This occurred as a result of the call centre having a higher percentage of male employees. Due to the consistent requirement of large recruitment groups in the call centre, it is not always possible to fill groups with a 50:50 split. There is no gender bias in the recruitment process and any skew towards male candidates is as a result of candidate availability only.</p>

			<p>(b) Remuneration practices that do not discriminate based on gender – below target</p> <p>Call centre employees are paid the same base wage. Non-call centre staff average wages are skewed towards female employees earning lower average wages. This is partially due to average wages for some departmental roles eg. claims and administration being lower in comparison with those departmental roles that require higher skilled, more experienced and higher paid employees eg. finance or business analytics.
