Resolution 1– Adoption of Remuneration Report

A vote on this Resolution must not be cast (in any capacity) by or on behalf of either of the following persons:

- (a) a member of the Key Management Personnel, details of whose remuneration are included in the Remuneration Report; or
- (b) a Closely Related Party of such a member.

However, a person (the **voter**) described above may cast a vote on this Resolution as a proxy if the vote is not cast on behalf of a person described above and either:

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

This Explanatory Statement has been prepared to provide information which the Directors believe to be material to Shareholders in deciding whether or not to pass the Resolutions.

1. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AND REPORTS

In accordance with the Corporations Act, the business of the Meeting will include receipt and consideration of the annual financial report of the Company for the financial year ended 30 June 2023 together with the declaration of the Directors, the Directors' report, the Remuneration Report and the auditor's report.

The Company will not provide a hard copy of the Company's annual financial report to Shareholders unless specifically requested to do so. The Company's annual financial report is available on its website at **www.castillocopper.com**.

2. RESOLUTION 1 – ADOPTION OF REMUNERATION REPORT

2.1 General

The Corporations Act requires that at a listed company's annual general meeting, a resolution that the remuneration report to be adopted must be put to the shareholders. However, such a resolution is advisory only and does not bind the company or the directors of the company.

The remuneration report sets out the company's remuneration arrangements for the directors and senior management of the company. The remuneration report is part of the directors' report contained in the annual financial report of the company for a financial year.

The chair of the meeting must allow a reasonable opportunity for its shareholders to ask questions about or make comments on the remuneration report at the annual general meeting.

2.2 Voting consequences

A company is required to put to its shareholders a resolution proposing the calling of another meeting of shareholders to consider the appointment of directors of the company (**Spill Resolution**) if, at consecutive annual general meetings, at least 25% of the votes cast on a remuneration report resolution are voted against adoption of the remuneration report and at the first of those annual general meetings a Spill Resolution was not put to vote. If required, the Spill Resolution must be put to vote at the second of those annual general meetings.

If more than 50% of votes cast are in favour of the Spill Resolution, the company must convene a shareholder meeting (**Spill Meeting**) within 90 days of the second annual general meeting.

All of the directors of the company who were in office when the directors' report (as included in the company's annual financial report for the most recent financial year) was approved, other than the managing director of the company, will cease to hold office immediately before the end of the Spill Meeting but may stand for re-election at the Spill Meeting.

Following the Spill Meeting those persons whose election or re-election as directors of the company is approved will be the directors of the company.

2.3 Previous voting results

At the Company's previous annual general meeting the votes cast against the remuneration report considered at that annual general meeting were less than 25%. Accordingly, the Spill Resolution is not relevant for this Meeting.

3. RESOLUTION 2 – ELECTION OF DIRECTOR – DAVID DRAKELEY

3.1 General

The Constitution allows the Directors to appoint at any time a person to be a Director either to fill a casual vacancy or as an addition to the existing Directors, but only where the total number of Directors does not at any time exceed the maximum number specified by the Constitution.

Pursuant to the Constitution and Listing Rule 14.4, any Director so appointed holds office only until the next annual general meeting and is then eligible for election by Shareholders but shall not be taken into account in determining the Directors who are to retire by rotation (if any) at that meeting.

Mr David Drakeley, having been appointed by other Directors on 30 January 2023 in accordance with the Constitution, will retire in accordance with the Constitution and Listing Rule 14.4 and being eligible, seeks election from Shareholders.

3.2 Qualifications and other material directorships

Mr Drakeley holds a Bachelor (Hons) of Earth Science and Combined Subjects, QLD Site Senior Executive (SSE) for Surface Mines or Quarries, and QLD Site Senior Executive (SSE) for Coal Mines. Mr Drakeley has over 15 years' experience in Australia's exploration industry and has distinguished himself across a range of commodities. He is known for his unwavering commitment to safety and ensures that every project under his leadership prioritises the well-being of its team members.

Mr Drakeley is acutely aware of the critical importance of accurate data in today's mining environment. He has meticulously championed the collection, management, and interpretation of exploration data, ensuring all decisions are informed and reliable.

Mr Drakeley brings a strong geological background to Castillo Copper and brings a particular talent for project planning and execution that is accurately attuned to solve technical challenges.

3.3 Independence

Mr Drakeley has no interests, position or relationship that might influence, or reasonably be perceived to influence, in a material respect his capacity to bring an independent judgement to bear on issues before the Board and to act in the best interest of the Company as a whole rather than in the interests of an individual security holder or other party.

If elected the Board considers Mr Drakeley will be an independent Director.

3.4 Other material information

The Company conducts appropriate checks on the background and experience of candidates before their appointment to the Board. The Company undertook such checks prior to the appointment of Mr Drakeley.

Mr Drakeley has confirmed that he considers he will have sufficient time to fulfil his responsibilities as a Non-Executive Director of the Company and does not consider that any other commitment will interfere with his availability to perform his duties as a Non-Executive Director of the Company.

3.5 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolution 2 is passed, Mr Drakeley will be elected to the Board as an independent Director.

In the event that Resolution 2 is not passed, Mr Drakeley will not continue in his role as an independent Director.

3.6 Board recommendation

The Board has reviewed Mr Drakeley's performance since his appointment to the Board and considers that his skills and experience will continue to enhance the Board's ability to perform its role. Accordingly, the Board supports the election of Mr Drakeley and recommends that Shareholders vote in favour of Resolution 2.

4. RESOLUTION 3 – ELECTION OF DIRECTOR – JACKSON SEDGWICK

4.1 General

As set out in Section 3.1 above, the Constitution allows the Directors to appoint at any time a person to be a Director either to fill a casual vacancy or as an addition to the existing Directors.

Pursuant to the Constitution and Listing Rule 14.4, any Director so appointed holds office only until the next annual general meeting and is then eligible for election by Shareholders.

Mr Jackson Sedgwick having been appointed by other Directors on 30 January 2023 in accordance with the Constitution, will retire in accordance with the Constitution and Listing Rule 14.4 and being eligible, seeks election from Shareholders.

4.2 Qualifications and other material directorships

Mr Jackson Sedgwick holds Bachelor of Engineering, Bachelor of Commerce (Corporate Finance), and a Master of Business Administration (with Distinction) from the University of Western Australia and is also a graduate of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

Mr Sedgwick is an experienced corporate strategy, finance, and business improvement professional with over 15 years' experience across mining, management consulting, and utilities. Mr Sedgwick has gained considerable frontline and managerial experience across a broad range of roles and industries. He has extensive experience in structural, civil, and marine engineering, including three years working across multiple Rio Tinto operational mine sites. Prior management consulting experience predominantly focused on mining, oil and gas, and industrials advising clients on post-merger integration, construction productivity, continuous improvement, organisation design, and cost optimisation strategies. Mr Sedgwick currently heads up corporate strategy for Horizon Power, Australia's only vertically integrated utility, and the most geographically dispersed utility in the world.

Mr Sedgwick is responsible for optimising the company's portfolio optimisation and overseeing the group's finances.

4.3 Independence

Mr Sedgwick has no interests, position or relationship that might influence, or reasonably be perceived to influence, in a material respect his capacity to bring an independent judgement to bear on issues before the Board and to act in the best interest of the Company as a whole rather than in the interests of an individual security holder or other party.

If elected the Board does not consider Mr Sedgwick to be an independent Director as he was appointed interim Executive Director on 10 October 2023.

4.4 Other material information

The Company conducts appropriate checks on the background and experience of candidates before their appointment to the Board. The Company undertook such checks prior to the appointment of Mr Sedgwick.

Mr Sedgwick has confirmed that he considers he will have sufficient time to fulfil his responsibilities as interim Executive Director of the Company and does not consider that any other commitment will interfere with his availability to perform his duties as a interim Executive Director of the Company.

4.5 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolution 3 is passed, Mr Sedgwick will be elected to the Board as interim Executive Director.

In the event that Resolution 3 is not passed, Mr Sedgwick will not continue in his role as interim Executive Director.

4.6 Board recommendation

The Board has reviewed Mr Sedgwick's performance since his appointment to the Board and considers that his skills and experience will continue to enhance the Board's ability to perform its role. Accordingly, the Board supports the election of Mr Sedgwick and recommends that Shareholders vote in favour of Resolution 3.

5. RESOLUTION 4 – RE-ELECTION OF DIRECTOR – GERRARD HALL

5.1 General

The Constitution sets out the requirements for determining which Directors are to retire by rotation at an annual general meeting.

Mr Gerrard Hall, who has served as a Director since 23 June 2019 and was last re-elected on 30 November 2021 retires by rotation and seeks re-election.

5.2 Qualifications and other material directorships

Mr Hall holds a Bachelor of Arts, with honours, in Economics & Finance from the University of Greenwich as well as a Master of Business Administration and a Masters of Science in Financial Management from Edinburgh Business School.

For the past several years, Mr Hall has been aligned with SI Capital, working as a director in corporate finance and broking division. Mr Hall's core responsibilities

encompass managing corporate relationships, broadening the HNW client base and business development.

In a varied career, spanning over 25 years, Mr Hall has gained considerable frontline and managerial experience across a broad spectrum of financial products, with notable institutions. From 1994-2004, he worked with JP Morgan then UBS, focused mostly on trading equity & treasury derivatives as a primary trader and on behalf of clients, generating significant alpha during this period.

Subsequently, Mr Hall spent six years in Bahrain, mostly with Saudi National Commercial Bank, as a Business Head of Asset Management & Treasury Products. Notably, he established the Structured Investment Product division and grew it into sub-business unit that generated US\$20m in annual revenues within four years.

Upon returning to the UK in 2010, Mr Hall joined Barclays Wealth as a Head of Strategic Alliances for the MENA region. In this role, he negotiated distribution agreements with Middle East banks and expanded the footprint across the Gulf States and into Egypt primarily.

Following a two-year hiatus to complete post-graduate studies, Mr Hall established his own strategic management consultancy in mid-2013 and has undertaken engagements for blue-chip groups including BFC Bank, Northern Trust Natixis and HSBC.

5.3 Independence

If re-elected the Board considers Mr Hall will be an independent Director.

5.4 Technical information required by Listing Rule 14.1A

If Resolution 4 is passed, Mr Hall will be re-elected to the Board as an independent Director.

In the event that Resolution 4 is not passed, Mr Hall will not continue in his role as an independent Director.

5.5 Board recommendation

The Board has reviewed Mr Hall's performance since his appointment to the Board and considers that their skills and experience will continue to enhance the Board's ability to perform its role. Accordingly, the Board supports the re-election of Mr Hall and recommends that Shareholders vote in favour of Resolution 4.

6. RESOLUTION 5 – APPROVAL OF 7.1A MANDATE

6.1 General

Broadly speaking, and subject to a number of exceptions, Listing Rule 7.1 limits the amount of Equity Securities that a listed company can issue without the approval of its shareholders over any 12 month period to 15% of the fully paid ordinary securities it had on issue at the start of that period.

However, under Listing Rule 7.1A, an eligible entity may seek shareholder approval by way of a special resolution passed at its annual general meeting to increase this 15% limit by an extra 10% to 25% (**7.1A Mandate**).

An 'eligible entity' means an entity which is not included in the S&P/ASX 300 Index and has a market capitalisation of \$300,000,000 or less. The Company is an eligible entity for these purposes.

As at the date of this Notice, the Company is an eligible entity as it is not included in the S&P/ASX 300 Index and has a current market capitalisation of \$9,096,537 (based on the number of Shares on issue and the closing price of Shares on the ASX on 5 October 2023).

Resolution 5 seeks Shareholder approval by way of special resolution for the Company to have the additional 10% placement capacity provided for in Listing Rule 7.1A to issue Equity Securities without Shareholder approval.

For note, a special resolution is a resolution requiring at least 75% of votes cast by shareholders present and eligible to vote at the meeting in favour of the resolution.

If Resolution 5 is passed, the Company will be able to issue Equity Securities up to the combined 25% limit in Listing Rules 7.1 and 7.1A without any further Shareholder approval.

If Resolution 5 is not passed, the Company will not be able to access the additional 10% capacity to issue Equity Securities without Shareholder approval under Listing Rule 7.1A and will remain subject to the 15% limit on issuing Equity Securities without Shareholder approval set out in Listing Rule 7.1.

6.2 Technical information required by Listing Rule 7.1A

Pursuant to and in accordance with Listing Rule 7.3A, the information below is provided in relation to Resolution 5:

(a) Period for which the 7.1A Mandate is valid

The 7.1A Mandate will commence on the date of the Meeting and expire on the first to occur of the following:

- (i) the date that is 12 months after the date of this Meeting;
- (ii) the time and date of the Company's next annual general meeting; and
- (iii) the time and date of approval by Shareholders of any transaction under Listing Rule 11.1.2 (a significant change in the nature or scale of activities) or Listing Rule 11.2 (disposal of the main undertaking).

(b) Minimum price

Any Equity Securities issued under the 7.1A Mandate must be in an existing quoted class of Equity Securities and be issued for cash consideration at a minimum price of 75% of the volume weighted average price of Equity Securities in that class, calculated over the 15 trading days on which trades in that class were recorded immediately before:

- (i) the date on which the price at which the Equity Securities are to be issued is agreed by the entity and the recipient of the Equity Securities; or

- (ii) if the Equity Securities are not issued within 10 trading days of the date in Section 6.2(b)(i), the date on which the Equity Securities are issued.

(c) **Use of funds raised under the 7.1A Mandate**

The Company intends to use funds raised from issues of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate for:

- (i) the potential acquisition of new resources, assets and investments (including expenses associated with such an acquisition);
- (ii) continued exploration and development expenditure on the Company's current assets (including feasibility studies and ongoing project administration);
- (iii) the development of the Company's current business; and/or
- (iv) general working capital.

(d) **Risk of Economic and Voting Dilution**

Any issue of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate will dilute the interests of Shareholders who do not receive any Shares under the issue.

If Resolution 5 is approved by Shareholders and the Company issues the maximum number of Equity Securities available under the 7.1A Mandate, the economic and voting dilution of existing Shares would be as shown in the table below.

The table below shows the dilution of existing Shareholders calculated in accordance with the formula outlined in Listing Rule 7.1A.2, on the basis of the closing market price of Shares and the number of Equity Securities on issue or proposed to be issued as at 5 October 2023.

The table also shows the voting dilution impact where the number of Shares on issue (Variable A in the formula) changes and the economic dilution where there are changes in the issue price of Shares issued under the 7.1A Mandate.

The table above uses the following assumptions:

1. There are currently 1,299,505,355 Shares on issue.
2. The issue price set out above is the closing market price of the Shares on the ASX on 5 October 2023 (being \$0.007).
3. The Company issues the maximum possible number of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate.
4. The Company has not issued any Equity Securities in the 12 months prior to the Meeting that were not issued under an exception in Listing Rule 7.2 or with approval under Listing Rule 7.1.
5. The issue of Equity Securities under the 7.1A Mandate consists only of Shares. It is assumed that no Options are exercised into Shares before the date of issue of the Equity Securities. If the issue of Equity Securities includes quoted Options, it is assumed that those quoted Options are exercised into Shares for the purpose of calculating the voting dilution effect on existing Shareholders.
6. The calculations above do not show the dilution that any one particular Shareholder will be subject to. All Shareholders should consider the dilution caused to their own shareholding depending on their specific circumstances.
7. This table does not set out any dilution pursuant to approvals under Listing Rule 7.1 unless otherwise disclosed.
8. The 10% voting dilution reflects the aggregate percentage dilution against the issued share capital at the time of issue. This is why the voting dilution is shown in each example as 10%.
9. The table does not show an example of dilution that may be caused to a particular Shareholder by reason of placements under the 7.1A Mandate, based on that Shareholder's holding at the date of the Meeting.

Shareholders should note that there is a risk that:

- (i) the market price for the Company's Shares may be significantly lower on the issue date than on the date of the Meeting; and
- (ii) the Shares may be issued at a price that is at a discount to the market price for those Shares on the date of issue.

(e) Allocation policy under the 7.1A Mandate

The recipients of the Equity Securities to be issued under the 7.1A Mandate have not yet been determined. However, the recipients of Equity Securities could consist of current Shareholders or new investors (or both), none of whom will be related parties of the Company.

The Company will determine the recipients at the time of the issue under the 7.1A Mandate, having regard to the following factors:

- (i) the purpose of the issue;
 - (ii) alternative methods for raising funds available to the Company at that time, including, but not limited to, an entitlement issue, share purchase plan, placement or other offer where existing Shareholders may participate;
 - (iii) the effect of the issue of the Equity Securities on the control of the Company;
 - (iv) the circumstances of the Company, including, but not limited to, the financial position and solvency of the Company;
 - (v) prevailing market conditions; and
 - (vi) advice from corporate, financial and broking advisers (if applicable).
- (f) **Previous approval under Listing Rule 7.1A**

The Company previously obtained approval from its Shareholders pursuant to Listing Rule 7.1A at its annual general meeting held on 29 November 2022 (**Previous Approval**).

During the 12 month period preceding the date of the Meeting, being on and from 29 November 2022, the Company has not issued any Equity Securities pursuant to the Previous Approval.

6.3 Voting Exclusion Statement

As at the date of this Notice, the Company is not proposing to make an issue of Equity Securities under Listing Rule 7.1A. Accordingly, a voting exclusion statement is not included in this Notice.
