 as if the last mentioned meeting was a general meeting of the Company.
- (b) Where takeover offers have been made under a proportional off-market bid, the Directors are to ensure that a prescribed resolution to approve the proportional off-market bid is voted on in accordance with this clause 1 before the 14th day before the last day of the bid period for the proportional off-market bid (the **resolution deadline**).

1.3 Notice of Prescribed Resolution

Where a prescribed resolution to approve a proportional off-market bid is voted on in accordance with this clause 1 before the resolution deadline, the Company is, on or before the resolution deadline:

- (a) to give the bidder; and
- (b) if the Company is listed – each relevant financial market (as defined in the Corporations Act) in relation to the Company;

a notice in writing stating that a prescribed resolution to approve the proportional off-market bid has been voted on and that the prescribed resolution has been passed, or has been rejected, as the case requires.

1.4 Takeover Resolution Deemed Passed

Where, at the end of the day before the resolution deadline, no prescribed resolution to approve the proportional off-market bid has been voted on in accordance with this clause 1, a resolution to approve the proportional off-market bid is to be, for the purposes of this clause 1, deemed to have been passed in accordance with this clause 1.

1.5 Takeover Resolution Rejected

Where a prescribed resolution to approve a proportional off-market bid under which offers have been made is voted on in accordance with this clause 1 before the resolution deadline, and is rejected, then:

- (a) despite section 652A of the Corporations Act:
 - (i) all offers under the proportional off-market bid that have not been accepted as at the end of the resolution deadline; and
 - (ii) all offers under the proportional off-market bid that have been accepted and from whose acceptance binding contracts have not resulted as at the end of the resolution deadline,are deemed to be withdrawn at the end of the resolution deadline;
- (b) as soon as practicable after the resolution deadline, the bidder must return to each person who has accepted any of the offers referred to in clause 1.5(a)(ii) any documents that were sent by the person to the bidder with the acceptance of the offer;
- (c) the bidder:
 - (i) is entitled to rescind; and
 - (ii) must rescind as soon as practicable after the resolution deadline,each binding takeover contract resulting from the acceptance of an offer made under the proportional off-market bid; and
- (d) a person who has accepted an offer made under the proportional off-market bid is entitled to rescind the takeover contract (if any) resulting from the acceptance.

1.6 Renewal

This clause 1 ceases to have effect on the third anniversary of the date of the adoption of the last renewal of this clause 1.
